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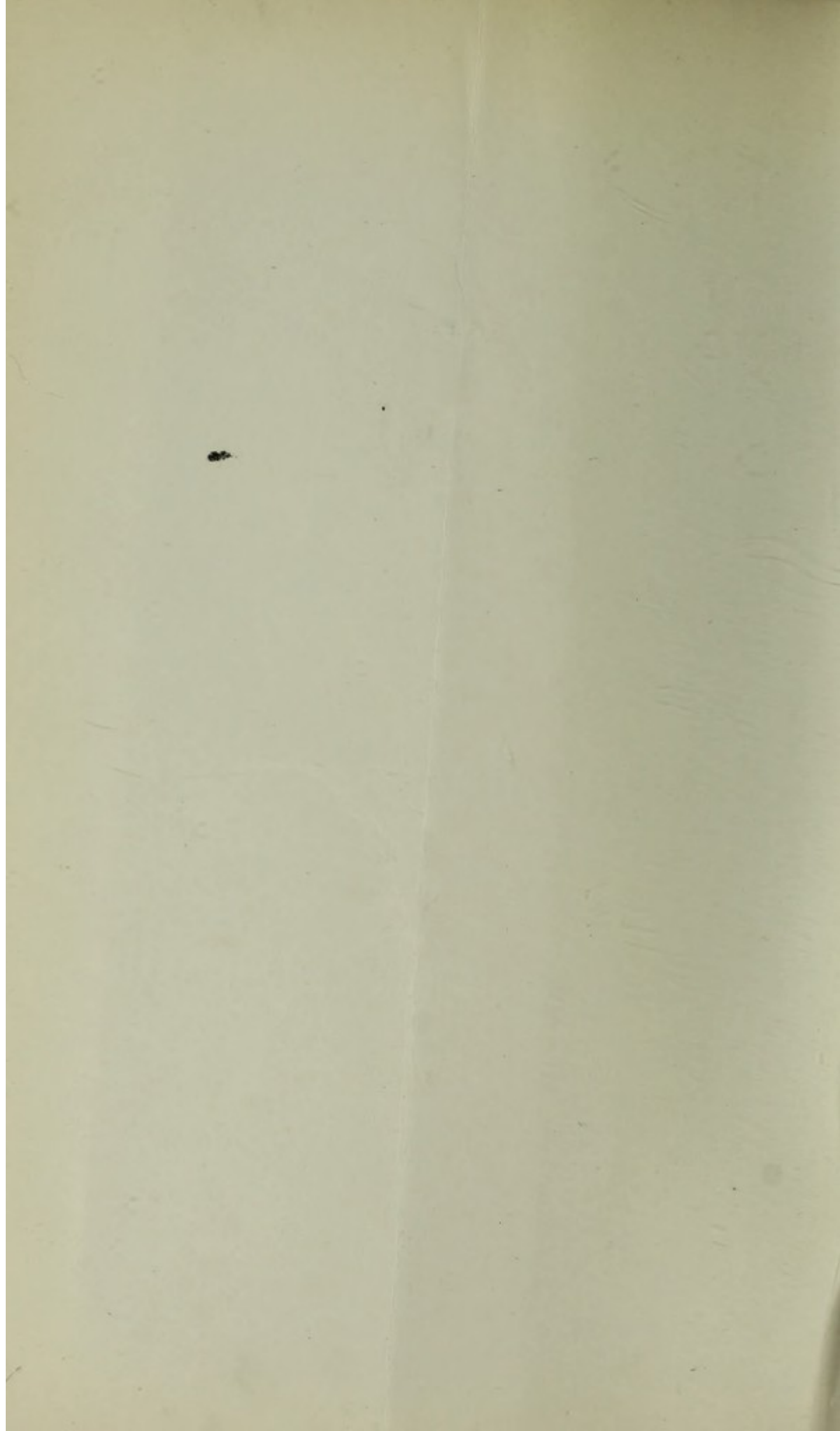

MR. MAYOR AND GENTLEMEN.

