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


No unusual occurrences took place and it was not necessary to make any special report to the Ministry of Health during the year.

MEDICAL INSPECTION OF ALIENS.

The Port is not approved for the landing of aliens.

III - Water Supply.

Chlorinated water from the Weymouth and Portland public supplies is used at the docks concerned.

Six samples from the water tanks of two ships regularly using the Port were submitted for bacteriological examination, and all were reported to be satisfactory.

IV - Port Health Regulations, 1933 and 1945.

There is no change to report in local arrangements.

In their letter dated 26th January 1951, the Ministry of Health stated that health control of Royal Fleet Auxiliaries and Merchant Fleet Auxiliaries arriving in a Naval or other port should, after 1st March 1951, be applied by the Port Health Authority instead of by the Naval Medical Officer of Health as hitherto. For several years this suggested new procedure had been in force in this Port and no change was therefore called for.
