

#### Gratuitous Medical Relief.

This District is well served with Institutions where Medical Relief may be obtained.

The Stourbridge Dispensary, established in 1832, is in Worcester Street, and has a Resident Medical Officer-

Corbett Hospital, Amblecote, is near the Borough Boundary, and is supported by this and surrounding districts. The Birmingham and Dudley Hospitals are also easily accessible.

## SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE DISTRICT. Water Supply.

This is adequate for all requirements and is pumped direct into the mains from the two deep wells which are situate at Coalbournbrook and Mill Meadow respectively, both being in Amblecote.

A Reservoir at Doctor's Hill in the Borough, serves to augment the pressure, the surplus water during the night going into the Reservoir.

The Corporation Baths and several works pump water from their own wells. There are still a few houses procuring their water supply from pump wells. These wells are kept under observation. A considerable number of the houses supplement the water supply by having rain water cisterns on their premises.

#### Rivers and Streams.

The River Stour has no pollution in the Borough, but passing through manufacturing districts before reaching here, it sometimes becomes polluted with acid and other waste, but not to any great extent.

Two streams flow through the district, both being free from pollution.

#### Drainage and Sewage.

The Town was sewered in 1887. The sewage flows by gravitation to a pumping station in the Borough and is pumped to the Stourbridge Main Drainage Boards sewage farms at Whittington, in the Rural District of Seisdon (Staffs.) where it is treated on the Broad irrigation principle.

With the exception of a few houses situate on the outskirts, all the dwelling-houses are provided with water closets and efficient drainage, the drains being intercepted from the sewers with intercepting traps. Four houses have cesspools.

#### Closet Accommodation.

The conversion of privies into water closets was practically completed in 1909. About 9 cottages and farmhouses together with one brickworks, on the outskirts still have privies, these houses are situate in localities where there are no sewers. Earth closets are provided at the Cemetery house and two other houses in the Borough. Previous to 1901 some slop water closets were put in, many of these have since been removed and W.C.'s with fresh water flushing apparatus put in. For a considerable time past the Town Council has required a separate W.C. for each new house and additional W.C.'s required at premises where there was one W.C. for two or more houses.

About 5 per cent. of the houses have slop water closets, including those houses where there is a fresh water W.C. inside the house and a slop W.C. outside. With the exception of the few privies mentioned, all the other houses are provided with fresh W.C.'s The Sanitary Inspector's report gives the list of conversions and additional W.C.'s since 1901.

## Scavenging.

The Scavenging is carried out by direct labour, and the refuse is destroyed at the Corporation Destructor, erected in 1904. The ashpits are emptied as required, and the contents of movable ashbins collected weekly. The contents of the very few earth closets are disposed of by the occupiers. The few privies are cleared as required and the contents buried. Four houses have cesspools, two being cleansed by the occupiers and the other two by the Town Council. The contents being spread over farm land.

Movable ashbins commenced to be substituted for ashpits in 1901, and most of the new houses erected since then are provided with movable ashbins. There are 1853 houses having movable ashbins.

#### Sanitary Inspection of District.

The report of the Sanitary Inspector follows mine and gives a detailed account of the inspection of the district.

Premises and Occupations which can be controlled by Bye-Laws or Regulations.

There are 11 premises where offensive trades are carried on, viz.: Hide and Skin Dealer 1, Tripe Boiling 3, Leather Dressing 1, Fish Frying 5 and one where Fish Frying, Tripe Boiling and Fat Melting is carried on. One Fish Frying business which had been closed for several years was re-opened during the year. Permission was given to newly-establish a fish-frying business, but it was not commenced. Two applications for the establishment of a fish-frying business were refused during the year.

There is only one house let in lodgings. There are no underground sleeping rooms.

#### Schools.

The water supply of all the schools is from the Water Board's Mains and is satisfactory. No schools were closed during the year. Notices are sent to the schools for the exclusion of scholars from houses where cases of infectious diseases had occurred.

#### Milk Supply.

Twenty-three persons are registered as Milk Retailers in the district, 15 of whom are Cowkeepers, the remaining 8 being Milk-sellers only. The Cowsheds and Dairies are frequently inspected.