I have the honour to submit my Report for the year 1906. For the purpose of estimating the statistics of the Report I have assumed that the population is the same as at the census of 1901, because in the ten years prior to that census there was no increase in population. There is reason to think that by so doing the population is considerably under-estimated, as is confirmed by the number of houses built in the town in recent years. If the population has increased since the census my statistics (except the Birth-rate) are to fractional extent more favourable than as given in the Report.

The Death-rate for 1906 is lower than in any of the preceding ten years, and stands at 13·3 per 1,000 inhabitants. The Death-rate among infants is also extremely low, and about one-half of the average for the preceding decade (vide Table I.). A reference to Table IV. shows that the only death from the notifiable Infectious Diseases was one from Erysipelas.

ISOLATION HOSPITAL :—JOINT (INFECTIOUS) HOSPITAL, STRATFORD-UPON-AVON.

In Table III. is given a list of the Infectious Disease notified in the course of the year, and as shown there, the number of cases of Scarlet Fever has much declined as compared with former years.

There were four cases of Diphtheria, which all occurred in the mild humid weather which prevailed at the end of the year. There was no apparent association of one case with another. One was in Wood Street, one in Henley Street, one at Lower Clopton, and one was evidently imported in a child from outside sent to the Nursing Home. The end of the year had climatic conditions most favourable to the fostering of Diphtheria. Of the four cases, three were nursed in Hospital and one was safely isolated at home. Enteric Fever was notified in three instances, but these were all cases imported from outside and sent in to Hospital. One was from Chipping Campden and two came from Henley-in-Arden.

The Puerperal Fever case was notified in Mansell Street, and was duly reported upon to the executive of the Central Midwives Board, as is now required.

SCHOOLS.

National School was closed for two weeks beginning February 26th, for Measles.

HOUSING OF THE WORKING CLASSES.

No action was entered upon under the Act with respect to house property.

WATER SUPPLY.

The periodical analyses of the town supply evinced satisfactory results during the past year.

SEWERAGE AND DRAINAGE.

The new Sewage Disposal Works are now in working order, and I understand are effecting their purpose most efficiently.

HEALTH VISITORS.

It may confidently be expected that the periodic visits of the lady Health Visitors will lead to a decrease in sickness and mortality among young children. I consider their visits to houses among the poor, where there are infants in the family, will be a great benefit.

While it is true that in Stratford we have not to face the difficulty which obtains in many places, that the poor cannot obtain a satisfactory supply of milk for bottle-fed infants, at the same time there are many young children brought up in the town whose mothers would benefit by correct knowledge of how a baby should be fed.

While on this subject it is not out of place to remark that if in warm weather it is, from a commercial point of view, necessary to add preservatives to milk, it is also necessary for the welfare of infants fed on such milk to keep the amount of preservative as low as possible. I have seen milk in the Borough which was far from being treated on these lines.

VACCINATION.

Returns on the subject are given at the end of this Report.

