J.M. YARHAM J.D. STEWART To His Worship the Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors of Whitley Bay Borough Council.

I have pleasure in presenting my Annual Report on the Public Health and Sanitary conditions of the Borough for the year ended 31st December 1962.

The population of the Borough continues to increase and at the end of the year the total number was 36,730 persons. This is an increase of 920 over the previous year. The birth rate remained unchanged, a total of 583 live births being reported during the year. Maternal mortality was again nil, this being the fifth year that no death has occurred in association with child birth. This again indicates the continued success of the antenatal services.

The total notifications of infectious diseases showed a decrease, the total being 133 compared with 554 last year. The decrease was mainly caused by the drop in the number of measles notifications.

The general health of the population was good and no cases of poliomyelitis, smallpox, meningitis, diphtheria or typhoid occurred during the year. There were no deaths from any of the common infectious diseases and I am pleased to report that no deaths occurred from tuberculosis. The main cause of death was again coronary thrombosis and other forms of heart disease. This accounted for approximately half the total number of deaths in the Borough. The number of deaths from coronary thrombosis rose from 97 to 123.

Smoking and Health

During the year the Royal College of Physicians published a report on their investigations into the connection between smoking and health. The report showed that cigarette smoking is a cuase of lung cancer and bronchitis and probably contributes to the development of the coronary heart disease. One of the recommendations of the report was that there should be more education of the public, especially school children, concerning the hazards of smoking. They also recommended that smoking should be generally discouraged especially in young people. Following the publication of this report the Minister of Health circularised all local authorities asking them to support any measures to bring home to the public the dangers of smoking. Throughout the year the Ministry of Health has produced posters and other publicity material showing the dangers of smoking. In the Borough publicity material has been distributed to clinics, schools and local Doctors. It is unfortunate that while efforts are being made at a local level to discourage smoking, the cigarette manufacturers continue to advertise on a national scale by television, the cinema, and newspapers, as well as by the use of huge posters displayed on hoardings. It seems that publicity showing the dangers of smoking will have little effect until this national advertising of cigarettes is stopped.

Fluoridation of Water

At the end of the year the Ministry of Health issued a circular to all local authorities stating that the Minister of Health was ready to approve the making of arrangements with water undertakings for the addition of fluoride to water supplies which are deficient in it naturally. The Minister made it

clear that this was being done in an effort to reduce the incidence of dental decay in children. The Minister was completely satisfied that the scruples held by some of the population about fluoridation were unfounded and groundless. In this connection it is interesting to note that among 5 year old school children in this area, while only 20% were free of dental decay in 1948, the proportion had reduced to 9% in 1958; and at the present time only 6 or 7 out of every 100 school children at the age of 5 have good teeth. While it has been proved that fluoridation of water supplies reduces the incidence of dental decay, it is obvious that there is still a need for the education of children in good dental hygiene, including the regular cleaning of teeth and a reduction in sweet eating which is undoubtedly the prime cause of dental decay in children.

Before ending my report I would mention the problem of the aged living alone. During our hard north country winters there are weeks when many aged persons living alone find it difficult to go out of their own homes. Although these people are assisted by health visitors, home helps and voluntary workers, there is still a need to extend this work. One measure which helps these old people considerably is the provision of a Meals on Wheels service. Although at the moment the service in Whitley Bay is very small, I am pleased to report that the Council has given favourable consideration to assisting the local W.V.S. to expand the service.

In conclusion I would like to express my thanks to all members of the staff for their support during the year and also to the members of the Health Committee who have continued to show an interest in all measures affecting the health of the public.

SECTION "A"

STATISTICAL AND SOCIAL CONDITIONS OF THE BOROUGH

The Borough comprises an area of 3,612 acres, including the foreshore which is 510 acrea. It continues in popularity as a holiday resort and has excellent rail and bus connections to and from all parts of the country. It has a wide variety of interests and entertainments along the whole of the sea front with the picturesque St. Mary's Island and Lighthouse at the North end of the Bay, and fine golden sands stretch for nearly two miles.