#### Milk (Mothers and Children) Order, 1918.

The County Council being the authority under the notification of Births Acts, the Town Council does not carry out the above Order. The Town Council is desirous of having the notification of Births Acts re-transferred from the County Council so that, amongst other matters, the above Order could be administered by the Town Council.

#### Other Foods.

The Food Inspection is carried out by the Inspector of Nuisances who is a Certificated Inspector of Meat and other Foods. In the report following this is a list of the various articles of food condemned during the year.

There are 17 retailers of meat in the district. Two butchers are sausage makers. The premises are frequently inspected and are satisfactory.

A public abattoir has not been established. Slaughtering is at present done at five private slaughterhouses, and these are regularly inspected.

One carcass weighing 407lbs. was condemned for tuberculosis.

## Zymotic Diseases.

There were 16 deaths from Zymotic Diseases during the year, giving a Zymotic death-rate of 92 per 1,000 of the population.

There were three deaths, one being a boy from Oldswinford Hospital who died at the Infectious Diseases Hospital and a girl who also died at the Hospital. The other occurred in Upperswinford. The boy did not belong to this district and was a "transferable death."

Fifty-five of the cases occurred amongst the scholars of Oldswinford Hospital and were reported as follows:—February 3rd, March 13th, April 14th, May 21st, June 4th.

On the 23rd April, 1919, I inspected the Oldswinford Hospital in Company with Dr. G. H. Fosbroke (the Worcestershire M.O.H.), Dr. L. Hickey (the Medical Adviser of the Hospital) and the Sanitary Inspector.

It was found that the drainage was unsatisfactory, also the personal washing accommodation. These defects were subsequently remedied. All the boys were "swabbed" and those showing positive results were isolated and the school gradually emptied, through the boys showing negative results, being sent home. The suspected cases being kept constantly isolated and under observation.

The school was closed for about three months and since the re-opening of the school in November, no other cases were reported amongst the scholars by the end of the year.

#### Enteric Fever.

No cases were notified during the year.

#### Venereal Disease.

Two lectures at Works in the Borough and a lecture at the Brotherhood Meeting were held under the auspices of the Worcestershire County Council.

#### Maternity and Child Welfare.

This work is carried out by a Voluntary Organisation, having premises at No. 24, New Road.

Some time ago this Town Council applied unsuccessfully to the Local Government Board to have the Notification of Births' Act re-transferred from the Worcestershire County Council, I consider it is desirable that this Act should be administered locally in conjunction with the local Voluntary Organisation.

#### Sanitary Administration.

The Sanitary Staff consists of the Inspector of Nuisances and an Assistant.

The Stourbridge and Halesowen Joint Infectious Diseases Isolation Hospital at Hayley Green is the Infectious Diseases Isolation Hospital, and there is also provision for isolation of smallpox cases. The accommodation has been found to be adequate. During 1919, only 18 cases were sent there from this Borough. The Hospital Committee consist of representatives of the Councils of Stourbridge, Lye and Wollescote, and Halesowen.

The Public Health Act Amendment Acts of 1890 and 1907, also the Infectious Diseases Prevention Act, 1890, have been adopted by the Town Council. In December, 1910, the Local Government Board issued a Confirming Order scheduling the following trades as "Offensive Trades" in this district, viz.:—The trade of Hide and Skin Dealer, Fat Dealer, Gut Scraper, Leather Dresser, Glue Maker, Size Maker, Fat Melter or Extractor, Blood Dryer, and Fish Fryer.

Since the Incorporation of the Borough, in 1914, the Bye-laws have been revised.

#### Housing.

General Housing Conditions. In September, 1919, there were 4,145 inhabited houses. Of these 3,730 were of the type suitable for the "working classes." No new houses were erected during the year. The Town Council were proceeding with the erection of 131 houses, but none were completed at the end of the year. The population, as estimated by the Registrar-General at the middle of the year, was 18,045. According to the Food Control office records of the number of persons registered, and presumably the total inhabitants in September, 1919, was 17,612, and the approximate number of soldiers away on service, but belonging to

the town, was 722. Thus giving the approximate actual population as 18,334. A considerable number of new residents came into the Town during the year, as shown by the number of houses purchased by people who previously resided outside the Borough.

