PUBLIC HEALTH INSPECTOR'S SECTION OF REPORTPHYSICAL CHARACTERISTICS AND EMPLOYMENT IN THE DISTRICT

Situated in the North Western portion of the County, the Rural District comprises 26 Parishes covering an area of 49,727 acres.

Whilst there are no exceptionally large villages, each parish has a village or hamlet forming a nucleus.

The predominant industry is agriculture and although mechanisation and improved methods of farming have resulted through the years in a gradual reduction in the number of persons employed in agriculture, the greater portion of the population is still engaged either directly or indirectly with it but the number of persons seeking employment in the nearby towns of Hereford and Leominster is slowly on the increase.

There is also a tendency for some townspeople to wish to reside in the various villages and to travel to and fro daily to occupations in the towns, this tendency is beneficial to the rural district in every way.

WATER SUPPLIES(a) Regional and Village Schemes

The Herefordshire Water Board mains supply the greater portion of the larger villages.

Schemes in course of preparation will eventually afford a piped supply to the parishes of Almeley, Kinnersley, Letton, Preston-on-Wye, Moccas and Blakemere, and several cases of water shortage within these parishes have been reported during the year.

WATER SUPPLIES (Continued)

The Council is anxious that the Water Board should proceed with Phase II of the Regional Scheme originally promoted by them, as soon as the Water Board receives Government sanction.

Where samples proved to be unsatisfactory, occupiers were notified that water used for drinking purposes should be boiled prior to use.

No samples were submitted for chemical analysis during the year.

DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE

The sewage disposal works at Weobley has functioned satisfactorily during the year and is fully capable of meeting the immediately foreseeable demands as respects new housing.

Revised proposals as respects the Dilwyn Scheme were submitted to the Ministry of Housing and Local Government. The introduction of a system of sewers in this village, where most of the houses now have piped water supplies, would represent a major step forward and would be likely to result in some new private housing development in the parish.

Proposals for the construction of a small sewerage scheme to serve the village of New End, Canon Pyon and the proposed Council Housing development in that area received a set back when the Council were advised that the Ministry of Housing and Local Government would not agree to the acceptance of a combined negotiated tender for the sewerage scheme and housing scheme. At the close of the year revised proposals were in course of preparation.

PUBLIC SWIMMING BATHS

There are no public swimming baths in the district.

REFUSE COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL

Throughout the year, including the exceptionally difficult weather conditions during January, the collection of household refuse has continued on a three weekly basis and although the problem of disposal of the collected refuse is still a major problem, the time is approaching when the Council may feel inclined to consider the introduction of a fortnightly collection in some of the larger villages, as a step ultimately towards a fortnightly collection throughout the entire district.

The increased use of wrappers, cartons, plastic and metal containers for foods results in more household refuse and consideration of a fortnightly collection at least in some of the larger villages would be well worth while.

REFUSE COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL (Continued)

Grateful thanks are again due to Mr. Hall of Bidney and to Sir Richard Verdin for their kind assistance in placing the Bidney Tip at the Council's disposal.

Throughout the year the refuse vehicle travelled 5,825 miles on the various rounds. The estimated average mileage per gallon of fuel being 6.2.

DISINFECTIONS

Terminal disinfection is carried out as requisite. Formalin gas or Sulphur Dioxide being employed when appropriate.

THE PREVENTION OF DAMAGE BY PESTS ACT, 1949Rodent Control

Further consideration has been given by the Council towards the statutory obligations of Local Authorities under Section 2 of the Act, and in June arrangements were made to re-engage the former Pests Inspector to re-commence a survey of the district, the contract in force as respects Council properties still remaining in operation.

A table describing the properties inspected and visited during the year is on page 16.

HOUSING (FINANCIAL PROVISIONS) ACT, 1958 AND HOUSE PURCHASE AND HOUSING ACT, 1959

Discretionary Improvement Grants

The Council first implemented the improvement grant scheme in 1952, since then 107 proposals have been approved, two of which being later withdrawn by the applicant. Dwellings improved under this scheme now amount to about 6.1% of all the houses within the area.

Six schemes were approved by the Council during the year, eleven were completed and grants paid, also a further application was received.

Standard Improvement Grants

The standard improvement grant scheme has been well received, and during the year 26 applications were made, 25 of which were approved, with 23 completed and paid.

Since the inauguration of the scheme in 1959 some 76 proposals, amounting to about 4% of all the houses within the area have been approved, one of which being later withdrawn by the applicant.

HOUSING AND BUILDING DEVELOPMENT

The Phase III housing scheme at Burton Wood, Weobley, was finally completed during the first four months of the year. Delays of course were caused on account of labour difficulties and shortage of materials.

Preparatory work in connection with the scheme for the erection of 14 houses and 6 bungalows at Canon Pyon was well advanced and further progress made as respects housing schemes for Bishopstone, Staunton-on-Wye, Norton Canon, Preston-on-Wye, and Moccas.

Unfortunately, however, following a Planning Appeal, proposals were finally refused by the County Council during April for the Bishopstone scheme, and in December a further refusal was encountered in connection with a site for 6 houses at Norton Canon. Both matters, however, were under further consideration by the Council towards the end of the year with a view to obtaining alternative sites.

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STORAGE OF PETROLEUM SPIRIT AND CARBIDE

At the end of the year petrol storage capacity amounted to 42,650 gallons.

There are 7 petrol filling stations and 40 private storage tanks licenced for the storage of petroleum spirit.

No licences were issued during the year for the storage of carbide.

HOP-PICKER'S QUARTERS

The introduction of machinery for hop-picking has meant that local labour has largely satisfied the demands on smaller farms, thus very few dwellings were used during the season.

INSPECTION AND SUPERVISION OF FOOD

The control of milk supplies is administered by the National Agricultural Advisory Service.

Ten inspections of food premises have been made in connection with the Food Hygiene Regulations. Inspections in the course of other duties have been undertaken from time to time.

SCHOOL MILK

By arrangement with the County Council, samples of milk are obtained and submitted for bacteriological and also biological examination. Thirtyone samples were sent for bacteriological examination during the year, six less than during 1961.

SLAUGHTERHOUSES AND BUTCHER'S SHOPS

There are two private slaughterhouses in the district, both of which have been regularly used during the year. The improvement of both establishments has been considered by the Council and in one case the necessary work was completed by the beginning of June, and in the other case improvement works were in progress but weather conditions had considerably delayed building operations.

During the year 98 Beasts, 1 Calf, 110 Sheep, 303 Lambs, and 139 pigs were slaughtered at the two establishments, and after inspection the following meat was considered to be unfit for human consumption and was voluntarily surrendered:-

10 Bovine livers, 5 Sheep livers, 2 Lambs' livers,
9 Pigs' livers, 1 Bovine carcass and organs, and
2 Pigs' hind quarters.

By comparison with 1961, slightly more animals were slaughtered in the area - 10.7% more.

100% inspection of all carcasses and organs has been maintained, although as in previous years, this has frequently meant the working of extra time, outside normal working hours.

THE MANUFACTURE AND SALE OF ICE-CREAM

There are no ice-cream manufacturing premises in the area, all ice-cream sold is obtained in pre-packed wrappers from reputable manufacturers and stored in refrigerator containers prior to sale.

One further premises was registered for the storage and sale of ice-cream under the Food and Drugs Act, 1955, Section 16. There is now a total of 28 registered premises.

No samples were submitted for laboratory examination.
