

To: His Worship the Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors of the Whitley Bay Borough Council.

I have pleasure in presenting my Annual Report on the public health and sanitary conditions of the Borough for the year ended 31st December, 1966.

The general state of health in the Borough was satisfactory and the incidence of infectious disease was low, the only exception was measles, a mild epidemic of which has caused 300 cases to be notified during the year. There were no cases of poliomyelitis, diphtheria, smallpox or typhoid fever notified. The immunisation campaign against poliomyelitis, diphtheria and whooping cough continues at the infant welfare centres and remains an important measure in controlling these diseases. To date about 15,000 persons in the town have had a primary course of immunisation against poliomyelitis and for the last few years not a single case of poliomyelitis has been reported.

The maternal mortality was again nil, this being the ninth successive year in which no death occurred in association with childbirth.

The general death rate was about the National Average but it is interesting that out of the 615 deaths almost 80% occurred in persons over the age of 65 years. The main cause of death was coronary thrombosis, which accounted for 145 deaths and the second commonest cause was once again lung cancer. I am sorry to report that cancer of the lung again increased, and during the year 36 persons died of this disease. It is significant that 29 of these deaths were males and only 7 females. I would repeat my warning that this disease is associated with cigarette smoking and this probably accounts for the difference in the death rate between the sexes. It is the duty of parents to see that their children are aware of the dangers in cigarette smoking. Five of the persons who died of cancer of the lung were under the age of 55 and 17 under the age of 65.

Deaths from motor accidents also increased to 11 from 5 in the preceding year. Police statistics show that the majority of motor accidents occur on Saturday nights between the hours of 10 p.m. and midnight. This would seem to lend strength to the "Don't Drink and Drive" campaign. Steps to increase smoke control in the town continued during the year but were delayed to some extent as it was necessary to hold a Public Inquiry to consider objections to No.2 Smoke Control Area. At this Inquiry it was made public that although the atmospheric pollution in Whitley Bay is low in the summer months, it rises to a high level in the winter and in the months of December and January is often as high as in many industrial towns. As there is a high proportion of elderly people in the Borough, these persons are very susceptible to respiratory diseases and to the adverse effects of atmospheric pollution. I am pleased, therefore, that the Health Committee and the Council have decided to go ahead with their plans to extend Smoke Control Orders throughout the town, as this is a worthwhile public health measure.

Inspection of meat at the slaughterhouse continues to occupy a large proportion of the time of the public health inspectors and increases each year, during the last year 70,000 animals were dealt with and of these 9,000 had some part condemned as unfit for human consumption. I am grateful that the Chief Public Health Inspector and the Senior Assistant Public Health Inspector managed to keep up the high standard of inspection in spite of staff shortage. This is important work which directly protects the health of the public.

In conclusion I would express my thanks to the Chairman and Members of the Health Committee for their continued interest and support in all measures to improve public health.

#### STATISTICAL AND SOCIAL CONDITIONS OF THE BOROUGH

The Borough comprises an area of 3,612 acres, including the foreshore which is 510 acres. It continues in popularity as a holiday resort and has excellent rail and bus connections to and from all parts of the country. It has a wide variety of interests and entertainments with the picturesque St. Mary's Island and Lighthouse at the north end of the bay. Fine golden sands stretch for nearly two miles.

The Borough is divided electorally into eight wards which are represented by twenty-four councillors and eight aldermen. The rateable value now stand at £1,480,000, the product of the penny rate being £6,000. The population at mid-year 1966 was 38,340 an increase of 30. There are 12,960 houses in the area, of which 1,644 are owned by the Borough Council.

#### Births

The number of live births for the year was 584 giving a birth rate of 12.39 per 1,000 population. 304 of these were males and 280 females. The Registrar General's comparability factor is 1.06 which alters the birth rate for the area to 13.13 per 1,000. There were 13 male and 17 female illegitimate births, representing 5.30 per cent of the total births, and the number of still births was 6 representing 1.02 per cent of the total births. 2 of these were males and 4 females.

#### Deaths

615 deaths were recorded by the Registrar General, consisting of 285 males and 330 females. The crude death rate for the area was 16.04 per 1,000 of the population, but adjustment by the Registrar General's comparability figures of .79 reduces this figure to 12.67.