The extent of shortage of houses may be summed up as follows:—Population at Census in 1911, 17,316. Population, including soldiers on service, in September, 1919, 18,334. Increase of population in eight years, 1,018. During this period 143 new houses were erected, and 39 old houses demolished. The gain in houses being 104. The number of houses required to meet the increased population at the rate of 4 persons per house, is 254. Therefore the shortage of houses at middle of 1919 was 150. The Town Council had commenced the erection of 131 houses.

Overcrowding is not prevalent to any considerable extent.

A considerable number of old small houses still exist, some of these have in recent years been renovated and repaired. The general defects found consisted of general depreciation of the building, roofs, and inside plaster, broken floors, want of sinks and water taps inside, sanitary conveniences used in common, unsatisfactory arrangements, such as sculleries in basement, and back yards common to several houses. Very few courts exist, and these are well situated as regards air space.

Owing to the difficulty experienced in obtaining labour to carry out extensive repairs, very little progress was made during the year in the repair of property. One owner was prosecuted for not complying with a notice requiring the abatement of nuisances arising from a defective house. Eleven Closing Orders were made.

Difficulty is experienced in having extensive repairs done to houses, principally owing to the available labour being absorbed in the erection of new houses. Smaller repairs have been done.

The conditions, so far as they affect housing, as regards water supply, are generally satisfactory, but some houses still have one water tap common to several houses; with respect to closet accommodation, water closets are mainly provided, and where there is one water closet for two or more houses these cases are brought to the notice of the Sanitary Committee, in view of a W.C. being provided for each house. The refuse disposal is satisfactory. Seven additional water closets were provided during the year.

No Unhealthy Areas were reported before the year, but in November an Unhealthy Area, comprising 10 houses was reported under Part II. of the H.W.C. Act, 1890.

The Bye-laws have been revised since 1914.

Number of dwelling-houses in respect of which complaints were made that they are unfit for human habitation, by householders. Nil.

Closing Orders.—Eleven representations were made with a view to making Closing Orders, and Closing Orders were made in each of these cases. No Closing Orders were determined. No Demolition Orders were made.

One Dwelling-house with Shop, viz.: No. 158a, High Street, and one Lock-up Shop, No. 158, High Street, were demolished for the purpose of erecting a Picture House.

An Obstructive Building, being a warehouse with stable adjoining, in Green Street, was the subject of a representation in December. This is still under consideration.

The Inspector of Nuisances is the only Officer engaged in Housing Work.

## REPORT ON 31st DECEMBER, 1919. HOUSING SURVEY NEEDS.

#### First Scheme for Dealing with Unfit Houses.

The Report of the Survey furnished to the Housing Commissioner on 31st October, 1919, which was adopted by the Town Council on 27th October, 1919, gave the following "Prevailing Conditions":—

No. of inhabited houses unfit for human habitation	44

At the Town Council Meeting, held on 24th November, 1919, Closing Orders were made in respect of the following eleven Dwelling-houses:—

- (1) Nos. 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, and 9, GREEN STREET, and Nos. 1 and 2, at rear of Nos. 7 and 8, GREEN STREET.
- (2) Nos. 1, 3, and 5, BIRMINGHAM STREET.
- Of the former, Nos. 4, 5, and 6, belong to one Owner, and the remainder to another Owner.

  It was suggested that No. 6 should be removed, Nos. 4 and 5 repaired and a yard, now part of No. 7, be acquired to make a back yard and provide through access and ventilation for Nos. 4 and 5. That Nos. 7 and 8, with the two back houses, be made into through houses, and that No. 9 be either demolished or converted into a lock-up shop.

The latter three were considered to be unrepairable, and should be demolished.

The following proposals were adopted at the Town Council Meeting held on 29th December, 1919, after Reports from the Medical Officer of Health.

MR. MAYOR AND GENTLEMEN,-

I have the honour to submit to you a report of the work done in my department during the year 1919, being my Nineteenth Annual Report.

### Complaints.

During the year 80 complaints were received relating to various nuisances and insanitary conditions.

The average number of complaints received during the past 10 years is 128.

## Inspection of District.

The number of inspections and re-inspections made during the year was 1,630. These were as follows:—

In making these Inspections 1,027 sanitary defects, nuisances or contraventions of your Bye-laws were found.

