#### Comment on Vital Statistics

The total of live births for the past year (1,277) gives a rate of 27.3 per 1,000, more than one and a half times the national rate.

The stillbirth and infant mortality rates are again seen to compare favourably with the national rates. Of the 25 infant deaths under 1 year 17 occurred before the end of the first week from birth.

The local death rate for the year (4.1) against the national rate (11.9) clearly indicates the low proportion of elderly residents in a new town; application of the supplied comparability factor of 2.41 gives a "standardised" death rate of 9.9.

The estimated mid-year population for 1962 of 46,710 gives an annual increase of 3,100 but continued inward migration again makes such a figure out of date.

Deaths from cancer (all sites) gives the favourable figure of 31, of which 11 (9 males and 2 females) were from cancer of lung or bronchus. Local deaths from motor vehicle accidents numbered 10 (8 males and 2 females) while all other accidents numbered 5 (1 male and 4 females).

There were no local deaths ascribed to any acute infectious disease and from tuberculosis one single (male) death was recorded.

## SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA & INSPECTION & SUPERVISION OF FOOD

Full reports on the above are contained in the attached report of your Chief Public Health Inspector.

#### SECTION F

#### PREVALENCE OF, AND CONTROL OVER, INFECTIOUS AND OTHER DISEASES

For the year 1962 notifications of acute infectious diseases (after correction) were: Measles 753, Scarlet fever 28, Dysentery 8, Food Poisoning 7, Whooping cough 1, Puerperal pyrexia 4 and Acute poliomyelitis (paralytic) 2.

Measles and Scarlet fever were both most prevalent in the last quarter.

A small outbreak of <u>Dysentery</u> connected with one infant school in the second quarter was fully investigated and brought under control.

Poliomyelitis - The two cases locally notified, aged 3 and 6 years, were widely separated in time and location. The six year old boy, with a good vaccination history, made a complete recovery; the three year old child, whose vaccination history recorded defaulting after one dose, made an incomplete recovery and is under orthopaedic treatment for residual paralysis of the left lower limb. In both cases type I Virus was isolated from the patients.

Food poisoning - Apart from one family group of three, where no agent or vehicle was identified, cases notified were single and unconnected. In one adult Salmonella Typhi-murium was isolated but no source of infection traced; in another isolated Staphylococcus Type 53 was a possible agent.

One other family group of three had a family infection (Salmonella Cerro and Salmonella Reading combined) but the illness records suggested the transmission was not food-born.

#### VACCINATION AGAINST SMALLPOX

During the early Spring months the Bradford outbreak had considerable impact in North Herts, with follow-up of remote contacts, a general increased acceptance of primary vaccination, and the special protection of health service personnel likely to make the first contact with any introduction of that disease into the area. Public concern and alarm also lead to a great volume of work connected with certificates for persons proceeding abroad.

#### IMMUNISATION

The standard use of a TRIPLE antigen - against diphtheria, whooping cough and tetanus - continues available for infants from both welfare centres and practitioners, with a generally high rate of acceptance and remarkable freedom from complaints of reaction. A "booster" dose against diphtheria and tetanus - omitting the whooping cough fraction - is offered at the time of infant school entry and widely accepted.

Against anterior poliomyelitis, in the early summer the Ministry of Health offer of one dose of ORAL (SABIN) vaccine was made available to all children of primary school age previously vaccinated with SALK vaccine, issued in schools on a lump of sugar. Since then the ORAL vaccine, in 3 doses at 4 - 6 weeks interval, has been almost generally adopted for infant immunisation in North Herts, to give a probably more lasting and permanent type of immunity than the previous injections of SALK vaccine. Essentually an attenuated living vaccine given by mouth has replaced a killed virus given by injection.

Comment:

For the year new notifications of 10 respiratory and 3 non-respiratory cases were again fairly low. On a considerably larger population the respiratory total is identical with that for the previous year, half of which is formed by a group of middle aged persons which continue to be picked up largely by the continued regular local availability of mass radiography.

In addition inward transfers to the local register from other districts numbered 24 respiratory cases.

The one single death credited to the district was from a non-respiratory form of disease.

In conclusion, I would acknowledge having received every help during the year from your chief officers; particularly I would acknowledge the most valuable assistance from your Chief Public Health Inspector, Mr. R. V. Lamey, who is responsible for the compilation of the Sanitary sections of this report.

To the Chairman and Members of the Stevenage Urban District Council.

I have pleasure in presenting my report for the year ending 31st December, 1962.

#### SECTION C

#### SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA

#### i) Water Supply

The Lee Valley Water Company are the water undertakers for the area.

