To the Chairman and Members of the St. Albans Rural District Council.

GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to present to you my report for the past year, as Medical Officer of Health for the District over which you preside.

I.-AREA AND POPULATION.

The total area of the District comprises 37,981 acres, having a population, according to the Census of 1901, of 12,264 persons, and estimated up to the end of 1909 as 17,333 persons, distributed amongst seven "parishes" or "localities," as indicated in the following tables.

In order to estimate the population of this locality, it has been my custom to deduct the deaths from the births during the year, and to add the difference to the estimated population for the previous year. I have again adopted this method in all districts except St. Peters Rural; but there, owing to the rapid development of that portion of the District known as Fleetville, this calculation would fall very short of the mark. I have, therefore, estimated the population of this district by assuming that the average number of persons per house inhabited is 4, and multiplying the number of inhabited houses by that figure; to this I have added 2,000 to include the inmates and staff living in the Herts County Asylum and the Middlesex County Asylum.

The average number of persons per acre is 45.

The number of inhabited houses in the District is 3,750, which, with a population of 17,333, gives the average number of persons per house as 4.6.

In the year 1908 the number of inhabited houses in the District was 3,684.

The natural increase during the year has been 289 births over deaths, as shown in the following table:—

In the year 1908 the excess of births over deaths was 295.

II.—VITAL STATISTICS.

The total number of Births registered in the District during the year was 432, composed of 226 males and 206 females. This gives a birth rate of 28.17 per 1,000 population.

The Birth rate for the year 1908 was 30.07.

The number of Deaths registered in the District during the year was 283.

Asylum, and 46 at the Hertfordshire County Asylum, making a total of 162. With the exception of 4, all of these deaths were of non-residents, and must therefore be deducted in order to determine the true death-rate. 18 residents were registered as having died outside the District, 11 of which took place at the Workhouse, and 7 at the Hospital.

Deducting, therefore, the 158 and adding the 18, we get the total number of deaths belonging to the District as 143.

This gives the true Death rate for the District as 9.32.

The Death rate in this District for the year 1908 was 13.3.

The number of Deaths of infants under 1 year of age was 17, which gives a Death rate of 39.3 per 1,000 births registered.

The Death rate for the year 1908 was 85.15.

For the purposes of this table the population of St. Peter's Rural does not include the inmates of the two Asylums, which is estimated at 2,000.

III.—INFECTIOUS DISEASES.

Under the Infectious Diseases Notification Act, 81 cases of Infectious Diseases have been notified to me as follows:—

- 31 Scarlet Fever (28 of which were removed to the Sisters' Hospital).
- 7 Erysipelas.
- 39 Diptheria.
- 4 Enteric Fever (all of which were in Middlesex County Asylum).

There were were no cases of Small-pox.

Under the Public Health (Tuberculosis) Regulations, 1908, which came into force on January 1st, 1909, I have received 7 Notifications—6 notifications on Form B, and 1 on Form D.

The appended Tables show the number of cases of each particular disease notified in the whole District, together with the ages at which it occurred. Also the total number notified in each locality, and the number of cases removed to the Sisters' Hospital.

Passing on to a detailed statement as to each locality, I have to report as follows:—

HARPENDEN RURAL.

Area in acres, 3,453. Population, 362. Average number of persons per acre, ·1. Number of inhabited houses, 77. Average number of persons per house, 4·7. Births, male 2, female 1; total, 3. Deaths 5, giving rate per 1,000 population of 8·28 for the former, and 13·8 for the latter. Deaths under 1 year of age, 0.

No cases of Infectious Diseases were notified to me during the year.

The number of cowsheds and dairies registered is 0.

The Sewerage System in this District consists almost entirely of dumb-wells, which are emptied, as necessity arises, by the occupiers of the houses to which they belong.

A few isolated cottages throw their slop-water on to the ground. There is no scheme for collection of house refuse or closets in this District, and I do not consider one is necessary.

Part of the District obtains its water from wells, the remainder receives its supply from the Harpenden Water Works Company. The District is very scattered, and this system is quite satisfactory.

REDBOURN.

Area in acres. 4,260. Population, 2,040. Average number of persons per acre, 47. Number of inhabited houses, 505. Average number of persons per house, 4.03. Births, male 37, female 28; total, 65. Deaths 41, giving rate per 1,000 population of 31.86 for the former, and 15.14 for the latter. Deaths under 1 year of age, 7.

