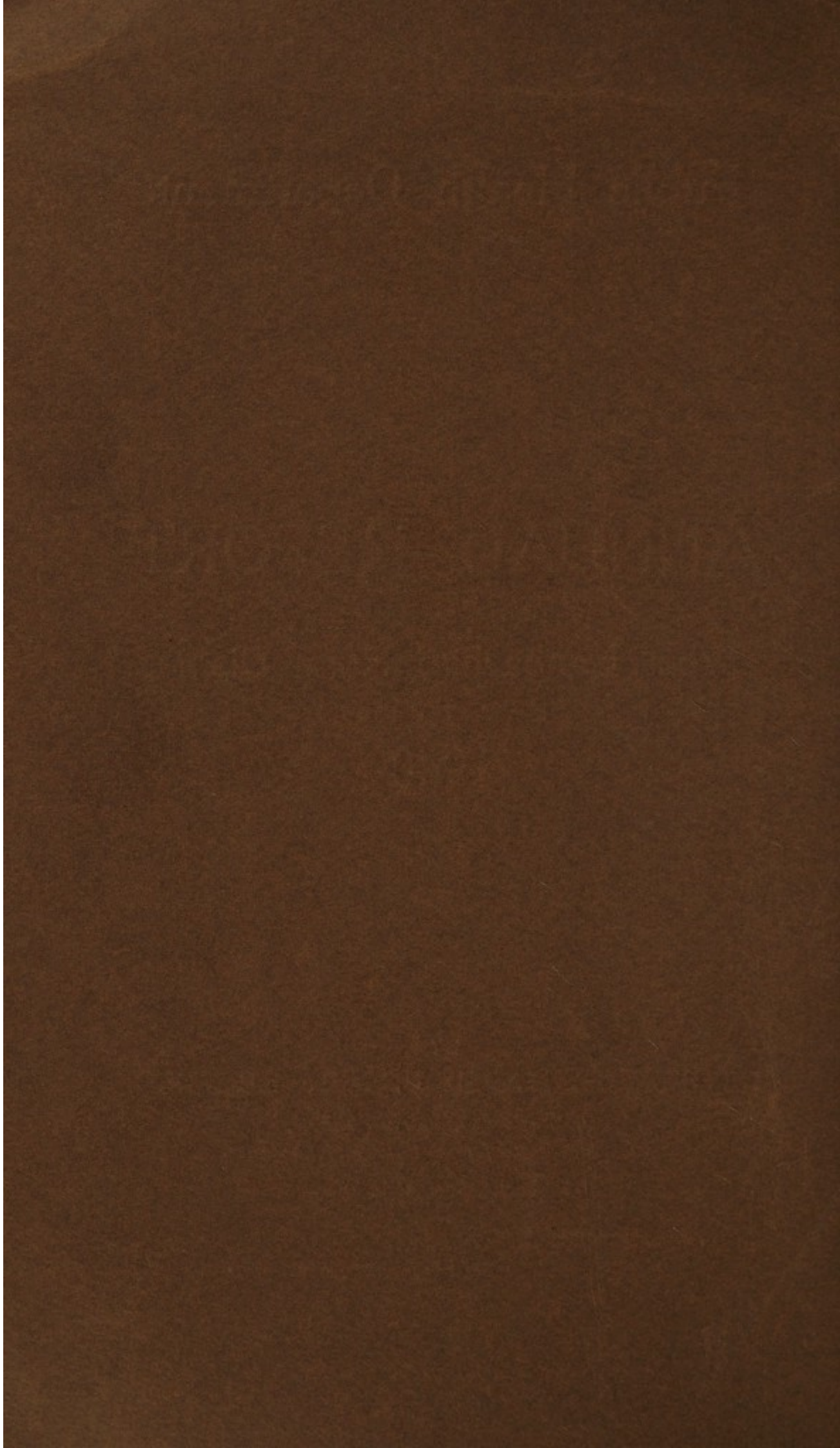

BIRTHS.

The number of births recorded during the year was 669, equal to a rate of 16·4 per 1,000 of the population. This is an increase of 0·5 on the figure for 1939, and an increase of 1·1 over the five years average 1935-39.

Of the total births 378 were males and 291 were females. There were 12 illegitimate births—4 males and 8 females.

DEATHS.

The total deaths registered for the Rural District during 1940 numbered 444. The figure for 1939 was 416. The death-rate for the year was thus 10·9 per 1000 of the population, and the adjusted death-rate, after multiplying by the comparability factor for the district (1·07) is 11·6 per 1000. The death-rate is the same as for the year 1939, but there is a decrease of 0·6 on the five years' average 1935-1939.

Maternal Mortality.—The maternal mortality rate per 1000 live births was 1·47 against 1·69 in 1939. The figure for England and Wales was 2·16, and 2·93 in 1939.

Zymotic Death Rate.—Six deaths were registered during the year as being due to zymotic disease, giving a zymotic death rate of 0·15 per 1,000.

Epidemic Death Rate.—This was 0·1 per 1000.

Infantile Mortality Rate.—There were 30 deaths of infants under one year, which gives an infantile mortality rate of 44 per 1000 births. This figure is 29 less than the figure for 1939 and 14 less than the five years average.

Section B.

GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES FOR THE AREA.

PATHOLOGICAL REPORTS.

Specimens are sent for examination to the Bacteriological Department of the University of Liverpool, to Messrs. Evans, Lescher and Webb's Biological Institute at Runcorn, to the Pathological Department of the Southport Infirmary, and to the Bootle Infectious Diseases Hospital.

