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

To the Chairman and Members of the Weymouth Port Health Authority

MR. CHAIRMAN, MRS. JOLLY AND GENTLEMEN,

In accordance with Article 17(5) of the Sanitary Officers' (Outside London) Regulations 1935, I have to submit for your information and consideration my Annual Report as your Medical Officer of Health for the year 1950.

As requested in Ministry of Health Circular 103/50, this Report has been prepared on the lines indicated in Memorandum 302/S.A. and any permanent arrangements which have been fully described in the Annual Reports for 1946-49 and have not since been altered, have been omitted from this Report.

No unusual occurrences took place and it was not necessary to make any special report to the Ministry of Health during the year.


