

Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in presenting to you the Annual Report for the Year, 1944. This abridged Report is again in accordance with the recommendations of the Ministry.

The health of the Borough has been good. During April a large proportion of the population was vaccinated as a result of a case of Smallpox which occurred in the area.

The birth rate has again risen and is the highest since 1921.

There was a rise in the death rate during the year—113 deaths occurred in persons over 70 years old.

There was a rise also in the infantile mortality rate: the causes of death are tabulated.

I wish to thank all the members of the staff for their support and assistance.

It is to be noted that no cases of Diphtheria occurred during the year.

Immunisation against Diphtheria of Infants and School Children was continued throughout the year at the Public Health Clinic.

VACCINATION.

A teacher at one of the Yeovil Schools developed small-pox in April, and as a result a large proportion of the population was vaccinated.—A great number were cases of primary vaccination. No cases of post-vaccinal encephalitis occurred and no further case of small-pox developed.

The number of respiratory cases notified is 3 in excess, and non respiratory 2 in excess of those notified in 1943.

SCABIES.

During the year 241 cases in 150 families were known to have occurred. The majority of these cases were treated at the Public Health Clinic.

When a child is discovered to have Scabies or if a doctor sends a patient to the Clinic for the treatment of Scabies, a letter is sent to the head of the family (under the Scabies Order 1939) informing him or her that all members of the Household, including lodgers, must present themselves for examination. Generally, all contacts are seen before treatment of the original case is begun.

HEAD LICE.

This condition is now treated with lethane at the Clinic. It has been found that in the schools there are certain families, though small in number, whose members are habitually infested and who are the chief source of trouble to others.

MATERNITY AND CHILD WELFARE.

Institutional Provisions.

The Maternity Home provides accommodation for 11 mothers. This number is quite inadequate for the needs of the Borough and rural area. The difficulties of providing beds for expectant mothers has become greater and is partly due to the fact that many of them are living in other peoples homes and partly to the impossibility of obtaining home help. Patients have been sent to various other homes—Tetton Hall, Taunton, Bridgwater, Crewkerne, Chard and the Yeatman, Sherborne. Difficulty has been experienced in obtaining midwives and domestic staff for the Home.

District Midwifery.

The Maternity and Child Welfare Committee, having adopted the Rushcliffe Scheme, appointed a fourth midwife in October and the domicillary midwifery is now adequately provided for in regard to the nursing side. The shortage of domestic help remains very acute and often makes the position extremely difficult, both for a mother having her confinement at home, and the mother who enters a Maternity Home and needs someone to look after the rest of the family while she is away.

INFANT LIFE PROTECTION.

The number of foster-children on the register was 3, and the number of registered foster-mothers 3.

Visits are paid regularly by the Health Visitors

to see that the children are well cared for.

Visits were made to the schools in the town where children under 9 years of age are boarded.

The Nurseries were well attended and the average daily attendance was as follows:

ANTE-NATAL CLINIC.

This was well attended during the year. There was again an increase in the number of women attending Ante-Natal and Post-Natal Clinics, and more of them have taken advantage of the scheme whereby they can obtain dental treatment and dentures at reduced cost.

REPORT

SANITARY INSPECTOR For the Year 1944.

To the Chairman and Members of the Health and Sanitary Committee:

Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present my first annual report since my appointment as Chief Sanitary Inspector, following the retirement of Mr. F. Whalley after nearly 35 years service with the Corporation. In May, Mr. W. E. Jones of Thedwastre Rural District Council, was appointed Additional Sanitary Inspector.

HOUSING.

OVERCROWDING.

The general positition has changed little since last year. A large number of houses in the Borough are still occupied by members of more than one family.

There are at present well over 1,000 applicants for Council houses.

FITNESS OF HOUSES.

Delapidation increases as time goes on, especially in regard to the internal decoration of houses. Because of the widespread call for the repair of war damaged houses elsewhere, it has been very difficult to get even such urgent jobs as choked drains cleared, and much time elapses before ordinary repairs can be commenced.

During the year, four houses, badly damaged by enemy action, were rebuilt.

MEAT INSPECTION.

During the year a careful inspection of all home killed meat was carried out at the Ministry of Food controlled slaughterhouses in Yeovil. The premises in use are the same as were taken over at the beginning of the war and considering the amount of killing done in the course of I2 months, have been kept going reasonably satisfactory, especially with regard to general cleanliness.