The Borough is divided electorally into eight Wards, which are represented by twenty-four Councillors and eight Aldermen. The rateable value now stands at £1,363,294, the product of a penny rate being £5,600. The population at mid-year 1962, was 36,730 an increase of 920. There are 12,510 houses in the area.

Births

The number of live births for the year was 583 giving a birth rate of 15.87 per 1,000 population. 306 of these were males and 277 females. The Registrar General's compatability factor is 1.02 which alters the birth rate for the area to 16.19 per 1,000. There were 11 male and 16 female illegitimate births, representing 4.63 per cent of the total births, and the number of still births was 13 representing 2.23 per cent of the total births. Six of these were males and seven females.

Deaths

522 deaths were recorded by the Registrar General, consisting of 232 males and 290 females. The crude death rate for the area was 14.21 per 1,000 of the population, but adjustment by the Registrar General's compatability figures of 93 reduces this figure to 13.21.

The causes of all deaths are shown in the table on the following page.

Longevity

Of the 522 deaths in the area 387 of them occurred at the age of 65 years or over. This represents 74.14 per cent. Details are given in five year groups in the following table.

SECTION "B"

HEALTH SERVICES IN THE AREA

1. Infectious Diseases

The Newcastle Regional Hospital Board administers the Clinics, Hospitals and Sanatoria dealing with treatment necessary for Tuberculosis cases under the National Health Service Act 1946. Other infectious diseases which require hospitalisation are treated at Moor Park Hospital, North Shields, and Walkergate Hospital, Newcastle on Tyne.

2. Medical and Surgical Cases

These are mostly treated in Hospitals and Infirmaries under the jurisdiction of the Newcastle Group Hospital Board and the South East Northumberland Hospital Management Committee.

3. Child and Maternity Welfare

These services and the Clinics connected with them are administered by the Northumberland County Council.

4. Home Nursing

This Service is also controlled by the County Council.

5. Ambulance Service

This is a Radio controlled service administered by the County Council. The Ambulance Depot is situated at Hill Heads and gives a 24 hours daily service.

6. First Aid

A fully equipped Station, manned by qualified personnel, is operated by the Borough and is of great service to visitors and residents during the busy season. The personnel consists of one full time Nurse, and volunteer members of the St. John Ambulance Brigade. 799 cases were dealt with during the season. The Station is situated on the Central Lower Promenade.

7. Lost Children

This Station is provided by the Borough and is also situated on the Lower Promenade. A full time attendant cares for the children when brought in, until recovered by the parents.

8. Public Health Laboratories

These Laboratories are attached to the Newcastle General Hospital, and are of great servce to this Department, and also the Medical Practitioners in the area.

Progress was made in all sections of the Department during the year with special regard to the application of Hygiene Regulations to premises and shops where food is prepared or sold. Our sim to advise and educate food handlers reaped the reward of co-operation from persons approached and no legal proceedings in this respect were required.

I welcomed the instruction from the Council in April to proceed with preparatory work on our first anoke control area incorporating 784 dwelling houses, and unfortunately the hopes for quick expansion of amoke free areas have been ensloyed by reports of uncertain supplies of amokeless fuel for use on open fires. I trust this position will be viewed as a problem to be faced and overcome, and not as a reason egainst the progress, undoubtably to the benefit of all to stop air pollution from domestic sources.

The closing down in September of the town's only public caravan site means that as a holiday town, a visit to Whitley Hay can not be considered by people who spend their holiday in a caravan elimer touring or permanently sited unless such persons are members of the British Caravan Club, whose private site at Old Hartley continues to function successfully.

I am pleased to record that the Department completed an efficient years work as a result of the willing co-operation and personal efforts of each member of the staff, and the reliance which can be placed on the workmen in the Refuse Collection and Disposal Sections.

I would also like to express appreciation of the support I have received from the Chairman and Members of the Health Committee and from Dr. Hay throughout 1962.

Moveable Dwellings

As a result of the occupiers decision not to improve sanitary conditions at the Redhouse Farm Caravan Site to ensure compliance with licencing conditions, the site was finally closed in September when the last caravan left the field.

