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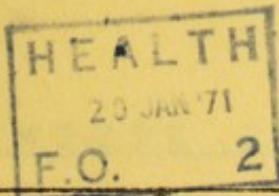


This Report is submitted in the manner specified in Form Port 20 which accompanied Ministry of Health Circular 33/52 dated 6th November, 1952. This indicated that a full report was to be made in 1955 and thereafter quinquennially while for the intermediate years only changes which occurred during the year should be referred to in Sections I, V, VI, VIII, XIV, XV and XVI - all marked with an asterisk. This Report for 1970 is, therefore, a full report.

In accordance with Regulation 12(1) of the Health Officer's Orders (1967) (Health Officer's Regulations, 1967), I have to submit for your information and consideration my annual report for the year 1970.

This report is submitted to the nearest authority in Form Post 10 which accompanied Ministry of Health Circular 37/51 dated 10 November, 1967. ### SECTION V\*- WATER SUPPLY

#### 1. Source of supply for (a) the district

Weymouth - Dorset Water Board's springs at Empool and Sutton Poyntz

Portland - Dorset Water Board's deep borehole at Friar Waddon

#### (b) Shipping

Mains from the Weymouth and Portland supplies

#### 2. Reports of Tests for Contamination

Samples are regularly examined at the Public Health Laboratory, Dorchester, from the mains supplies in both Weymouth and Portland. The water supplies for both Weymouth and Portland are chlorinated at source. Reports of all bacteriological examinations are freely available to the Port Medical Officer in his capacity as Medical Officer of Health to the two districts.

#### 3. Precautions taken against contamination of hydrants and hosepipes

At Weymouth Harbour, the Berthing Master is responsible for the safe custody and cleanliness of the stand pipes for connection to the Water Board's main on the quay. Each ship regularly using the harbour has its own hosepipes.

At Portland the supply of water to shipping, i.e. R.F.A. tanker is an Admiralty responsibility.



4. Number and sanitary condition of water boats, and powers of control by the Authority

No water boats are maintained by the Authority, or by any other civil organisation. In Portland, this is an Admiralty responsibility.

5. Water Tanks

Water tanks on eight ships were inspected subsequent to repair and cleansing.

6. Water Samples

Five samples from four ships were taken for bacteriological examination - four of these were satisfactory. One sample was unsatisfactory but a follow-up sample was satisfactory. Three samples submitted by British Rail were satisfactory.

SECTION VI\* - PUBLIC HEALTH (SHIPS) REGULATIONS, 1966-68

1. List of Infected Areas

Information is received each week direct from the World Health Organisation at Geneva. Fresh lists giving appropriate extracts from this W.H.O. Weekly Epidemiological Record are sent each week to (a) Port Health Inspector, (b) H.M. Customs, Weymouth, and (c) H.M. Customs, Portland.

2. Radio Messages

- (a) Arrangements for sending permission by radio for ships to enter the district

This Port is not a "Radio transmitting port" but should the necessity arise, appropriate messages can be transmitted through Niton Radio, Isle of Wight.

- (b) Arrangements for receiving messages from ships and for acting thereon

From time to time, messages are relayed from ships at sea direct to the Port Medical Officer by telephone from Niton Radio, Isle of Wight.

In this connection it is a pleasure to place on record one's high appreciation of the whole-hearted co-operation invariably extended by the staff of Niton Radio.

3. Notifications other than by Radio

The R.N. Signals Station, Portland, is most co-operative in deciphering and passing on to the Port Medical Officer, flag and other signals from ships within the district of the Port Health Authority.

Occasionally, messages are received by the Port Medical Officer from shipping agents in either Weymouth or Portland.



## SECTION VI\* - PUBLIC HEALTH (SHIPS) REGULATIONS, 1966-68 (cont'd)

"Portelth, Weymouth", is the registered telegraphic address of the Port Medical Officer's office at the Health Centre, Weymouth, where messages can be received and necessary action taken thereon at any time during the day and night.

### 4. Mooring Stations

This Port is not regularly used by shipping which might come within the definition of "infected ship" or "suspected ship."

If, however, such circumstances should arise, the ship would be instructed to anchor in Weymouth Bay and would be boarded without delay by the Port Medical Officer.

In the event of it becoming necessary to detain any ship, arrangements would be made with Queens Harbour Master, H.M. Naval Base, Portland, for the ship to tie up to a mooring buoy in Portland Harbour subject to Naval commitments permitting this to be done.

### 5. Arrangements for:

- (a) Hospital accommodation for infectious cases - other than Smallpox

These are admitted to the West Haven (Infectious Diseases) Hospital, Radipole Lane, Weymouth. Tel. Weymouth 6116.

- (b) Surveillance and follow-up of contacts

Arrangements are made for this to be carried out in accordance with the Public Health (Ships) Regulations.

- (c) Cleansing and disinfection of ships, persons, clothing and other articles

Materials for cleansing and disinfection are readily available by arrangement with Weymouth Borough Health Department. Disinfestation of verminous persons and clothing etc. can also be carried out by same Department which has a steam disinfection plant and other cleansing station facilities.

1. The Port Health Inspectors carried out a detailed inspection for rodents in 60 ships arriving from foreign ports.
2. Arrangements have been made for the bacteriological and pathological examinations of rodents to be carried out by the Public Health Laboratory Service at Dorchester. No such examinations were carried out during 1970.
3. Small infestations are dealt with by trapping and baiting. Large scale infestations would be dealt with by specialist fumigation firms from Southampton or London.
