TO THE CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS OF THE HEALTH COMMITTEE.

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to present my third Annual Report on the Health

of the West Lancashire Rural District.

On the 5th July, 1948, several new Acts of Social Legislation came into effect, of which one was The National Health Service Act, 1946, which provides a full Medical Service without personal cost to all who care to avail themselves of it. This includes the services of the Family Doctor and Hospital facilities. The Act also requires Local Health Authorities, that is the Councils of Counties and County Boroughs to provide a number of Medical Services, some of which have been taken from District Councils. Thus the Rural District Council has lost control of its Diphtheria Immunisation Service which it has provided with notable effect since 1932. We have handed over this Service in a most healthy state in that apprximately 60 per cent. of all children in the Rural District are already immunised. Diphtheria Immunisation Clinics are being continued as before by the County Council and the figures for the Rural District are available and will be found elsewhere in this Report.

The other Service which the Rural District has lost is the provision of Accommodation for Infectious Diseases and Ambulance Provision. The West Lancashire Isolation Hospital has already been closed down and Infectious Disease cases were accommodated in the Hospital of another Authority. This arrangement continues but the Rural District Council is not now called upon to bear the cost of each patient's upkeep. The Infectious Disease Ambulance maintained by the Council has been taken over by the County Council and is now part of the complete Ambulance

Service operated by them.

On the other hand a Divisional Health Committee with Headquarters in Ormskirk has been formed to administer the County Health Services in the West Lancashire Area including Maternity and Child Welfare Services, Midwifery, Home Nursing, Home Helps, Immunisation and Vaccination, and Ambulance Services. The West Lancashire Rural District Council has four representatives on this Committee and thus has a direct interest and voice in the day to day control of all these Services.

It is too early yet to pass comment on the effect and scope of the Medical Services under the new regime, but it is hoped that some of the early difficulties which have been noted so far are only birth pangs.

The entry of the New Health Services has been helped by a good year in which the incidence of infection and disease has been low. The general health throughout the Rural District has remained satisfactory. Although the Birth Rate has fallen somewhat the Death Rate has also fallen. The Infant Mortality Rate at 32 per thousand births continues at a low level and perhaps the most satisfactory of all, the Maternal Mortality Rate was nil.

I should again like to thank all the Members of the Health Committee for their ready interest in everything concerning the Health of West Lancashire and the Members of the Staff for their help and co-operation.

BIRTHS.

There were 708 births recorded during the year, of which 345 were male and 363 female; and including 36 illegimate births, 20 male and 16 female. The birth rate per 1,000 estimated population (mid 1948) was 16.0 compared with 18.9 in 1947.

The number of births showed a fall of 79 births compared with 1947, a decrease of 2.9 per 1,000 population. The rate for England and Wales also showed a decline from 20.5 to 17.9.

DEATHS.

The total number of deaths registered during 1948, were 421, a decrease of 9 over the previous year. The death rate was 9.5 per 1,000 population compared with 10.3 in 1947. The death rate continues to compare favourable with the death rate for England and Wales which was 10.8.

Maternal Mortality.

The Maternal Mortality rate per 1,000 births (live and still) was nil compared with 2.50 in 1947, and 3.78 in 1946. The figures for England and Wales was 1.02. It is satisfactory to record that no maternal deaths occurred throughout the year and it is hoped that this position will continue.

Infant Mortality.

There were 23 deaths of infants under one year of age giving an Infantile Mortality Rate of 32 per 1,000 live births and a decrease of 4 on the figure for 1947. The rate for England and Wales was 34 per 1,000 live births.

Still Births.

The number of still births during 1948, was 27 of which were 17 male and 10 female. This is equivalent to a rate of 36 per 1,000 total live and still births. Three of these still births were illegitimate.

Section B.

GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES FOR THE AREA.

Pathological Reports.

Speciments of a simple nature, throat swabs, etc., are sent for examination at the E.M.S. Pathological Laboratory at the Ormskirk County Hospital. All other speciments rae sent to the City Laboratories, Liverpool.

One hundred and sixty-two nose and throat swabs were taken of which 28 were found to be positive for Bacillus Diphtheria.

Eleven speciments of faeces were examined, of which ten proved to be negative, but one positive for Bacillus Aertrycke.

One Vaginal Swab was tested for the presence of Bacillus Gonococci but proved negative.

One specimen of blood tested for the presence of typhoid group, one blood culture which was sterile, 2 blood cultures which shewed increased white cell count.

One Cerebro-spinal Fever examination which was normal.

4 Urine examinations, of which three contained B. Coli and one was sterile.

Hospital Accommodation.

There are no General Hospitals in the District, but patients are accommodated in the Ormskirk General Hospital, the Ormskirk County Hospital, which has a Maternity Block, or in the hospitals of the adjacent towns of Liverpool, Southport and Preston.

