# TO THE CHAIRMAN AND COUNCILLORS OF YEOVIL RURAL DISTRICT COUNCIL.

#### Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in presenting my Annual Report for 1941. There is still some overcrowding in several houses in the district, but this is less extensive.

There was a sharp epidemic of Measles in the spring with a total of 487 cases notified. Almost certainly other cases occurred which were not notified. Two deaths only were reported as a result of this epidemic.

Apart from Measles the incidence of infectious diseases were not above the average. An intensive campaign to protect children from diphtheria was conducted during the year. 93% of all children in the district were protected. Eighteen cases of diphtheria were notified and two deaths occurred, both in uninoculated children.

There has been a definite decrease in the number of cases of Scabies and of verminous conditions in the schools, and, though fresh cases still occur, present methods of dealing with the problem are having good effect. I must again draw attention to the poor hygienic and primitive sanitary conditions prevailing at many of the schools in the district, though the return of many evacuees has led to an improvement in the crowded conditions that existed in 1940.

Under the Rest and Shelter Scheme medical rooms have been arranged in the larger centres of the district. Some equipment is to be provided from County sources.

#### SECTION F.

#### DIPHTHERIA IMMUNISATION.

A high proportion of the children of the district have had protective inoculation against diphtheria as a result of an intensive campaign. The school teachers and district nurses have been most helpful in the effort to bring home to parents the need for this work.

At the end of the year there were approximately 4,388 children of school age or under in the district, 93% of these are now protected against diphtheria.

Children are still being inoculated in small numbers.

408 patients were admitted to South Petherton Isolation Hospital during the year. 120 of them were Yeavil Rural District.

## SANITARY INSPECTOR'S REPORT, 1941

To the Chairman and Members of the Yeovil Rural District Council.

MISS OSBORNE AND GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to submit my annual report for the year 1941. All the complaints received during the year were satisfactorily dealt with.

#### HOUSING.

There were no new houses erected during the year.

Plans submitted for approval under the Byelaws totalled 6.

Town Planning. 6 Interim Development Permission Certificates were issued under the Town Planning Scheme.

#### WATER SUPPLIES.

The following works of water supply have been completed during the year:

Chilthorne Domer, Thorne and Yeovil Marsh. The work of connecting this supply to the Mudford supply was completed during the year.

#### SEWERAGE AND SEWAGE DISPOSAL.

No works of importance were carried out during the year.

#### SLAUGHTERHOUSES.

There are 15 Slaughterhouses on the register, and these have been kept clean and wholesome.

All slaughtering except Emergency Slaughtering, has been carried out outside the district under the Regional Slaughtering Scheme.

#### BAKEHOUSES.

There are 20 Bakehouses in the district, all of which are kept in a satisfactory condition.

#### COWSHEDS AND DAIRIES.

There are 60 Accredited Producers and 23 Tuberculin Tested Producers in the District.

The collection of milk samples is an important part of the work of my department, and the time and travelling involved has considerably increased.

#### FACTORIES.

All are in a fairly satisfactory condition.

#### REFUSE COLLECTION AND SALVAGE.

The scheme of Refuse and Salvage collection for the whole district is working satisfactorily. The amount of Salvage collected was the average for a Rural District.