23 cases of Infectious Diseases were notified to me during the year: 2 Scarlet Fever, 19 Diphtheria, and 2 Erysipelas.

The number of dairies and cowsheds registered is 7.

The Sewerage Scheme in this District consists of dumbwells, which are cleaned out once each week by a man employed for the purpose.

The Scheme is a satisfactory one, though there have been complaints from time to time of the way the work has been carried out by the contractor, and this matter is receiving the attention of the Council.

Most of the houses have ash-bins and refuse pails, which are collected each week.

Each house or cottage has an earth-closet.

The water supply is obtained from wells and from pumps sunk by this Council.

ST. MICHAELS RURAL.

Area in acres, 6,079. Population, 854. Average number of persons per acre, ·14. Number of inhabited houses, 195. Average number of persons per house, 4·37. Births, male 10, female 9; total, 19. Deaths 6, giving rate per 1,000 population of 22·13 for the former and 7·02 for the latter. Deaths under 1 year of age, 0.

1 case of Diphtheria was notified to me during the year.

The number of dairies and cowsheds registered is 5.

The Sewerage System in this District consists of dumbwells, which are emptied, as necessity arises, by the occupiers of the houses to which they belong.

There are a few isolated cottages, the occupiers of which throw their slop-water on to the ground.

There is no system of collection of house refuse, and one is not required.

The water supply is from wells.

The System works satisfactorily.

ST. PETERS RURAL.

Area in acres, 5,976. Population, 5,712. Average number of persons per acre, 95. Number of inhabited houses, 1,428. Average number of persons per house, 4. Births, male 92, female 90; total, 182. Deaths 35, giving rate per 1,000 population of 31.86 for the former and 6.12 for the latter. Deaths under 1 year of age, 6.

40 cases of Infectious Diseases were notified to me during the year: 7 Diphtheria, 5 Erysipelas, 24 Scarlet Fever, and 4 Enteric Fever.

The number of dairies and cowsheds registered is 10.

I.—Camp Ward.

The Sewerage Scheme in this part consists of dumb-wells, which are emptied from time to time by the owners, who have

the opportunity of hiring a vacuum pump and engine, the property of this Council, the work being carried out by men in the employ of this Council. This vacuum pump works well, and is a great success.

There are a few earth-closets, but nearly every house has its own water-closet.

The house refuse is removed by contract with this Council and taken to the Destructor provided by the Electric Supply Company, and though we get a few complaints, which is only natural, the System, on the whole, is satisfactorily carried out.

The water supply is obtained from the St. Albans Waterworks Company's mains.

The Council are continuing their policy of laying sewers in private streets, in order to obtain powers to make up roads under the Private Street Works Act, 1892. These sewers are not in use at present, but will form part of the Scheme which will eventually be adopted. No land for a Sewage Outfall has been procured, but it will be practicable to connect the sewers already laid with the main sewer in whatever direction it should be decided to take it.

The following private streets are now made up and paved, viz.:—

Harlesden, Burnham, Sandfield, Glenferrie, Blandford, Arthur, Tess, Princes, Cavendish, Albion, and Blenheim Roads.

There are several other roads in this neighbourhood which I should like to see made up in the near future. Not only is this necessary for the health of the District, but their present state is a hindrance to the development of the District.

In the case of the Brampton Road, which is only built on on one side, the Council have applied for partial powers to pave one side only, but the application has not up to the present been successful.

II.—Colney Heath.

The Sewerage System here consists of dumb-wells; there are a few cottages, however, the occupiers of which throw their slops on to the ground. There are both privies and earth closets.

At present there is no scheme for scavenging, and, owing to the very limited garden space of a number of cottages, the system is not satisfactory, and I should advise this Council to carefully consider if it is not practicable to arrange for a weekly collection of pail and ash-bin refuse.

The water supply is obtained from wells.

III.-London Colney.

The Sewerage System here consists of a main sewer which takes surface-water and the slop-water from most of the houses, but to which is connected the soil pipes of not more than three houses. This sewer empties itself into a brick and cement tank in a field. This tank is emptied partly by a windmill pump, and from time to time by a man appointed for the purpose.

There are both privies and earth closets.

There is no scheme for the removal of house refuse in this district.