The Council maintained their own Isolation Hospital at Holly House, Aughton, but owing to the general reduction in cases of Infectious Disease throughout the country in recent years, it was decided to close this hospital and place it on a care and maintenance basis in August, 1946. At the same time an arrangement was made whereby cases of Infectious Disease from the West Lancashire Rural District would be admitted to the Ormskirk Isolation Hospital where necessary. It is now possible that the Aughton Hospital buildings will be taken over by the County Council and used as a Residential Home for Children.

A full account of the work carried out by the West Lancashire Isolation Hospital over 50 years was contained in the Annual Report for 1946.

Under the National Health Service Act, 1946, and after 5th July, 1948, all the Hospitals were taken over by the Liverpool Regional Hospital Board who became responsible for the administration.

AMBULANCE.

Under the National Health Service Act, 1946, all Ambulance Services are provided by the County Council after 5th July, 1948. However the existing facilities continued in West Lancashire up to the end of 1948, although the responsibility for cost was accepted by the County Council.

The Local Authority provided ambulance facilities for infectious cases only. The Ormskirk General Hospital and also the County Hospital at Ormskirk each provide ambulances for accidents and general hospital cases. Ambulances belonging to the Merseyside Hospitals' Council also operate in the area.

The Parishes formerly served by Bootle and which are outside the area served from Ormskirk, now derive their ambulance facilities from the Non-County Borough of Crosby.

The Northern Parishes are catered for by voluntary ambulance organisations in the townships of North Meols, Tarleton and Hesketh Bank.

SCHOOL CLOSURE.

It was not found necessary to close any of the schools during the year owing to the presence of infectious disease.

SCHOOL HYGIENE.

The surfacing of playgrounds is the most urgent improvement required in many of the Schools in West Lancashire since many are subject to flooding. They become muddy in winter and dusty in summer. This has been a constant complaint for many years and it is to be regretted that there is little done to improve the condition of playgrounds in general.

The building of two new Schools has been commenced. One is in Magnull, the Hudson Junior and Infants County School, the first part of which was opened on the 2nd May, 1949, enabling the temporary accommodation in shops to be given up and the other new Council School in Aintree to replace one destroyed during the War.

Free milk is provided in all Schools. The source of supply is regularly checked and samples taken by the Health Department. The milk has been satisfactory and is a great advantage to the health of the children or at least to those who take it. I am surprised, and regret to find that only approximately 60 per cent. of the children in Schools throughout the District drink the milk although it is freely available, and I would strongly recommend parents to insist that their children do drink their milk at School.

There has been little change in the condition of the Schools, except as follows:—

Hesketh-with-Becconsall C.E.

Has been decorated internally.

Tarleton Mere Brow C.E.

Has been painted externally and improved equipment for meals installed. The playground requires re-surfacing.

Bickerstaffe C.E.

Improved facilities for dinners has been provided.

Magnull C.E. Junior School.

This large School continues to increase although the recent addition of four classrooms has relieved some of the congestion. On the other hand the toilet facilities are inadequate and increased provision should be made at an early date. The playground requires re-surfacing.

St. Mark's C.E., Scarisbrick.

Some repairs to fabric have been carried out.

Scarisbrick Council School.

A new heating stove has been installed and the playground has been re-surfaced.

Aughton Christ Church.

Improvement in kitchen equipment for dinners has been provided.

Aughton Parochial School.

Part of the playground has been r-surfaced, but a further part still requires to be done. The kitchen and dining arrangements are inadequate.

DIPHTHERIA.

Central Clinics are held at certain of the schools in the Rural District where children from the neighbouring schools attend for immunisation treatment, together with pre-school children from the surrounding districts. In addition, a monthly clinic is held at the Out Patients Department, Ormskirk General Hospital, a monthly clinic at the Maghull Parish Institute and a fortnightly clinic at the Banks School Clinic.

Only five cases of Diphtheria occurred during the year with one death. Diphtheria is now almost negligible throughout the District. The death of one child was attributed to West Lancashire since the residence of the parent was in Maghull. The child was ten weeks old, born in a Liverpool Nursing Home and transferred from there to a Liverpool Isolation Hospital and died. It is thus only nominally a West Lancashire death.

SCARLET FEVER.

Forty-seven cases of Scarlet Fever were notified during the year.

All cases were of a mild type, but it was necessary to remove 14 of them to hospital. The general policy is to remove to hospital such cases of Scarlet Fever as are living under overcrowded conditions, or in such circumstances that they become conveyors of infection through inefficient isolation.

WHOOPING COUGH.

Two hundred and twenty-seven cases of Whooping Cough were notified during the year compared with 189 in 1947 and 100 in 1946.

PUERPERAL PYREXIA.

There was one notification received during the year, no deaths were recorded.

SMALLPOX.

No cases of Smallpox occured during the year.

PNEUMONIA.