There were 1,232 defects not remedied at the end of 1918, and these, together with the 1,027 defects met with during the year 1919 make a total of 2,259 insanitary conditions requiring attention.

356 defects were remedied during the year, thus leaving 1,903 insanitary conditions unabated.

The smallness of the number of defects remedied is accounted for by the difficulty in securing the necessary labour to do the work, and by reason of some defects only at houses having been attended to, leaving other work to be done later. In these cases the records of the work done will be completed when the work is finished. Some houses have been undergoing repair as long ago as 1914, and still in hand.

#### Notices.

the year, mostly being letters setting out in detail the defects found, and the suggested alterations or remedies. The latter being in the form of a general specification. Many of the Notices referred to several houses, as only one letter or preliminary Notice is sent in those cases where several adjoining houses belong to one Owner.

289 houses or premises were dealt with in the 119 Notices.

In many cases, particularly when drains are obstructed, the persons concerned are interviewed; and the defects are remedied without Notices being served. 85 Notices were complied with at the end of the year.

In those cases where the preliminary Notices are not complied with, the matters are reported to your Sanitary Committee in my Monthly Report, and under your instructions, upon the recommendation of the Sanitary Committee, 76 Statutory Notices were served, as follows:—

At the end of the year 9 Notices had been complied with; the work to comply with 23 was in progress; Orders had been given to contractors in respect of 7 Notices; Appeals to the Ministry of Health had been lodged with respect to 8 Closing Orders; and Notices had been sent to the Town Council stating that the Owner of six houses to which the Notices under Section 28 of the Housing, Town Planning, etc., Act, 1919, applied, intended to close the houses. Three Notices had unexpired at the end of the year.

#### Prosecutions.

Legal proceedings were taken on 18th March against the Owner of a house for not complying with a Notice served upon him to abate certain Nuisances. A fine of £3 and costs was imposed. The Owner subsequently closed the house.

#### Offensive Trades.

Two applications to establish Fish Frying Businesses were refused. Two applications were granted, one being to re-open a business, whilst in the other case the business was not commenced.

#### Bakehouses.

There are 13 Bakehouses on the Register, several having been given up during the past few years.

## Dairies, Cowsheds and Milkshops.

There are 23 Dairymen registered, 15 of whom are Cowkeepers. There are approximately 112 cows. One Cowkeeper was registered during the year. A Cowkeeper removed his cows from a cowshed in the Town to a farm outside, but still retails milk in the Borough.

Pigs were found being kept in a cowshed; these were removed after notice.

A large brick cowshed has been erected to take the place of a wooden structure.

## Factory and Workshop Act.

At the end of the year there were 198 workshops on the Register.

I made 39 inspections. Two new Workshops were without sanitary conveniences. A W.C. was subsequently provided at each place.

Three Notices were received from H.M. Inspector of Factories. Two being in respect of Workshops requiring lime washing, and one being the want of a sanitary convenience at a new Workshop. All these defects were remedied.

#### Outworkers' Lists.

Twenty-eight lists of Outworkers were received during the year, containing the names of 65 Outworkers, 47 of whom resided outside the Borough.

### Common Lodging Houses.

There are two old registered houses and one licensed house. The license of the latter has been renewed.

The returns of the number of lodgers sleeping at these houses during the year were as follows:—(The figures represent the number of times the beds were occupied, and not the individual lodgers staying at the houses, thus one person lodging at the house for seven nights is counted seven times).

#### Slaughterhouses.

In 1914 there were 15 Slaughterhouses, 10 being subject to annual licenses.

The Butchers' Buying Committee slaughter their supplies at three Slaughterhouses. Two of the others are in connection with Pork Butchers, the remainder being used occasionally for pigkilling.

Two previously annually licensed places have not been used for some time, in one case owing to the death of the Owner, and in the other on account of the Occupier having given up business. One old Slaughterhouse has not been used for several years, as the Owner ceased carrying on his business as a Butcher, when his son joined H.M. Forces. The question of re-opening of this Slaughterhouse will come before your Sanitary Committee should the Owner wish to resume business as a Butcher.