The water supply is regularly sampled by your officers, and during the year, I submitted 140 samples to the Public Health Laboratory Service at Luton for bacteriological examination - all proved satisfactory. 13 chemical samples taken by the Water Authority also proved satisfactory. In addition, sampling of raw water supplies is regularly undertaken by the Water Authority for bacteriological examination and chemical analysis.

An adequate supply of water throughout the area is being maintained. Only five houses in the Urban District obtain their water from private wells.

SWIMMING POOL - On the 13th October, 1962, the Council opened their new Swimming Pool at St. George's Way. It comprises of a main pool 110 ft. long x 42 ft. wide and a training pool 42 ft. x 15 ft. The purification system includes a horizontal pressure filter, with sand and quartz media, through which the whole of the water passes every 4 hours. The capacity of the pool is approx. 220,000 gallons of water, which is heated and aerated during circulation, and chlorinated by the break point system.

The Swimming Bath waters are regularly sampled for bacteriological examination and chemical analysis by my Department.

#### ii) Sewage Disposal

All main foul water drainage from the town is now dealt with at the Ryemead Sewage Works at Hertford. Few properties remain connected to cesspools or septic tank installations, and these will further decrease as extensions of the main sewerage systems take place.

#### iii) Refuse Collection

The Public Cleansing Services are controlled by the Council's Surveyor. No tipping is carried out in the town, all refuse being transported to a tip outside the Urban District boundaries. The use of the tip at Holwell, near Hitchin, has been discontinued, and refuse is now transported approximately 11 miles to a tip at Cole Green, Welwyn Garden City.

The Council operates a Waste Paper and Trade Refuse Collection Service.

#### iv) Rodent Control

A 5-cwt. motor van has now been purchased by the Council for the use of the Rodent Operator, and this has enabled him to deal adequately with the increasing number of complaints that have been made.

#### v) Open Air Market

The Council operate a Friday and Saturday Open Air Market in the New Town Centre. No open food, other than fruit or vegetables, is permitted to be sold from the stalls; meat, fish, shell fish, fried fish, ice cream and refreshments may be obtained from five mobile shops, which all satisfy the requirements of the Food Hygiene Regulations.

Hot and cold water supplies, together with sinks, are provided for the washing of stallholders' equipment, and a new public convenience, with hot and cold washing facilities and hand drying equipment, is also available to stallholders.

The market is administered by the Public Health Department.

#### vi) Knackers Yard

There is one licensed Knackers Yard in the town. This is of model design and is maintained in a satisfactory condition. The premises are regularly inspected.

#### vii) Petroleum Installations

49 licences for the storage of Petroleum and Petroleum Mixtures have been issued during the year. 2 new petroleum stores and 4 underground installations have been constructed in an approved manner, and air pressure tests on tanks and fuel lines have proved satisfactory.

#### (b) Milk and Dairies Regulations, 1949/54

There are no registered dairies within the town. Licences have been granted to 26 dealers and 2 distributors, in accordance with the provisions of these Regulations.

#### iii) Inspection of Registered Food Premises

Regular visits were made to premises registered for the sale of Ice Cream and the preparation or manufacture of sausages and other foods intended for sale. Those premises selling Ice Cream, but excluded from registration under the Food and Drugs Act, were also inspected.

#### iv) Disposal of Condemned Food

During the year, apart from meat condemned at the private slaughterhouse, 3-tons 7-cwts. O-qrs. 15-lbs.  $5\frac{1}{2}$ -ozs. of foodstuffs were condemned at various food premises in the town. All condemned food is stained with a naphthalene dye and removed from the food shops by the Council's Refuse Collection Service; strict control is exercised over its disposal.

#### v) Ice Cream Heat Treatment Regulations

A regular check is made of the many Ice Cream vendors operating within the town. There are no manufacturers of Ice Cream in Stevenage.

#### vii) Slaughterhouse and Meat Inspection

There is one private Slaughterhouse in the town, and 12 persons are licensed by the Council to act as Slaughtermen.

There has again been a significant increase in the number of cattle slaughtered - 1,849 this year, as against 1,571 for 1961.

The following breakdown of the totals above, showing the various numbers of the different types of animals slaughtered over the last five years (overleaf), will perhaps more clearly indicate the considerable amount of time spent in maintaining 100% meat inspection, and much of this work still regrettably has to be performed after normal office hours and on Saturdays and Sundays. The Council are, I know, justifiably proud of the fact that they have, since the re-introduction of private slaughtering in 1954, always maintained 100% meat inspection of all animals slaughtered within the town.
