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

To the Chairman and Members of the Weymouth Port Health Authority

MR. CHAIRMAN AND GENTLEMEN,

In accordance with Article 17(5) of the Sanitary Officers' (Outside London) Regulations 1935, I have to submit for your information and consideration my Annual Report as your Medical Officer of Health for the year 1949.

As requested in Ministry of Health Circular 104/49, this Report has been prepared on the lines indicated in Memorandum 302/S.A. and permanent arrangements which were fully described in the Annual Reports for 1946-48 and have not since been altered, have been omitted from this Report. Certain statistical information—included in the Tables which follow—has already been forwarded to the Ministry of Health.

No unusual occurrences took place and it was not necessary to make any special report to the Ministry of Health during the year.

On certain occasions when it was necessary to board vessels in Weymouth Bay or further out in the Channel to remove sick or injured merchant seamen, the Captain-in-Charge, H.M. Dockyard, Portland, put an M.F.V. at my disposal and this co-operation was very much appreciated.

It is again a pleasure to have this opportunity of thanking the Members of the Authority for their kindness and consideration, the Clerk for his ready co-operation and Mr. E. V. Abbey, Port Health Inspector, for his willing assistance at all times. I am also most grateful to the Divisional Marine Manager, British Railways, and the Officers of H.M.
