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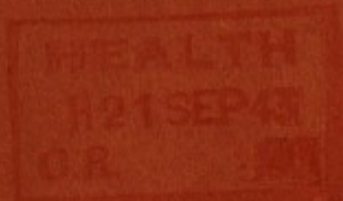

**BIRTHS.**

The number of births recorded during the year was 718, which is an increase of 105 on the number for 1941. Of the total births 357 were males and 361 were females. There were 25 illegitimate births—15 males and 10 females.

**DEATHS.**

The total deaths registered for the Rural District during 1942 numbered 414. The figure for 1941 was 461.

**Maternal Mortality.**—The maternal mortality rate per 1000 live births was 2·78 against 3·17 in 1941. The figure for England and Wales was 2·01, and 2·23 in 1941.

**Infantile Mortality Rate.**—There were 31 deaths of infants under one year, which gives an infantile mortality rate of 43 per 1000 births. This figure is 12 less than the figure for 1941 and 9 less than the five years average. The rate for England and Wales was 49 per 1000 births.

## Section B.

### GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES FOR THE AREA.

#### PATHOLOGICAL REPORTS.

Specimens are sent for examination to the Bacteriological Department of the University of Liverpool, to Messrs. Evans, Lescher and Webb's Biological Institute at Runcorn, to the Pathological Department of the Southport Infirmary, and to the Bootle Infectious Diseases Hospital. Emergency examinations are carried out by the staff of the Ormskirk Military Hospital, through the courtesy of the Officer commanding.

Five hundred and forty-eight nose and throat swabs were taken and examined for *Bacillus Diphtheriæ*, which was found to be present in seventy-two swabs.

One swab examined for Hæmolytic Streptococci proved negative, and of three swabs examined for Vincent's Angina, only one was positive.

Two specimens of blood, and four of faeces were tested for the presence of the typhoid and dysentery group of organisms. One specimen of faeces proved positive to the latter group.

One specimen of sputum and one of pleural fluid examined for tuberculosis were negative.

In addition to the above, thirty-five swabs were taken from Skelmersdale patients in the Infectious Diseases Hospital; three swabs proved positive for diphtheria.

**AMBULANCE.**

The Local Authority provides ambulance facilities for infectious cases only. The Ormskirk General Hospital and also the County Hospital at Ormskirk each provide ambulances for accidents and general hospital cases. Ambulances belonging to the Merseyside Hospitals Council also operate in the area. In addition, the Council now contribute annually to the Bootle General Hospital for the use of their ambulances for which the Fire Brigade provides the drivers, in the southern part of the district. Experience has shown that ambulance facilities are as adequate in war time as in peace time.

Owing to changes in the duties of the Bootle Ambulance Drivers, who have now been drafted into the National Fire Service, it has been necessary to formulate new ambulance arrangements to cover the southern part of the District, commencing in 1943. Such arrangements will be reported upon in the Report for that year.

**SCHOOL HYGIENE.**

The milk-in-schools scheme is in operation in the majority of the schools. Complaints of souring of the milk have been received from time to time, and these are dealt with by the Department. Some of the schools now supply Pasteurised milk, and this is proving popular, its advantages being realised by parents.

School dinners are now served at Scarisbrick R.C., C.E. and Council Schools, Netherton Council and R.C. Schools, Maghull C.E., Lydiate R.C., Ince Blundell R.C., Halsall Central and Aintree Council Schools. The latter school is now accommodated in Maycrete huts; a great improvement in comparison with their former temporary school.

Many teachers complain of the worn-out condition of playgrounds: these and the other defects mentioned in previous war-time reports have not received attention owing to the present emergency.

**Milk Sampling.**—Twenty samples of milk were taken by the Inspectors during the year.

Eighteen of these were samples of milk supplied to schools, and were taken at the request of the Lancashire County Council, who bore the cost of the bacteriological examinations

The other two samples were taken from milk produced in Thornton, and were examined for cleanliness and fat content. The result of the former test was satisfactory but the result of the latter examination showed the sample to be deficient in milk fat.

All the examinations were carried out by the Pathological Department of the Liverpool University.

Twenty samples were taken in the district under the Sale of Food and Drugs Act, 1928.

**Tuberculosis.**—As a result of notification from Medical Officers of Health that tubercle bacilli had been discovered in milk produced in West Lancashire, an inspection of one herd in Aughton and one in Rufford was made by a County Veterinary Inspector during the year. Two animals were dealt with under the Tuberculosis Order, 1938.

#### SALE OF FOOD AND DRUGS ACT.

As from July, 1940, this Act has been administered by the County Sanitary Inspectors. The work was previously carried out by the County Police.

**DIPHTHERIA.**

Artificial immunisation against Diphtheria is undertaken at all the schools in the Rural District where pre-school children also attend in the care of their parents. In addition, a weekly clinic is held at the Council Offices and a monthly Clinic at the Maghull Parish Institute. Treatment is also offered to all convalescents at the Infectious Diseases Hospital who are recovering from complaints other than Diphtheria.

The incidence was much lower than in 1941, there being only 25 cases as against 40 in the previous year. Only 9 carriers or potential carriers were discovered and admitted to hospital.

The following tables illustrate the incidence and fatality of the disease during the year and also the work done with respect to immunisation.

**SCARLET FEVER.**

Scarlet Fever incidence was low in 1942, only 31 cases being notified as against an average of seventy-four for the past five years. All cases were of mild type and it was only necessary to move twelve of the them to hospital. The general policy is to remove to hospital only such cases of Scarlee Fever as are living under overcrowded conditions or in such circumstances that they may become conveyors of infection through inefficient isolation.

In thirty-eight houses inspected during the year by reason of tuberculous inmates, thirteen cases were found not to be sleeping in separate bedrooms, and ten of these not even in separate beds.

### PNEUMONIA.

Forty-one cases of pneumonia were notified during 1942, a decrease of three on the figure for 1941. Deaths from pneumonia numbered 10. There are no facilities locally for the typing of pneumococci and for the provision of appropriate type sera, such work being of necessity performed in one of the large towns adjacent to the District.

### ENCEPHALITIS LETHARGICA (Epidemic Encephalitis).

No new notifications were received during 1942. One death occurred due to the disease.
