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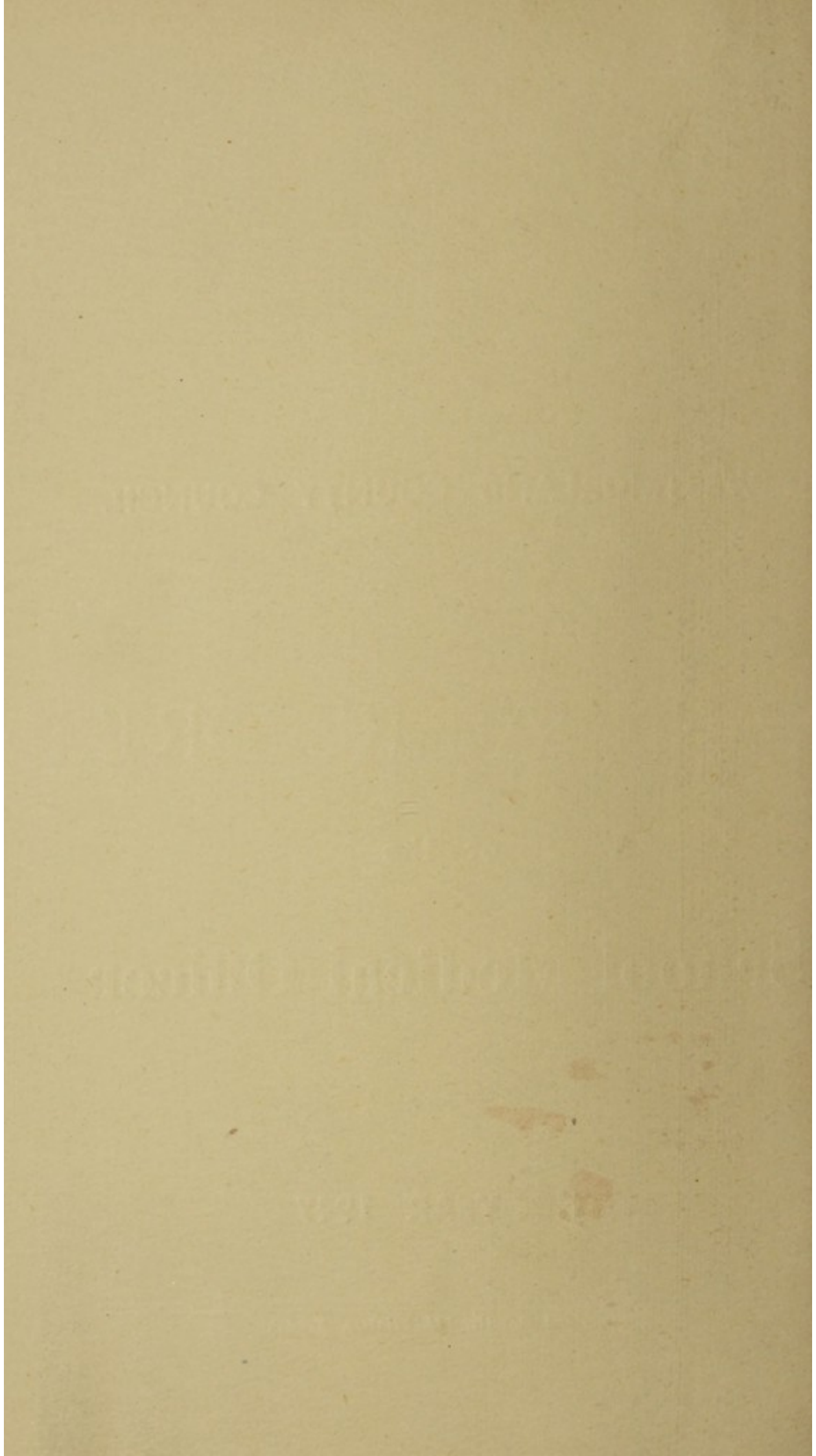

Introduction to the Annual Report on the School Health Service

The year 1947 has again seen some alteration in the School Medical Staff. Dr. Wright, the Assistant School Medical Officer, who had been in Westmorland for 17 years, resigned on 31st March, and one would not like her to leave without making some mention of her long years of service and notable contribution to the School Medical Service in Westmorland. Dr. Joseph Berkeley was appointed to the vacant position and took up duty in May.