The water supply is almost entirely from the St. Albans Waterworks mains.

This System is quite satisfactory.

IV .- Hill End Asylum.

This Institution has its own septic tank, which works most satisfactorily.

V .- Napsbury Asylum.

This Institution has its own septic tank, the effluent from which is treated by irrigation, and is in every way satisfactory.

ST. STEPHENS.

Area in acres, 7,438. Population, 1,951. Average number of persons per acre, ·26. Number of inhabited houses, 451. Average number of persons per house, 4.32. Births, male 22, female 21; total, 43. Deaths 18, giving rate per 1,000 population of 22·04 for the former and 9·2 for the latter. Deaths under 1 year of age, 1.

6 cases of Infectious Diseases were notified to me during the year: 3 Diphtheria, and 3 Scarlet Fever.

The number of dairies and cowsheds registered is 8.

The Sewerage System consists of dumb-wells, which are emptied by their owners.

There are both privies and earth closets. The number of the former, however, is rapidly diminishing. The contents of the earth closets and ash-bins in Park Street and Frogmore are collected by contract with this Council.

The water supply is obtained from wells and from the St. Albans Waterworks Company.

It would be satisfactory if arrangement could be made with this Company to extend their mains up Branch Road.

SANDRIDGE RURAL.

Area in acres, 5,635. Population, 1,704. Average number of persons per acre, ·3. Number of inhabited houses, 410. Average number of persons per house, 4·15. Births, male 27, female 28; total, 55. Deaths 16, giving rate per 1,000 population of 32·2 for the former and 9·38 for the latter. Deaths under 1 year of age, 1.

7 cases of Infectious Diseases were notified to me during the year: 5 Diphtheria, and 2 Scarlet Fever.

The number of dairies and cowsheds registered is 5.

The Sewerage System here consists of dumb-wells, which

are emptied by the owners, and a sewer which runs through the village and empties itself into a ditch.

Collection of house refuse is carried on by contract in the Bernards Heath part of the District, but there is no system for collection of pail closets in any part of the District.

The water supply is obtained from wells and the St. Albans Waterworks Company.

WHEATHAMPSTEAD.

Area in acres, 5,140. Population, 2,710. Average number of persons per acre, .52. Number of inhabited houses, 684. Average number of persons per house, 3.96. Births, male 36, female 29: total 65. Deaths 22, giving rate per 1,000 population of 23.98 for the former and 8.1 for the latter. Deaths under 1 year of age, 2.

4 cases of Diphtheria were notified to me during the year.

The number of dairies and cowsheds registered is 9.

- I. Wheathampstead Village has a main sewer which takes the surface-water, slops, and soil from most of the houses, which is eventually treated by irrigation.
- II. New Marford. The sewerage system is by dumb-wells, but owing to the close proximity of the cottages to one another and to the low-lying position in which this district is situated, the ground is becoming saturated with sewage, and the condition is far from satisfactory.
- III. The sewerage in *Gustard Wood* and other parts of the district is by means of dumb-wells, and works quite satisfactorily.

There is no scheme for scavenging in any part of the district, and no complaints are received.

The water supply is from wells.

PREVENTIVE MEASURES.

The Sisters' Hospital, with an accommodation of 30 beds, which we share with the Urban Authorities of St. Albans and Harpenden, has provided ample accommodation for all the Scarlet Fever cases.

With regard to Isolation Accommodation for Small Pox, Diphtheria, and Typhoid Fever, I regret to say that I cannot do otherwise than report in the same words as I did last year and the year before, which is as follows:—

"We are still without any accommodation for Small Pox, Diphtheria, or Typhoid Fever."

The plans for a Diphtheria Hospital, to be erected on the site adjoining the Sisters' Hospital, have been prepared and approved both by the Local Authorities and the Local Government Board, but as yet no building has been commenced.

The plans for a Small Pox Hospital have been prepared and approved both by the Local Authorities and the Local Government Board, and the building is now in course of erection.

Arrangements are made by this Council for swabs of doubtful cases of Diphtheria (in suitable cases) to be examined at the Clinical Research Association, at the expense of this Council.

The permission of the Local Government Board has been obtained to pay for antitoxin, and this Council has given me authority to supply, at their cost, antitoxin in all suitable cases.