In 1911 your Sanitary Committee considered the question of erecting a Public Abattoir in the district, but owing to local opposition no definite scheme was submitted.

In February last your Sanitary Committee again considered the matter, and I was instructed to communicate with the Local Government Board. In accordance with these instructions I wrote as follows:— Town Hall,

#### PUBLIC ABATTOIR.

This Town Council is considering the desirability of erecting a Public Abattoir in the Borough, and I have been instructed to ask if you will kindly advise the Town Council on the matter.

In 1911 the subject was under consideration, but on account of anticipated opposition from the local Butchers' Association the matter was dropped. Circumstances having altered, both as regards the number and licensing of existing Slaughter-houses as well as more co-operation amongst the meat traders, it has been suggested that an Abattoir would be an advantage here and would receive the support of the local Butchers' Association.

Several have been voluntarily closed, other licensed places were changed to annual licences on change of Occupier, the licencing of some were refused on change of occupation owing to their condition, others having fallen into dis-use through suspension of business owing to the War.

One Registered Slaughter-house is not used as the son of the occupier joined the Forces. The occupier of an Annually Licenced one has fallen in the War and unsuccessful efforts have been made to sell or let the premises.

At the present time four Butchers obtain supplies of dead meat from Birmingham, the others sharing the live stock supplies. With the exception of the two Slaughter-houses mentioned the licences of those occupied by Members of H.M. Forces have been renewed.

The area of the Borough is 1,920 acres, the estimated population being 18,200; the Civilian population 16,400, whilst the meat buying population is 17,700.

Adjoining the Borough is the Urban District of Amblecote, with a population of about 3,200, the Urban District of Lye and Wollescote, population about 12,000, and well-populated portions of the Rural Districts of Bromsgrove and Seisdon.

It is anticipated that in the near future supplies of meat may have to be obtained from central Slaughter-houses and those towns not possessing an Abatteir would have to obtain supplies from other places where there is a central Slaughterhouse. The position of Stourbridge is peculiarly favourable as a town where a central Slaughter-house should be established as most of the meat supply of the surrounding districts is purchased at the local Stock Sale, or at Hagley (about 2 miles away) in Bromsgrove Rural.

Whilst the Town Council is anxious to be prepared with a central Slaughter-house should future legislation require the abolition of private Slaughter-houses, they are reluctant to embark on an expensive undertaking which may not be financially self-supporting unless there are strong grounds for doing so, and for this reason the Town Council respectfully solicit your opinion and advice.

"Your letter of the 24th ultimo, addressed to the Board, "regarding the provision of a public abattoir in your "district has come to me.

"While a definite answer cannot be given at the moment "to questions which you raise, I may say that the whole "subject is receiving close consideration here. I have been "interested to learn the position which exists in Stourbridge, "particularly the reduction which has been effected in a "number of private Slaughterhouses. Such a reduction is, "of course, all to the good in the event of any legislation of "a general nature being considered.

"I shall be glad to have any additional information "regarding the question in your district from time to time.

At your meeting in March last the following resolution was adopted, upon the recommendation of your Sanitary Committee, acting on the suggestion of other Local Authorities:—

"That the time is now opportune for the Government to "consider the urgent necessity of immediately making all "diseases of amimals that are communicable to Human "Beings compulsorily notifiable, and of providing adequate "compensation to be paid subsequent to any action that may "in the public interest be determined upon; and considers "that in any scheme of National Reconstruction there should "be provided a Public Abattoir for every large centre, and "that in every such district full powers should be granted to "the Local Authority to compulsorily close all private "Slaughterhouses."

#### Meat Inspection.

The following articles of Food were condemned during the year:—

The following being surrendered to me:-

Butter, 16lbs.

Condensed Milk, 55 tins.

Dates, 5 boxes.

Tomatoes, 18 tins.

Salmon, 8 tins.

Imported Rabbits, 2 cases.

Fish, 15 stones.

Imported Meat, 449lbs (Some of this was returned to Birmingham Meat Market; the remainder sent to the Salvage Department, Birmingham, for utilisation).

Carcase of Sheep, about 5olbs.

Carcase of Calf, about 70lbs. Tuberculous.

Pork, 30lb. (This was damaged owing to the pig having broken legs).