During the year some increases in the scope of the Service have occurred. From November, the Child Guidance Clinic was held fortnightly instead of monthly. With a view to making the Orthopaedic Service more readily available a new clinic was opened in Kirkby Stephen and the County is now adequately covered by this Service. Unfortunately the speech therapist resigned in September and we have been unable to replace her, so that this service is in the meantime in abeyance.

On the whole the general health of the school children has been satisfactory and although our diet is restricted there has been no appreciable increase in the number of children falling into the "C" category.

In the summer, in common with the rest of Great Britain we suffered to some extent from an outbreak of poliomyelitis, which was the worst since 1911. There was also an outbreak of measles, especially in the northern part of the county, resulting in a serious temporary diminution in the numbers of children attending school.

When Dr. Wright left it was necessary to make a different arrangement for the examination of children with defective vision and a scheme was initiated whereby children having simple refractive errors were referred to ophthalmic opticians for prescription and provision of spectacles. Children with more serious defects were examined by the consultant eye specialists, Mr. Brownlie and Mr. Sumner.

I wish to thank the members of your Committee, the staff of the Education Department, the Medical, Nursing and Clerical Staff of the School Health Department for their loyal co-operation and help.

Milk in Schools Scheme.

The number of schools supplied with milk is satisfactory; only 6 schools have no milk scheme in operation. So far as possible Tuberculin Tested milk is supplied in one-third pint bottles. Failing this, Pasteurised milk is supplied. Out of a total of 115 schools the number of schools supplied with milk is 109, as follows:—

Classification of General Condition of Children Examined at Medical Inspection.

In accordance with the instructions of the Ministry of Education the old classification of "Nutrition" has now been abandoned and the term "General Condition" substituted, because most doctors feel that it is extremely difficult to diagnose the state of nutrition at an ordinary clinical examination. The Ministry state that the division of children into classes A (Good), B (Fair) and C (Poor), is not a scientific one and that it will not be of much use for statistical purposes, but it will be regarded as the doctor's general impression of the child at the end of the examination.

Infestation (Uncleanliness).

During the past year 23,390 examinations were carried out by the District Nurses and the number of children found to be suffering from vermin or nits was 536, which compares favourably with the number 629 of the previous year.

Special Ear, Nose and Throat Defects.

Children with special defects or abnormalities are referred to the Westmorland County Hospital to be seen by the consulting surgeon. This procedure has been helpful in dealing with such cases as chronic otorrhoea, increasing deafness, infected sinuses. The following list illustrates the type of case referred:—

Minor Ailments.

No change has been made in the method of dealing with children suffering from minor ailments. In Kendal the Stramongate School Clinic has been held daily throughout the term. In the rural areas children are referred to their own doctors by the school nurse or School Medical Officer. The commoner ailments have been multiple septic sores, minor injuries, impetigo contagiosa, other skin diseases, minor eye defects. In addition to the treatment of minor defects, mothers have frequently sought the advice of the Clinic Doctor on points of health and general hygiene.

Skin Diseases.

There was a marked decrease in the number of children suffering from scabies, the number for 1947 being 34, contrasting with 67 in the previous year. The treatment adopted was by benzyl benzoate.

There was also a decrease in the number of children suffering from ringworm—28 as contrasting with 33 in the previous year. Advantage was taken of the facilities at the Laboratory at the School of Tropical Medicine, London, for the diagnosis of cases.

The report of the Chief Medical Officer of the Ministry of Education was particularly helpful in connection with the diagnosis and treatment of ringworm and so far as possible his advice has been carried out.

Orthopaedic Scheme.

Apart from the opening of a new clinic at Kirkby Stephen no substantial changes have been made in the County Orthopaedic Scheme. Clinics are held in Kendal and Kirkby Stephen at three monthly intervals, in Penrith and at Ethel Hedley Hospital

at two monthly intervals. Children with orthopaedic defects are noted at school examinations and referred to orthopaedic clinics where a diagnosis is made and the appropriate treatment advised. Follow-up work is done by a part-time nurse who has had experience of orthopaedic work. During the year 328 children attended clinics and received treatment or advice. 12 children received in-patient treatment; 863 visits to children at their homes or at schools were made by the orthopaedic nurse. The principal defects found were: Flat feet, knock knees, hallux valgus, hammer toe, postural defects, and old congenital deformities.

Handicapped Pupils.