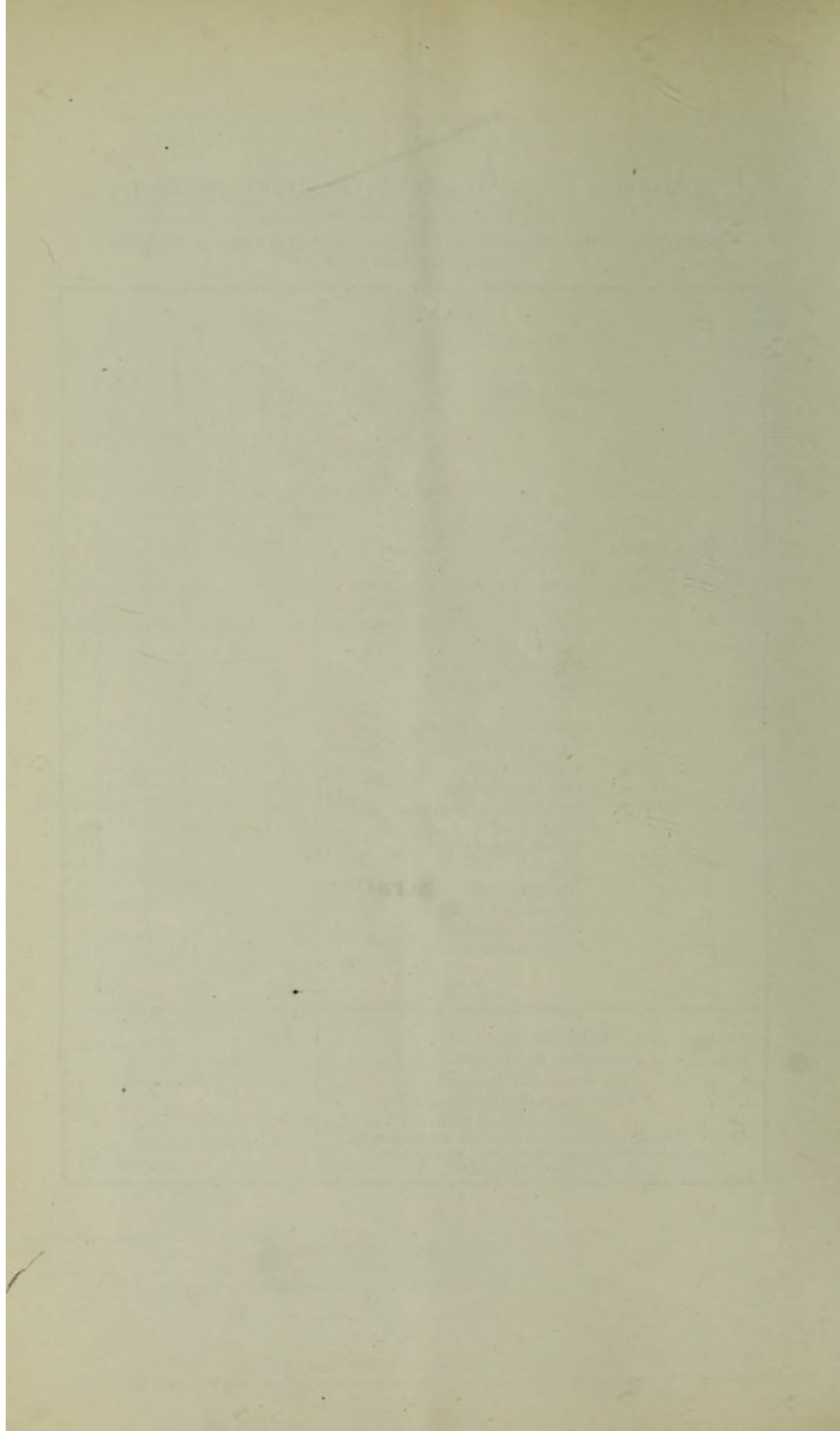

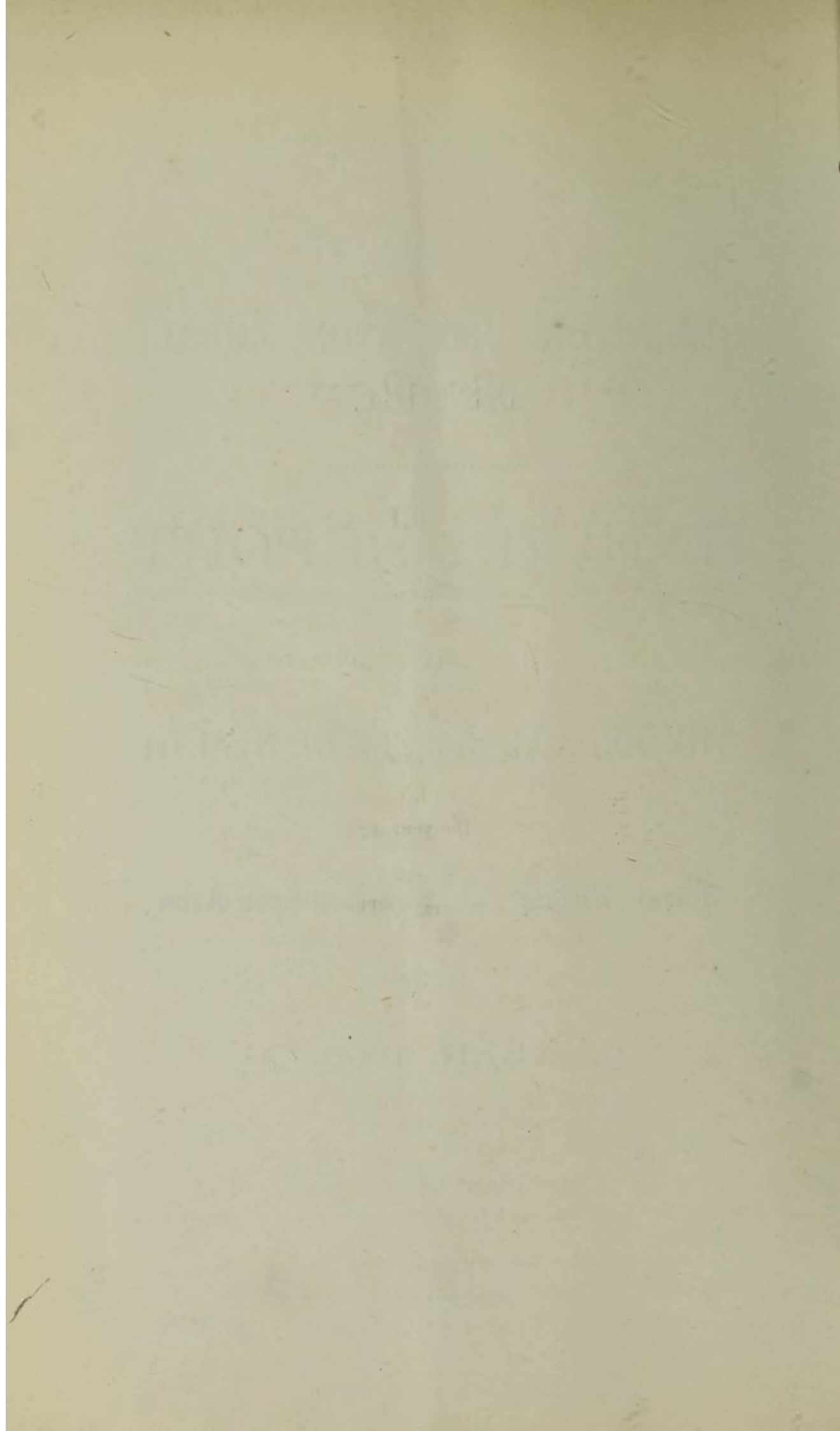

TO THE CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS OF THE RURAL
DISTRICT COUNCIL OF STRATFORD-UPON-AVON.

MR. CHAIRMAN, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

The following, which I have the honour to submit, is my Report on the Health of the District for the year 1906.

During the year the Death-rate was almost exactly the same as the average of the preceding ten years. The Birth-rate was a little above the average, but was a low rate, being 24·5 per 1,000 inhabitants. With this low birth-rate it seems clear that as time goes on there is less mortality among infants, and this is what would naturally be expected ; for in the small family among the poorer of the population the young infant has more cubic space and a better chance of adequate nourishment than in a crowded cottage.

INFECTIOUS DISEASE.—There has been a great decrease in the number of cases of Scarlet Fever notified, only one-seventh of the number notified in 1905, and there were no deaths from the disease.

Of the six cases notified two came from Henley-in-Arden, one from Snitterfield, one from Langley, one from Wolverton, and one from Wellesbourne. Five were sent to Hospital.

The number of cases of Diphtheria was much in excess of the average annual amount. In Wolverton Parish there were twelve cases, at Alveston and Tiddington there were five, and at the Crofts, Banbury Road, four. One came from Henley-in-Arden. Nineteen of these twenty-two cases were sent to Hospital. There were two deaths. There was one case of Membranous Croup, which was notified from Kineton.