The following were seized by me and subsequently condemned by the Magistrates:—

Carcase of Calf, about 70lbs.

Carcase of Sheep, about 50lbs.

Carcase of Cow, 407lbs. (Affected with generalised Tuberculosis. This was sent to Birmingham Salvage Department for utilization).

All the above carcases were in a Slaughterhouse, and not exposed for sale. One Calf and the Sheep were "casualties." These had died. The other Calf carcase was sent to a Butcher as a portion of his dead meat supply, and was returned for utilization.

131lbs. of bruised and damaged Imported Meat, which was unfit for sale in its raw state, was utilized for manufacturing purposes.

#### Infectious Diseases.

71 inspections of premises where cases of Infectious Disease or Tuberculosis occurred, were made. In making these inspections many insanitary conditions were met with and dealt with.

18 Cases were removed to the Infectious Diseases Hospital.

52 houses and the whole of the dormitories at Oldswinford Hospital and the entire Sanatorium at Oldswinford Hospital were disinfected. About 500 articles of bedding and clothing were sent to the Isolation Hospital for disinfection, and several lots of bedding destroyed at the Destructor.

On account of an outbreak of Diphtheria at Oldswinford Hospital I inspected the premises on 23rd April, in company with Dr. G. H. Fosbroke, the County Medical Officer of Health, Dr. L. Hickey, the Medical Officer of the Hospital, and your Medical Officer of Health. It was suggested that I should make a thorough inspection and report to the Feoffees. This was done and on 1st May, I sent a statement of the defects found and the suggested remedies. I was afterwards asked to get out a Specification of the work necessary together with improvements of some conditions, which although not insanitary were not entirely satisfactory. This specification was prepared and tenders for the work received from Contractors. The estimated cost of the work was exceedingly high and the Feoffees were not disposed to incur the expense. I was then requested to prepare a specification of the essential repairs and improvements and a tender for this work was accepted. At the end of the year most of the work had been done, this included reconstruction of the drainage in several places, complete ventilation of the drains, alterations to the Bath and lavatory basins, improved flushing of Trough W.C.'s, improvements to the Urinals, trapping open drains, various plumbing improvements and other matters.

In April the Tuberculosis Shelter belonging to your Town Council was erected in Corser Street, and in October a Shelter belonging to the Worcestershire County Council was erected in Love Lane.

#### Water Closets.

During the year no privies were converted into water closets, but 7 additional water closets were provided. Six others were newly-erected to replace those which were removed.

To overcome the constantly recurring nuisances arising from W.C.'s in open yards, to which the tenants of several houses have access, although each house may be provided with a separate W.C., but the yards being open, the W.C.'s may be used by others than the tenants, and it is difficult to find the actual offenders; I have suggested that a W.C. should be erected to each house with access from the scullery. For some time past many property-owners have acted upon my suggestion and removed common washhouses and W.C.'s, and erected a scullery to each house in open yards with a W.C. attached.

During the past four years little progress was made, only 7 houses being improved in this manner.

The following table gives the number of privies converted into water closets since 1901, also the additional W.C.'s provided. Very few houses have privies, and these are in localities where there are no sewers.

### Housing, (Inspection of District) Regulations.

During the year 24 houses were inspected under the above Regulations.

The following were reported to your Sanitary Committee as unfit for human habitation, and Closing Orders were made. Nos. 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, and 9 and Nos. 1 and 2 at rear of Nos. 7 and 8, Green Street.

Nos. 1, 3 and 5, Birmingham Street.

Nos. 1 and 3, Vicarage Road.

Owing to the difficulty in securing the necessary labour verv little work was done to thoroughly repair dwelling-houses. Previous to 1914 I endeavoured to secure the removal of common washhouses and common sanitary conveniences situate in yards used by several houses and to have sculleries erected against the houses, with direct access and for a W.C. to be erected, with the door opening into the scullery, so that each house would have a private scullery and separate W.C. which could not be interfered with by others than the occupiers of the particular house. During the War these improvements could not be carried out, but during the past year six houses have been improved in this respect.

### Shop's Acts.

There are 484 shops on the Register.

#### Petroleum Acts.

During the year 31 licenses to store Petrol and 14 licenses to store Carbide of Calcium were issued.