At the Sisters' Hospital is a Thresh's steam disinfector where bedding and clothes may be disinfected. This is practically always done in cases of Scarlet Fever, Small Pox, etc., and frequently done after such illnesses as consumption and cancer. Formaldehyde is the disinfectant almost universally used in this district, but in addition every room is thoroughly cleansed with soap and water and fresh air, and where necessary re-whitewashed and papered.

SCHOOL CLOSURE.

Owing to an outbreak of Scarlet Fever, the London Colney Schools were closed from March 5th to March 22nd inclusive, and owing to an outbreak of Measles they were again closed from July 19th to August 2nd, and owing to an outbreak of Measles the Kinsbourne Green School was closed from Feb. 25th to March 22nd.

These are all regularly inspected, both by the Veterinary Inspector and Sanitary Inspector, and at times by myself.

Appended are the reports of the Inspector of Nuisances and Veterinary Inspector.

There are no common lodging-houses in the district.

I am very much indebted to Mr. Hieatt (Deputy Clerk to this Council) for the following schedule of adoptive Acts and Urban Powers in force in this district, together with a brief description of their provisions. There is no overcrowding in any Workshop in the District, nearly all provide 500 c.f. air space, and many provide much more.

There are no wholesale Bakehouses in the District.

Under the Factories and Workshops Act, 1901, no underground Bakehouse must be used after January 1st, 1904, without written permission of the Sanitary Authorities.

There is only one such underground Bakehouse in the District, which is in Wheathampstead Parish, and this has received the necessary permission of this Council.

There are 5 Factories and 1 Workshop in this District which employ more than 40 persons.

They are situated as follows:-

St. Peters, 3 Factories. Sandridge, 1 Factory. Redbourn, 1 Factory. Redbourn, 1 Workshop.

These all have adequate means of escape from fire.

There are no outworkers of the specified classes in this District.

Mr. Davey, the new Sanitary Inspector, commenced his duties in May, 1909. I am glad to be able to report that he has carried out his duties to my entire satisfaction.

My thanks are due to him and the other officers of this Council for their valuable assistance, and to you gentlemen for the very courteous way in which you have always treated me.

I beg to submit to you my Report dealing with Sanitary work in the Rural District of St. Albans, from May 1st, 1909, to the end of the year.

NUISANCES.

Both verbal and written complaints have received my early attention, and by periodical visits to all parts of the district, I have kept myself fairly well acquainted with nuisances arising from time to time. 296 Inspections were made, and 969 Reinspections.

INFECTIOUS DISEASE.

Since taking up my duties as Inspector in this District (May 1st, 1909), 25 cases of Infectious Disease have been notified. These cases were visited and particulars obtained in accordance with my instructions from the Medical Officer of Health (Dr. May).

Disinfections were carried out and disinfectants supplied when necessary.

FACTORIES AND WORKSHOPS.

The whole of the Factories and Workshops were visited. Limewashing and cleansing was carried out where necessary, and several minor sanitary improvements were effected.

Generally, with regard to cleanliness, lighting, ventilation and air space, the Factories and Workshops are in a satisfactory condition.

DAIRIES AND COWSHEDS.

There are now 44 Dairies and Cowsheds on the register. These have all been inspected. In five cases the method of drainage from the Cowsheds, is not all that I should like to see, but in no case could I describe it as bad. The remaining 39 are very well drained. I make it my business to see that all Dairies and Cowsheds are regularly and thoroughly cleansed and limewashed.

OFFICE WORK.

In connection with the business of my department, 328 letters and 64 preliminary notices were issued, and 4 statutory notices were served.

No legal proceedings were taken.

VETERINARY INSPECTOR'S REPORT.

To the Chairman and Members of the St. Albans Rural District Council.

GENTLEMEN,

I have much pleasure in presenting my report on the cows and cowsheds in your district for the year ending December 31st, 1909. There are on the register 43 cowsheds containing 530 cows, the milk from which is nearly all supplied in the district as shown in the following table:—

All these have been regularly visited. The cowsheds are all well kept in a clean condition and well ventilated.

There has been more trouble this year in keeping the teats and udders clean, owing to the wet season, but the attendants have been very attentive and painstaking in their work.

During the past year I have found 4 cases of general tuberculosis and three cases of tuberculosis of the udder, all of which cases the milk has not been used again.

There has been one outbreak of anthrax, and two carcases were cremated according to order.

There was one case of glanders which was destroyed.
