

TO THE CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS OF THE HEALTH COMMITTEE

Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present my eighth Annual Report on the Health

of West Lancashire during the year 1953.

The District has remained healthy and the number of infectious diseases notified was low, only 736 cases being notified. This was, however, a slight increase on the number notified in 1952, namely 418. The increase was mainly attributable to Measles, of which 431 cases were notified, and Whooping Cough with 182 cases. The incidence of Measles was greatest in February and March, while the highest number of Whooping Cough cases occurred in July, although they occurred mildly throughout the year. Immunisation against Whooping Cough is now available and as the number of babies so immunised increases, so the incidence of Whooping Cough should fall.

There were 51 cases of Pulmonary Tuberculosis notified compared with 45 in 1952, there is thus no decline in the incidence of this disease and there will not be until more facilities exist for removing infectious

cases from their home surroundings.

The Birth Rate was 13.7 compared with 12.0 in 1952, a satisfactory increase but still below the level for England and Wales at 15.5 per

1,000 population.

The Death Rate was 11.9 compared with 10.1 in 1952, and above the general rate for England and Wales at 11.4 per 1,000 population. The Infantile Death Rate was 36 per 1,000 live births, a regrettable increase on the record low figure of 11 in 1952. This figure relates to deaths of infants under one year, but of the 22 babies who died, 20 were actually under 4 weeks of age.

The work of the Sanitary Inspectors has continued to be of a high standard during the year; the Inspectors have visited 3,064 individual premises, and 533 defects or nuisances were discovered. Particular attention has been paid to the supervision of food premises to ensure that all commodities are prepared, stored and sold in a hygienic manner.

A major problem of a large Rural Authority is to provide main water supply and sewerage, and it is of interest to note that in the West Lancashire Rural District there are now 99.3% of all houses on main water supply, while 80% have water closets and, therefore, some form

of waterborne sewage disposal.

During the year Mr. James Ainsworth, who had been in the service of the Council for 40 years, retired from the post of Chief Sanitary Inspector. Mr. Ainsworth was well known to the people of West Lancashire and his work for the Council over these years has been of the greatest value. It is hoped that he will have a long and happy retirement.

In conclusion, I would like to thank the Health Committee for their support and encouragement during the year, and the Members of the Staff for their assistance at all times.

BIRTHS.

There were 614 births recorded during the year, of which 296 were male and 318 female; and including 17 illegitimate births, 8 male and 9 female. The crude birth rate was 14.5 per 1,000 population. The adjusted birth rate per 1,000 population (comparability factor 0.95) was 13.7 compared with 12.0 in 1952. The birth rate for England and Wales was 15.5.

Still Births.

The number of still births during 1953 was 12, of which 7 were male and 5 female. This is equivalent to a rate of 19 per 1,000 live and still births. One of these births was illegitimate.

DEATHS.

The total number of deaths registered during 1953 was 475, an increase of 77 over the previous year. The crude death rate was 11·2 per 1,000 population. The adjusted death rate (comparability factor 1·06) was 11·9 per 1,000 population compared with 10·1 in 1952. The death rate for England and Wales was 11·4.

Maternal Mortality.

There were two deaths connected with childbirth. The Maternal Mortality rate per 1,000 births (live and still) was 13-9 compared with nil for 1952. The figure for England and Wales was 0.76.

Infant Mortality.

There were 22 deaths of infants under one year of age, giving an Infant Mortality rate of 36 per 1,000 live births, an increase on the figure for 1952 which was 11. The rate for England and Wales was 26.8 per 1,000 live births.

Section B

GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES FOR THE AREA

HOSPITAL ACCOMMODATION.

There are no General Hospitals in the District, but patients are accommodated in the Ormskirk County Hospital, which has a Maternity Block, or in the hospitals of the adjacent towns of Liverpool, Southport and Preston.

All infectious disease cases are admitted where necessary to the Fazakerley Isolation Hospital, Liverpool, or to the New Hall Isolation Hospital, Scarisbrick.

AMBULANCE.

Ambulance Services are provided by the Lancashire County Council from Stations at Burscough, Crosby, Formby, Tarleton and Banks. In general, an ambulance can reach any part of the Rural District within 15 minutes.

The health of the school child has, however, remained good and no large numbers of infectious diseases have occurred.



DIPHTHERIA.

Central Clinics are held at certain of the schools in the Rural District where children from the neighbouring schools attend for immunisation treatment, together with pre-school children from the surrounding districts. In addition, monthly clinics are held at the Clinic, Ormskirk General Hospital, the Maghull Parish Institute, Scarisbrick Clinic and Tarleton Clinic, and a fortnightly clinic at the Banks School Clinic.

It is satisfactory to be able to report that no cases of Diphtheria occurred in the Rural District during the year. There is no doubt that this is due to the energetic policy of Immunisation which has been carried out over the last ten years.

Section F

INSPECTION AND SUPERVISION OF FOOD.

1. Milk and Dairies Regulations 1949.

There are 30 milk distributors registered with the Local Authority, 21 of which have dairy premises in the district.

52 visits were made to these dairies and the premises were found satisfactory.

2. The Milk (Special Designation) (Raw Milk) Regulations 1949.

3. Milk Sampling.

Seventy/eight samples for Tuberculosis were taken by the Inspectors during the year. Three proved positive and seventy/five negative.

The positive cases were referred to the Divisional Inspector, Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries.

Sixty samples for Methylene Blue Test were taken, twenty/two were unsatisfactory and thirty/eight satisfactory.

The unsatisfactory cases were referred to the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries for any action considered necessary.

4. Shellfish Sampling.

Seven samples of cockles and mussels were obtained from shellfish promises in the area, and these samples showed a satisfactory result after boiling.

Bakehouses.

There are thirteen bakehouses in the district, distributed as follows:—

Aughton 2 Maghull 3 North Meols 1
Bickerstaffe 1 Melling 1 Tarleton 3
Hesketh Bank 2

Forty/four inspections have been made during the year, and the premises are kept in a satisfactory state.

6. Ice Cream.

There are five manufacturers and eighty/four dealers of ice cream in the area.

Two hundred and three visits are inspections were made to the premises where the ice cream is manufactured and sold.

During the year forty/eight samples of ice cream were obtained and submitted for the Methylene Blue Reduction Test.

Results of these samples were :-

Grade II — 23 Grade III — 12 Grade III — 9 Grade IV — 4

Of the total samples taken 73% were in Grade I and II.

7. Meat and Other Foods.

Byelaws under Section 15, Food and Drugs Act, 1938, for securing observance of sanitary and cleanly conditions and practices in connection with the handling, wrapping and delivery of food sold, are in operation.

Shops, vehicles and premises where food is prepared, stored, conveyed or sold, are kept under constant supervision, and two hundred and twenty one inspections were made.

The following meat and other foods were condemned during the

year :-

The Prevention of Damage by Pests Act 1949.

The Council employ one whole-time and one part-time Rodent Operative, and the control of rats and mice infestations has been maintained during the year. A routine search has continued in a similar manner to that of previous years.

Disinfestation has been carried out at private dwellings, business premises, schools, canteens, refuse tips and agricultural property.

The Council have continued with the scheme of "free service" to private dwelling houses.

The treatment of sewers and sewage works is undertaken by the Surveyor's Department, and periodical re-treatments are carried out to prevent serious re-infestations.

The maximum co-operation exists with the Lancashire Agricultural Executive Committee in respect of farm lands.