Four hundred and seventy-seven nose and throat swabs were taken and examined for *Bacillus Diphtheriæ*, which was found to be present in sixty-six swabs.

Two swabs examined for Hæmolytic Streptococci were proved negative.

Of seven swabs examined for Meningococci, one was found to be positive.

Negative results were obtained from two swabs examined for organisms.

Three specimens of blood, six of urine and fourteen of faeces were tested for the presence of the typhoid group of organisms, which were found in two of the blood specimens, one urine and five faeces.

Three specimens of sputum were examined for tuberculosis but were proved negative.

In addition to the above, one swab from a Skelmersdale patient, three from Whiston patients and twelve from Litherland patients in hospital were taken and examined for *Bacillus Diphtheriæ*, which was found to be present in two of the latter swabs only. One specimen of pus was taken from a Litherland patient and tested for tuberculosis but was proved negative.

AMBULANCE.

The Local Authority provides ambulance facilities for infectious cases only. The Ormskirk General Hospital and also the County Hospital at Ormskirk each provide ambulances for accidents and general hospital cases. Ambulances belonging to the Merseyside Hospitals Council also operate in the area. In addition, the Council now contribute annually to the Bootle General Hospital for the use of their ambulance in the southern part of the district. Experience has shown that ambulance facilities are as adequate in war time as in peace time.

SCHOOL HYGIENE.

COMMENTS ON SCHOOL PREMISES.

Aintree Temporary Council School. The number of children on roll (May 22nd, 1941) is 163, arranged in four classes ; three classes in a large hall and the fourth in a small hall. 247 children have been admitted to this Temporary School since its inception, 18 of whom were transferred to the Senior School last Midsummer. A comparison of the above figures gives some idea of the number of children who have left the district (privately evacuated). In spite of this, numbers are steadily increasing, and there is a definite need for extra accommodation and the formation of an extra class.

Bispham Free Grammar School alterations are now almost completed. A new portion in stone has been added and the existing building altered, giving adequate teaching rooms, 3 cloakrooms, and washing and dining accommodation. The playground has been re-surfaced in concrete, so as to give proper fall for surface drainage. The school is a fine example of modernisation and enlargement of a picturesque old English village schoolhouse, the new in keeping with the old.

Hesketh Bank C.E. School has had one more classroom refloored. The levelling and re-surfacing of the playground has not yet received attention. This is an urgent matter, as the ground floods badly in winter and children are liable to suffer from wet feet.

The playground at **Maghull R.C. School** was covered with cinders in 1939. During the dry weather of 1941 these cinders had disintegrated to such an extent as to cause clouds of dust to rise in the Boys' playground during playtime.

Provision has been made at the new **Netherton Council School** for the re-heating of children's dinners.

Sefton Council School playgrounds need re-surfacing ; whilst at **Tarleton Mere Brow School** the matter is in abeyance pending suitable weather conditions in which to carry out the work.

Broadly speaking, it may be said that school premises throughout the Rural District are in good condition, reasonably modern or modernised, with good lighting, ventilation, heating and sanitary arrangements. One or two of the schools are temporarily overcrowded. The most pressing need is the provision of proper playground facilities at the majority of the schools.

Milk Sampling.—Fifteen samples of milk were taken by the Inspectors during the year.

Nine of these were samples of milk supplied to schools, and were taken at the request of the Lancashire County Council. The cost of the bacteriological examination was born by the County Council,

Of the other six samples, two were taken from milk produced in Rufford and one from milk produced in Maghull. These three samples were examined for cleanliness. The remaining three samples were taken from milk produced in Hesketh Bank and examined for *Brucella Abortus*. The results of four of the tests proved satisfactory and two unsatisfactory.

All the examinations were carried out by the Pathological Department of the Liverpool University.

Of 18 samples taken in the district under the Sale of Food and Drugs Act, 1928, none were adulterated.

Tuberculosis.—As a result of notification from Medical Officers of Health that tubercle bacilli had been discovered in milk produced in West Lancashire, three inspections of herds were made by County Veterinary Inspectors during the year. These inspections were made in Hesketh Bank, Tarleton and Rufford.

Two animals were dealt with under the Tuberculosis Order, 1938.

SALE OF FOOD AND DRUGS ACT.

As from July, 1940, this Act has been administered by the County Sanitary Inspectors. The work was previously carried out by the County Police.

The accompanying figures have been supplied by the County Council.

DIPHTHERIA.

Artificial immunisation against Diphtheria is undertaken at all the schools in the Rural District where pre-school children also attend in the care of their parents. In addition certain of these latter receive treatment at the Council Offices. Treatment is also offered to all convalescents at the Infectious Diseases Hospital who are recovering from complaints other than Diphtheria.

Diphtheria during the year was mainly of severe or moderately severe type but with a complete absence of laryngeal cases. A small outbreak in Rufford in January produced four cases, one of which was unfortunately fatal, and nine potential carriers with positive swabs were admitted to hospital. The total number of cases (20) shows a marked decrease on the figures for the previous three years.

The following tables illustrate the incidence and fatality of the disease during the year and also the work done with respect to immunisation. In addition to the children normally resident in West Lancashire, 65 evacuees received immunisation treatment,

In thirty-one houses inspected during the year by reason of tuberculous inmates, 17 cases were found not to be sleeping in separate bedrooms, and 14 of these not even in separate beds.

PNEUMONIA.