ENTERIC FEVER.—Four cases were notified. Of these three came from Henley-in-Arden, and one from Kineton. Two of the Henley-in-Arden cases were clearly associated with defective drainage of the premises occupied.

PUERPERAL FEVER.—One case of this was notified from Wolverton.

WATER SUPPLY OF THE DISTRICT.

From the results of analysis the water supplies of those parts of the District which have water works remain at a satisfactory degree of purity, and Henley-in-Arden, Kineton, Loxley, and Alveston, may be said to have water supplies of a quality not commonly found in small centres of population. Wellesbourne is now the only large village in the District dependent upon wells.

SEWERAGE AND DRAINAGE.

In the course of the year the new sewage disposal of Kineton has been carried out, and when completed by connections throughout the place the scheme promises to render Kineton most admirably fitted out from a sanitary point of view.

As regards Wellesbourne, I regret to be unable to report much advance in carrying out the much-needed drainage of the place. In looking at the situation of Wellesbourne, and the fact that the land only falls from it in one direction, it would seem to be a natural deduction that on broad lines there was only one way to undertake sewerage, and one direction where to construct the outfall. To the present time, however, the matter has been delayed by the consideration of rival schemes.

HOUSING OF THE WORKING CLASSES.

A Certificate was issued during the year with reference to a house in Market Square, Kineton.