Under the Education Act, 1944, it is the duty of the Local Education Authority to ascertain what children require special educational treatment. These children are usually reported by the school teachers to the School Medical Officer who examines them and reports to the Local Education Authority. The number of new cases examined during the year is 9, shown in the table below under the headings given in the Handicapped Pupils Regulations, 1945.

The object of these examinations is to place the Handicapped Child in a school or class where he will receive special education calculated to make the best use of his limited capabilities. The position with regard to the placing of pupils in special boarding schools is far from satisfactory and many more such schools will require to be built before the problem is solved.

Diphtheria Immunisation.

The practice of immunising infants at or before the first birthday and again on entering school is adhered to. All parents are urged to give their consent to their children having a "booster" dose at 5 years old and this has been found to work satisfactorily. There have been no epidemics of diphtheria during the past year—only 5 children contracted the disease and there were no deaths. (For numbers of children immunised during the year see table on page 10).

Diphtheria Immunisation—Records.

In 1947 the Minister of Health evolved a card index system and by the end of the year this system, with various modifications to meet local needs, was put into operation. This method of record keeping has already proved its worth as a means of tracing non-immunised children.

Ultra-Violet Ray Clinics.

There are two Ultra Violet Ray Clinics within the County—one at Kendal and one at Windermere. The following number of school children were treated:—

Treatment of Defective Vision.

Refractive errors in school children were previously treated by Dr. Wright, Assistant School Medical Officer. On her resignation in March a Scheme was evolved for the referral of children suffering from refractive errors to the local ophthalmic opticians, with whom arrangements for the supply of standard type spectacles to school children were made.

Any children suffering from defects other than refractive errors are referred to the Council's consultant eye specialists, Mr. Sumner and Mr. Brownlie.

REPORT OF THE SENIOR DENTAL OFFICER FOR THE YEAR 1947.

Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to submit the Annual Report on dental inspection and treatment of Primary and Secondary school children in the County of Westmorland. The total figures will be found on page 17.

Mr. W. McGregor Morton, L.D.S., resigned as from 31st January, and Mr. Colin Parkinson, L.D.S., commenced duty on 1st February.

Primary and Secondary Schools.

During the year, all schools, with four exceptions, were inspected and treated. A total of 8,169 children were inspected, 5,189 were found to require treatment and 3,860 were treated.

Consent forms were issued to 1,192 children, either as new entrants, transferred from other local authorities, or because they wished to change to another group. The results were very satisfactory—“A” Group 81 per cent., “B” Group 8 per cent., and “C” Group 11 per cent. There are still one or two “black” spots in the County and every effort is being made by the dental staff and teachers to encourage children in “B” and “C” groups to change to “A” group.

Invitations to parents of school entrants to be present at the first dental inspection, are now being issued and this gives the dental officers an opportunity of encouraging parents to accept full dental treatment throughout the child's school life.

At one secondary school, the Head Teacher asked children, who attended private dentists, to bring a certificate of dental fitness on completion of treatment, and the response to this was very satisfactory.

Good progress was made during the year in the conservation of temporary teeth, and extractions were very considerably reduced. In temporary teeth the proportion was 2 fillings to 5 extractions, and in permanent teeth, 3 fillings to 1 extraction. The number of permanent teeth extracted may seem high, but this is accounted for by the large number, 415, extracted for orthodontic purposes. Altogether 197 children were treated by this means for irregularities, apparent or anticipated. Much has been done during the year to avoid irregularities by the symmetrical extraction of the six-year-old molars.

Other operations included 349 scalings, 386 dressings, root treatments, gum treatments, silver nitrate applications and 386 adjustments, etc., of orthodontic appliances. 19 small partial dentures were provided. In most cases these replaced teeth lost as the result of accidents.

Orthodontics.

64 appliances were provided during the year and 20 cases were completed. The majority of the appliances were of the movable type, oral screens and inclined planes, but a few fixed appliances were also used.

Mobile Dental Surgery.

After much delay, this was delivered in November and has operated very successfully in the rural areas since that time. The 12 feet van, mounted on a 2-ton chassis, provides a most compact and well fitted surgery. The advantages of this over poor temporary premises, in which portable equipment was used, cannot be too highly stressed. In every way I feel sure that the Dental Van will be a real acquisition to the County Dental Service.

Maternity and Child Welfare.

72 sessions were devoted to this work and it is anticipated that there will be an ever increasing demand for this service.

I desire to express my thanks to all the members of the dental staff for their very excellent work during the year. My thanks are also due again to the Head Teachers for the very valuable assistance and co-operation which they give.