The Caravan Club of Great Britain continue to operate their attractive private site at Old Hartley in a laudable manner.

No individual applications for licences to site moveable dwellings were received.

GENERAL SANITATION

The number of complaints and enquiries received in the Office and recorded in the Complaints Book was 1,374.

Queries on all manner of health matters were dealt with and followed up by personal inspections when necessary.

Water Supply

The Medical Officer of Health's Report contains results of examination of water supplies in the town.

Drainage Drainage

The number of obstructed drainage systems cleared on request was 101.

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Inspection and testing of drainage installations required the application of 5 water tests and 21 smoke tests.

Sanitary Conveniences

Repairs and renewals were obtained to 7 water closet compartments and to 9 water closet cisterns.

Only 1 dry closet remains in use in the Borough at the Chapel

Offensive Trades

The business of tripe boiling and fat extraction carried on within the Hillheads Slaughterhouse is the only "offensive trade" within the Borough.

The high standard of cleanliness in this particular factory avoided any complaints or nuisance during the year.

While extreme care is being applied in the handling of this poison, it would seem to offer advantages in increasing the number of poison treatments which can be applied to the sewers during any one year without increasing costs.

Piggeries

The large piggery at Murton Village was inspected on several occasions and I am pleased to record no need for any formal action was necessary.

Two other small premises in the town are only used sporadically but these were also visited.

Two premises previously licensed for the sale of pets discontinued their trade during the year. The number of licensed premises is now 6. Routine inspections were carried out having regard to licensed conditions safeguarding the health and welfare of animals regarded as pets.

Atmospheric Pollution

It was necessary during the year to resite the volumetric air pollution gauge at present in use in the town. Fortunately the change involved merely a removal from one part of the school to another.

Referring to smoke pollution graphs which have appeared in this report in previous years, the inclusion of the details for 1962 is not practicable as final figures have not yet been received from the Department of Scientific and Industrial Research. This will mean that in future, smoke pollution graphs in this annual report will refer to the year preceeding the date of the report and the 1962 graph will appear in the annual report for 1963.

Ice Cream

The introduction of new machinery for the manufacture of soft ice cream required special attention during the year. Whereas ice cream equipment used in bulk ice cream factories was subject to sterilisation by experienced employees, there is now the problem of educating individual retailers using this type of equipment in the methods of proper cleaning and sterilisation. A retailer using a machine for the production of soft ice cream becomes a manufacturer and is subject to registration by the local authority.

Meat and Other Foods

The post-mortem inspection of all animals passing through the slaughterhouse was maintained at 100% and an increase in the demand on inspectors time in carrying out this work can again be noted.

At the close of the year draft regulations were being considered at Ministry level which would introduce a system of charging by local authorities for the post-mortem inspection of all animals. Such a system would be to the financial benefit of a local authority like Whitley Bay where routine inspectors work is sacrificed to ensure the inspection of all animals slaughtered, the majority of which are for consumption outside our own boundary.

The grant received by the Council for work in the inspection of "export" meat was £513.18.11.

A once weekly collection of domestic refuse applies in the area and this service is increased for hotels, shops and other trade premises where limited storage space is available or the nature of the refuse is offensive.

A new S.D. Bulk Loading Refuse Vehicle was put in service early in 1962 as a replacement for the Thorneycroft vehicle. Also during the year a demonstration was arranged for the new Pakamatic refuse vehicle and an order was placed for such a machine to be delivered in March 1963.

The increasing use of paper sacks as an alternative to dustbins by several local authorities suggests that this system is not an idea without advantages and while the Council decided in 1960 not to proceed with an experimental area, it may be, in the light of developments, that further consideration to the introduction of a pilot scheme should be considered.

Refuse Disposal

at Seaton Hall Farm continuing the system of land reclamation affected with subsidence and flooding.

As a result of an approach from the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food, land experts a change in the arrangements for top-soil and clay removal were necessary. This work is now being carried out by a private contractor to ensure that clay and top-soil are returned over the refuse in two distinct layers which was not previously practicable using our own equipment.