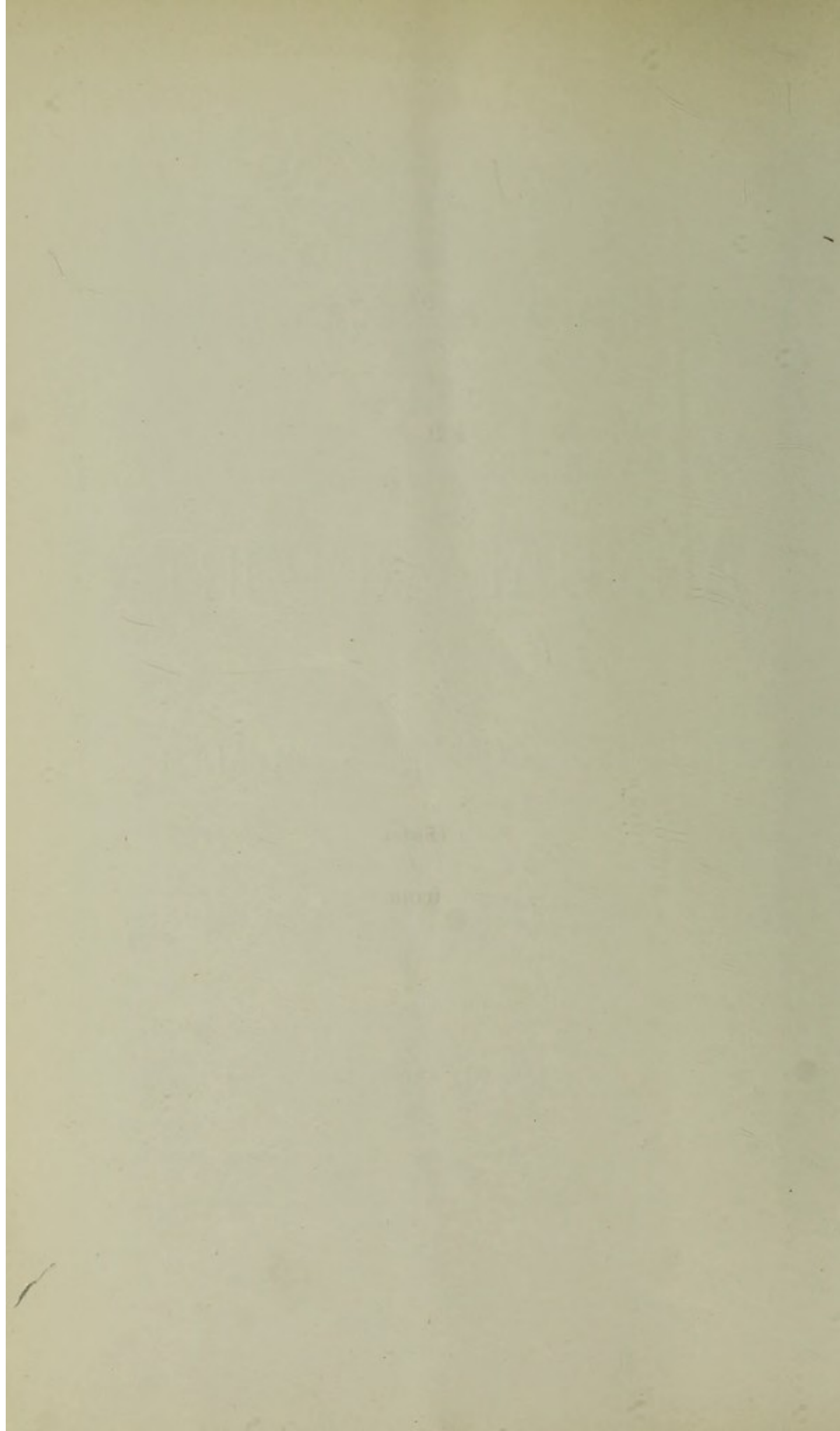

TO THE MARSTON SICCA DISTRICT COUNCIL.

MR. CHAIRMAN AND GENTLEMEN,

I beg to present my Annual Report on the health of the district for the year 1906.

The Vital Statistics of a district which is entirely agricultural in character as the Marston Sicca District is are apt to yield figures which would be considered as most unsatisfactory if they were the statistics of a town. This results from the agricultural population having a larger proportion of aged people as a component, and consequently fewer births and more deaths than would occur normally.

The Vital Statistics are to be seen on the lowest line of Table I.

The District has been entirely free from deaths due to the principal zymotic diseases, and during the year the only Infectious Disease notified has been three cases of Diphtheria, two at Weston and one at Long Marston, which received due investigation.

SEWERAGE AND DRAINAGE.

It seems probable to me that the construction of a good modern sewer in Welford is a matter that will need consideration in time to come. The Village is increasing in size, and the influx of summer

visitors must lead to increase of sewage to be dealt with. As the village is wholly supplied from surface wells too great care cannot be taken in the provision of good drainage, as once the subsoil gets contaminated from defective pipes or sewers the water supply would go wrong and the prosperity of the place receive a severe check.

HOUSING OF THE WORKING CLASSES.

Some of the Long Marston cottages are barely up to a fair standard and incapable of being rendered so, but their condemnation would not effect anything in the interests of sanitation.

WATER SUPPLY.

The gaugings at Rumer Hill, with the view of finding a water supply, were completed in the course of the year, and apparently, if provision was made to tide over the summer and early autumn by adequate storage, enough water could be obtained for the village. It is not contended by anyone that such a water supply is an ideal one, as it comes off arable land, and would have to be filtered. But, considering the deplorable nature of the existing supply from pond-holes, which catch the surface water in the village, it would seem a reasonable scheme to go to Rumer Hill if there is no hope of the Evesham Villages Water Scheme being extended to Long Marston. I would advise your Council to push on with the matter, and to obtain a water supply for the village from any available source, and preferably from the Villages Water Scheme, if this is possible.