Forty-five cases of pneumonia were notified during 1948, a decrease of 17 on the figure for 1947. Deaths from pneumonia numbered 16.

There are no facilities locally for the typing of pneumococci and for the provision of appropriate type sera, such work being of necessity performed in one of the large towns adjacent to the District.

ACUTE ANTERIOR POLIOMYELITIS.

Only one case of Acute Anterior Poliomyelitis was recorded during the year.

It will be recalled that during 1947, that there was an epedimic of this disease throughout the country, and that ten cases occurred in West Lancashire. These cases were recently followed up by the Health Department and it is interesting to record the results of these ten cases a year later. The following table shows that on a whole the results have been reasonably satisfactory.

Section E.

HOUSING

The post-war housing programme was marked by the tenanting of the 500th permanent traditional brick built house in December, 1948.

Expectations were exceeded, and at the close of the year 524 houses—exclusive of prefabricated bungalows—were accupied by the tenants-

On several of the sites, this achievement meant that only the first phase had been completed, and work would proceed steadily towards the completion of the estates.

For the first time since 1945, the number of live applications on the housing waiting list shewed signs of diminishing, and it is doubtful whether the number of genuine applications from families residing in the district exceeds one thousand.

As in previous years, the applicants were visited in their homes before presenting their cases to the Council's Selection Committee. This method has proved to be very revealing and many applicants were found to have moved to other districts, whilst in other cases, the circumstances had altered very considerably, sometimes for the worse and sometimes for the better.

Four old cottages situated in close proximity to a new housing site in the hamlet of Haskayne were represented to the Council as being individually unfit for habitation. The owner failed to come forward with a scheme of reconditioning or repair, and demolition orders were made.

The occupants of two of the cottages were rehoused, another one refused—on economic grounds—whilst the remaining cottage was vacant at the time of representation.

Of the ten cottages demolished, the occupants of eight of them were rehoused in new Council houses.

The Rural Housing Survey proceeded steadily throughout the year and much valuable information was gained of housing conditions.

Detailed inspections were completed in five parishes, a summary of which is given:—

Categories 3, 4 and 5 represent 40 per cent. of the total, and undoubtedly the most serious defect of all is dampness. Permanent remedies are costly and in many cases it is doubtful whether the structural conditions warrant the expenditure. Hence it is an old custom in the district to apply palliatives which alleviate but do not cure.

Hand in hand with dampness goes lack of amenities. Absence of hot water supply and fixture baths. Lack of adequate drainage, and lack of adequate cooking and washing facilities. Artificial illumination is gradually improving and it is gratifying to note that shallow well water supplies and roof water tanks used for domestic needs are on the point of disappearing for ever.

Section F.

INSPECTION AND SUPERVISION OF FOOD. DAIRIES, COWSHEDS AND PURVEYORS OF MILK.

During 1948 twenty requests for limewashing of cowsheds had to be made. The work was carried out in all cases.

The total number of registrations is made up as follows:

88 cowkeepers, 8 retail purveyors resident in the district, and 16 retail purveyors of milk non-resident.

Several requests from milk producers were received for information and guidance as to the requirements for obtaining a licence under the Milk (Special Designations) Regulations 1936/46. In each case the necessary work involved the alteration and addition to existing buildings.

MILK SAMPLING.—Fifty-nine samples of milk were taken by the Inspectors during the year.

Forty-five of the samples were for Tuberculosis, 42 of same proved to be negative and three positive.

Fourteen samples were submitted for Methylene Blue reduction. Ten proved satisfactory and four unsatisfactory.

All the examinations were carried out by the Pathological Department of the Liverpool University.

The total number of dairy and cowshed inspections made during the year was 417 and the approximate number of cows 1,350.

FOOD AND DRUGS ACT, 1948.

As from July, 1940, this Act has been administered by the County Sanitary Inspectors.

BAKEHOUSES.

There are fifteen bakehouses in the district, distributed as follows:—Aughton 2, Bickerstaffe 1, Hesketh Bank 2, Magnull 4, Netherton 2, North Meols 1, Tarleton 3. These premises are kept in a good condition.

RATS AND MICE (DESTRUCTION) ACT, 1919. INFESTATION ORDER, 1943.

The Council employ one Rodent Operative and during the year his work has consisted of re-inspection of premises following the initial survey which commenced in 1944, and the dealing with infestation complaints. These infestations were found to be of minor character and all have been dealt with satisfactorily.

The Council adopted N.S.19 Scheme from the 1st April, 1948, and, therefore, all infestations to private premises are dealt with free of charge.

The treatment of sewers and sewage works have been dealt with by the Surveyor's Department and periodical re-treatment is carried out to prevent serious re-infestation.

The co-operation with the Lancashire War Agricultural Executive Committee continued during the year in respect of treatment of farm lands and ditches adjacent to dwelling houses and factories.
