TO THE CHAIRMAN AND COUNCILLORS

OF

YEOVIL RURAL DISTRICT COUNCIL.

Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in presenting my Annual Report for 1945. It is hoped that houses will soon become available to relieve the extreme shortage of accommodation. The Council are aware of the serious nature of present over-crowding with its social difficulties and ever present risk of epidemic diseases. In the circumstances the general health of the district is very good. Infectious diseases with the exception of tuberculosis were not serious. 69 cases of Scarlet Fever, 14 Diphtheria, 185 Measles and 28 Whooping Cough cases were notified. The Scarlet Fever cases were nearly all mild, 37 were treated in hospital. Of the 31 cases of Diphtheria notified, 12 were from Naval Authorities. A few other cases admitted to hospital as doubtful cases of Diphtheria proved to be Tonsillitis due to other organisms.

Since the end of the War several ships have arrived in the country with cases of Small Pox or Small Pox Contacts on board. Several of these contacts have come to the Yeovil Rural District. Though there has never been any serious risk it has been a relief to know that a fair proportion of the local population have recently been vaccinated.

Water supplies in the district are still inadequate in quantity. Several small supplies are also at times a potential danger though no infection has been traced to water for many years. It will be a great advantage to have a small number of reliable sources for water. As soon as possible every house and dairy should have a piped pure water supply.

There is much work overdue on sewage schemes throughout the district. No improvement has yet been made in the sanitation at some of the village schools. Many still have bucket sanitation and a few earth closets. In some cases, e.g., Ilchester, water sanitation cannot be installed until a proper system of sewerage is provided.

This will be my last Report to the Council. I should like to express my thanks to the Council for their unfailing courtesy and help in the execution of my duties and to the Clerk and Sanitary Inspectors for their cordial co-operation which has made much of my work extremely pleasant.

SECTION F.

INFECTIOUS DISEASES.

13 cases of Diphtheria were notified—12 were adult cases from a Naval Camp. There were no deaths. The absence of infection among school children is now a conspicuous and highly satisfactory feature.

*These figures refer only to children attending County maintained schools. It has not been possible to ascertain figures for children in the district attending other schools though it is believed that the great majority of these children are also immunised. Children under one year are also not included.

As a rule, children under the age of twelve months are not susceptible to diphtheria. It is probably wise to begin inoculations after the age of six months but many Doctors do not immunise until the age of twelve months is reached. Very few of these very young children have been immunised and they have not been included in the figure given above.

The figure for all children from age 0-4 years would be 70%

145 patients were admitted to South Petherton Isolation Hospital during the year. 84 of them were from Yeovil Rural District.

SANITARY INSPECTOR'S REPORT, 1945.

To the Chairman and Members of the Yeovil Rural District Council.

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to present my annual report for the year 1945.

HOUSING.

During the year, building operations were still further restricted, and under the Control of Civil Building—Defence Regulation 56A, the power to grant licences for works exceeding £10 but not exceeding (a) £100 for repairs to houses or other works, (b) £1,200 for the erection of new houses, (c) £1,000 for the provision of additional accommodation in connection with an existing house, was delegated by the the Ministry of Works to Local Authorities.

Licence applications received totalled 211, of which 3 were refused. 8 licences were in respect of new houses.

There were 3 new houses erected during the year, plans submitted for approval under the Council's Building Byelaws totalling 85, of which 1 was refused.

Under the Town Planning Scheme, 72 Interim Development Permission Certificates and 1 Refusal Certificate were issued.

The standard of existing housing accommodation continues to deteriorate. Survey of all houses in the district was commenced as recommended by the Hobhouse Report on Rural Housing, and required by the Ministry of Health. This work has been seriously handicapped owing to shortage of staff, and to the work entailed in the verification of applications for Civil Building Licences.

From these figures it will be appreciated that, when circumstances permit, considerable activity in demolition of unfit houses and consequent rehousing of persons so displaced will be necessary, coupled with the requisite steps for the repair of houses not at present fit in all respects. Whilst the need for this is extremely urgent, the shortage of labour and materials at present obtaining makes improvement practically an impossibility.

Plans were approved for the erection of 60 new permanent Council houses, 40 new temporary Council houses, 22 Swedish timber houses, and 22 new houses by private enterprise.

WATER SUPPLIES.

73 samples of water from piped supplies were taken during the year, of which 55 were satisfactory, 13 were not quite satisfactory, and 5 were unsatisfactory.

The quality of the water supplied can be considered fairly satisfactory as the unsatisfactory samples were the result of percolation of surface water to the springs after heavy rains. Subsequent samples have proved satisfactory.

There is a serious shortage of water in the district due to (1) the reduction of yield from underground sources and (2) the increase in the demand for water for agricultural land and premises.

It is essential that the Council now proceed with the proposed comprehensive scheme of water supply, to enable the increased demand for agricultural purposes, new Housing Schemes, and domestic consumption due to the installation of modern sanitary appliances in existing houses, to be satisfied.

The temporary supply of water was brought into operation from the borehole at Watercombe. The water is pumped through a 2,220 yds. 4in. pumping main into the 6in. main from the Odcombe source.

SEWERAGE AND SEWAGE DISPOSAL.

Owing to the continued shortage of suitable labour the maintenance of Sewage Disposal Works has not always been satisfactory. Moreover, a number of the works are badly overloaded and considerable extensions will be necessary.

In the parishes of Stoke-under-Ham, South Petherton, Martock and Montacute, reconstruction of the Sewage Disposal Works must be carried out as soon as the required labour and materials are available.

Sewers and Sewage Disposal Works are an urgent necessity in the following parishes, viz.:

Mudford, East Coker, West Coker, Haselbury Plucknett, Ash, Tintinhull, Barwick, Chiselborough, Norton-sub-Hamdon, West Chinnock, Ilchester, Marston Magna, Rimpton, Odcombe, Chilthorne Domer, Hardington Mandeville, Long Load, West Camel, and Yeovil Marsh.

SLAUGHTERHOUSES.

No slaughtering has occurred within the district during the year except under licence from the Ministry of Food for the sole consumption of the owner, and Centralised Slaugtering outside the district has continued.

Applications were received, and licences renewed in respect of 15 private slaughterhouses.

FACTORIES AND WORKSHOPS.

All are in fairly satisfactory condition.

There are 20 Bakehouses in the district.

An application for a Certificate as to means of escape in case of fire in accordance with the requirements of the Factory Act, 1937, was granted.

COWSHEDS AND DAIRIES.

The number of producers of milk on the register is 421, of which 48 were Accredited and 40 Tuberculin Tested Milk producers. One of the latter holds a Pasteuriser's Licence. Consequent upon unsatisfactory reports upon samples taken, 2 Accredited and 3 Tuberculin Tested Milk Licences were suspended by the County Council during the year.

REFUSE COLLECTION AND SALVAGE.

The Refuse Collection and Salvage schemes continue in operation, but the amount of salvageable materials collected has considerably decreased. With the cessation of hostilities came the inevitable aftermath of war, namely the public apathy relating to all the essentials of war. This apathy is badly misplaced in that salvage is still completely necessary in order to supply commodities which will remain in short supply for some time to come.

RODENT CONTROL.

The campaign against rats inaugurated during 1944 was continued, with very satisfactory results. In addition to the Council's undertakings, 201 investigations were made and 55 infestations on private premises were dealt with.

A total of 826 bodies was recovered, with an estimated total kill of 2,355.