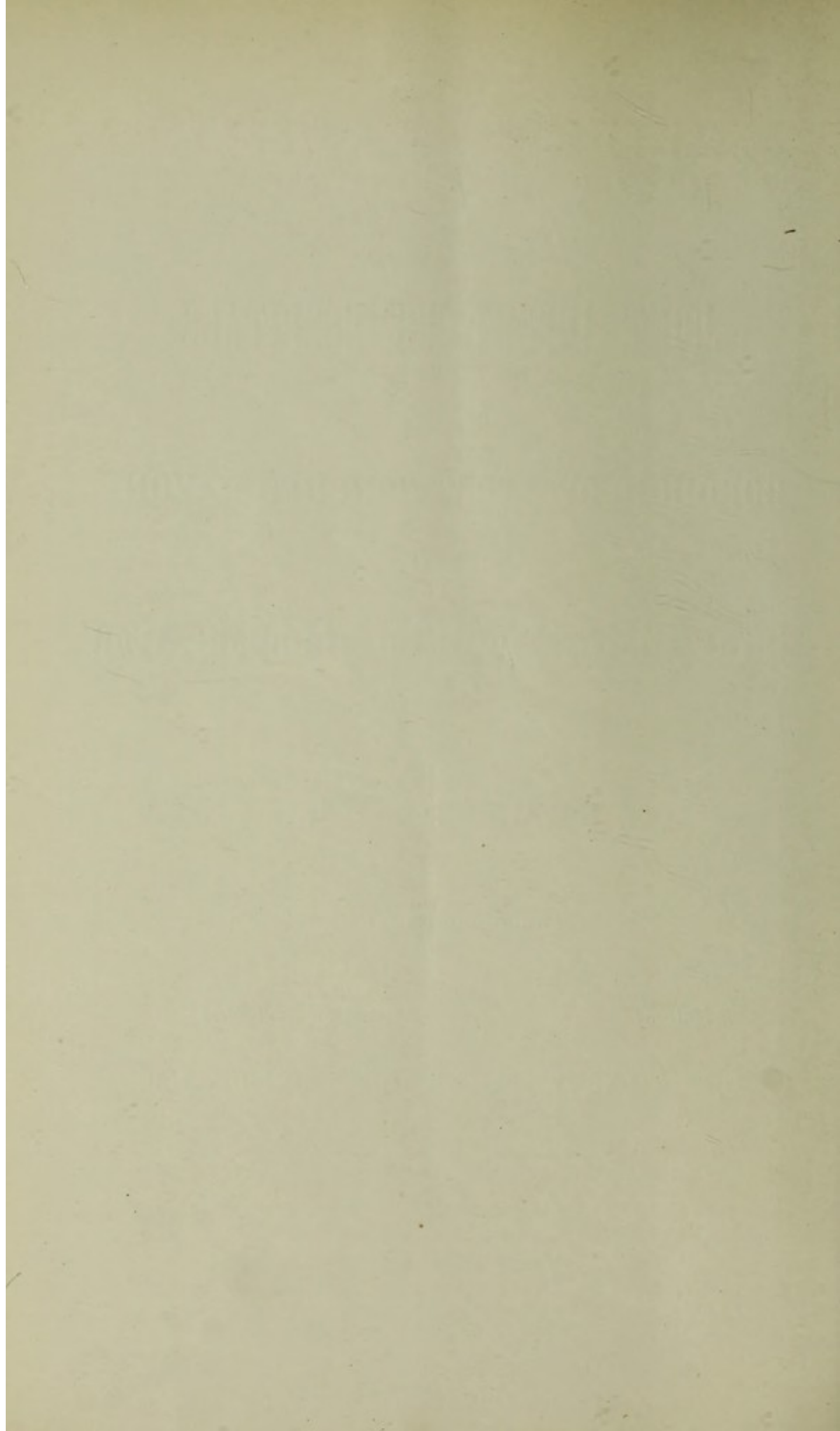

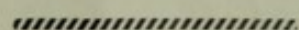

There were nineteen Scarlet Fever cases and three Diphtheria cases sent in from the Borough. Stratford-on-Avon Rural District sent in five cases of Scarlet Fever and nineteen Diphtheria cases.

Marston Sicca Rural District sent in one case of Diphtheria. There was one death in the year from paralysis following Diphtheria.

At Belle Vue Hospital a case of Small-pox was admitted. Although these buildings had been empty for a long time it was found possible to warm them fit to receive a patient, and also to find a nurse and a cook on the same day as the case was notified. I have to thank Mr. Brook, the Sanitary Inspector, and Miss Tidy, the Infectious Hospital Matron, for energetic and prompt action in carrying out the preparations necessary in so short a time.

It is no light task to take an empty building in an out-of-the-way spot, and fit it out with servants, nurse, food, water, fuel, and light at a few hours' notice.
