TO THE CHAIRMAN AND COUNCILLORS of YEOVIL RURAL DISTRICT COUNCIL.

Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present the Annual Report for the year 1948.

VITAL STATISTICS.

The number of births during the year under review shows an appreciable decline as compared with 1947, the figures being 324 as compared with 382. This decrease is reflected in the birth rate which is 17.3 as compared with 21.71 for 1947.

The Infantile Mortality rate was 24.7 as compared with 34 per 1,000 for England and Wales.

The Illegitimate Birth rate again shows a decline, the rate for 1948 being 37 as compared with 47.3 for the previous year.

The Crude Death rate for the year was 10.3 as compared with 13.42 for the year 1948.

HOUSING.

Attention was drawn in my previous annual report to the unsatisfactory rate of the progress of building. The Sanitary Inspector has referred in his report to the difficulties which face the authority in providing houses, the lack of which the authority is fully cognisant. Despite the efforts which have been made, it must be recorded that the number of houses provided during the year was less than in 1947, the figures being:—

It will also be noted that the survey of houses, as recommended by the Hobhouse Report, shows that the number of unfit houses to date is 273; the Sanitary Inspector has reported that the present rate of building is little more than equal to the number of unfit houses which are falling into disuse. If I appear to be over-stressing facts of which the authority are aware, it is because I regard adequate housing, which includes a satisfactory water supply and sewage, as a major factor in the promotion of the good health of the community.

NATIONAL ASSISTANCE ACT.

During the year the responsibility for the administration of Section 47 of the above Act was placed on the authority, and two cases were dealt with. The purpose of this Section is to secure the necessary care and attention for people, who by reason of grave chronic disease or other disability, are living under insanitary conditions and are not able to look after themselves or are not looked after by other persons. The procedure to be followed involves the authority applying to a court of summary jurisdiction for the necessary order which is valid for a maximum period of three months. procedure is somewhat lengthy so that there may be an interval of 4-6 weeks from the date when grounds for action are noted to the date at which the action is implemented. It is suggested that a more expeditious method would be that in urgent cases the authority be authorised to make the necessary arrangements either with or without a magistrate being consulted, the order to be a temporary one only, the circumstances being reviewed at the next court of summary jurisdiction when the order could be confirmed or cancelled.

WATER SUPPLY AND SEWAGE.

The necessity for an improved water supply becomes more urgent and considerable progress in the preliminary planning has taken place. The provision of adequate sewage arrangements is receiving the consideration of the appropriate committee and details of the progress made is recorded in the Sanitary Inspector's report.

INFECTIOUS DISEASES.

In general, the health of the community has been satisfactory, there being no epidemics of any infectious diseases. There was a slight increase in the number of new cases of tuberculosis notified, 16 cases being notified as compared with 13 for the previous year. In connection with tuberculosis, a mass radiography unit visited Yeovil in April and October. The general public and certain factories were notified by public advertisements and by letter. It is hoped to extend this service in 1949.

I wish to record my appreciation of the help and support given me in the carrying out of my official duties by the members of the Council, of the helpful co-operation received from the staff of the County Health Department and to express my appreciation of the work carried out by the members of the staff.

SANITARY INSPECTOR'S REPORT, 1948.

To the Chairman and Members of the Yeovil Rural District Council.

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to present my annual report for the year 1948.

HOUSING.

The improvement in the standard of housing accommodation in the district cannot be achieved until a much greater number of new permanent houses can be erected each year. The present rate of building continues to be little more than equal to the number of unfit houses which are falling into disuse.

Every effort to improve the position has been made by the Council's Housing Committee, but they are restricted in their activities by the small number of new permanent houses allocated to the district and by the numerous controls and restrictions which have to be surmounted, with a substantial loss of time and energy, before one of the houses already allocated can be built.

These figures, together with the fact that there are approximately 900 applicants for new houses on the file, give some indication of the problem confronting the Council's Housing Committee, particularly during this period when—in spite of every effort on their part—so little progress is made in the provision of permanent housing accommodation.

BUILDING LICENSING.

The powers delegated to Local Authorities by the Minister of Works under the control of Civil Building (Defence Regulation 56A) have been further modified. In particular, mention is made of the raising of the "free limit" to £100 per house on the 1st July, which resulted in a substantial decrease in the number of licence applications to be dealt with, as compared with previous years.

The centralised slaughtering of animals outside the district has continued.

16 licences in respect of private slaughterhouses were renewed and one new licence was granted during the year.

FACTORIES AND WORKSHOPS.

These are in a fairly satisfactory condition.

There are 20 Bakehouses in the District.

COWSHEDS AND DAIRIES.

Registered producers of milk numbered 459, of which 49 were producers of Accredited and 57 Tuberculin Tested Milk.

The campaign against rats was continued with good results.

33 infestations were dealt with on business premises.

76 infestations were dealt with on private premises.

In addition, 72 infestations on the Local Authority's surface properties—e.g. Council Houses, Sewage Disposal Works, Refuse Tips—were successfully dealt with.

Sewers were test baited and found generally to be free from infestation.

861 dead rats were recovered during the year, with an estimated total kill of 3,875 rats.