The causes of all deaths are shown in the table on the following page.

#### Longevity

Of the 615 deaths in the area, 478 of them occurred at the age of 65 years or over. This represents 77.72 per cent. Details are given in the following table.

#### SECTION "B"

#### HEALTH SERVICES IN THE AREA

#### 1. Infectious Diseases

The Newcastle Regional Hospital Board administers the clinics, hospitals and sanatoria dealing with treatment necessary for Tuberculosis cases under the National Health Service Act, 1946. Other infectious diseases which require hospitalisation are treated at Moor Park Hospital, North Shields and Walkergate Hospital, Newcastle upon Tyne.

#### 2. Medical and Surgical Cases

These are mostly treated in hospitals and infirmaries under the jurisdiction of the Newcastle Group Hospital Board and the South East Northumberland Hospital Management Committee.

#### 3. Child and Maternity Welfare

These services and the clinics connected with them are administered by the Northumberland County Council.

#### 4. Home Nursing

This service is also controlled by the County Council.

#### 5. Ambulance Service

This is a radio controlled service administered by the County Council. The Ambulance Depot is at Hillheads and gives a 24 hour daily service.

#### 6. First Aid

A fully equipped station, manned by qualified personnel, is operated by the Borough on the Central Lower Promenade and it is of great service to visitors and residents during the busy season. The personnel consists of one full time nurse and volunteer members of the St. John Ambulance Brigade. 352 cases were dealt with during the season, including 50 cases of injury caused by broken glass. 34 of these cases were sent to hospital for treatment.

#### 7. Lost Children

This station is provided by the Borough and is also situated on the Lower Promenade. A full time attendant cares for the children when brought in, until recovered by the parents. The number of children passing through during the season was 131.

#### 8. Public Health Laboratories

These laboratories are attached to the Newcastle General Hospital and are of great service to this Department and also the medical practitioners in the area.

#### 1. SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA

#### ANNUAL REPORT OF THE

#### CHIEF PUBLIC HEALTH INSPECTOR

To the Chairman and Members of the Health Committee of the Borough of Whitley Bay.

I have pleasure in submitting my eleventh Annual Report on the work of the Public Health Inspectors' Department.

Staff shortage was the most serious problem to be met by the Department during 1966. The resignation of two Public Health Inspectors, representing 50 per cent of the inspectoral staff, during the closing weeks of 1965 placed a considerable burden on your Chief and your Senior Additional Inspector who, for six months was required to devote the whole of his services to ensuring a 100 per cent inspection of animals slaughtered at Hillheads Abattoir. This situation was very disappointing to me as 1965 had been the first year when a full complement of Inspectors had enabled hitherto neglected aspects of environmental health to be tackled only to deflate suddenly at the close of that year. The activities of the Department recorded in this Report must be studied in relationship to the crisis in staffing.

The Council's intentions to introduce a second smoke control area during the year were suspended until the results of a public inquiry into the proposal was published. This decision of the Ministry of Housing and Local Government confirmed the area without modification and a challenge now faces the Department to try and recoup the delay of one year by introducing two smoke control areas in 1967.

My outlook to 1967 is one of hopefulness that with staff improvement we will make a realistic impact on the volume of public health work facing us, and relief that we have survived the strain and frustrations of 1966.

I am appreciative of the close liaison we have enjoyed with other Council Departments and I am thankful for the interest and support received from the Chairman and Members of the Health Committee. The loyalty and conscientiousness of the staff of the Public Health Department is an important factor also deserving my thanks and appreciation.

No new applications for site licences were received during the year. Work of expansion and improvement was continued at the one licenced site in the Borough which is operated by Whitley Bay Holiday Centre Limited. A certificate issued by the Council in March, 1966, fixed the maximum number of caravans to be used for human habitation at 210 having regard to facilities available on the site at that time. Implementation of certain planning conditions did not proceed as had been hoped and to try and assist with the merging of planning requirements and site expansion an Action Committee was formed. At the close of the year it was apparent that this attempt to attain progressive co-operation had failed completely and if planning requirements relating to site layout are ever going to be achieved a firm policy of enforcement is essential.

The site operated at Old Hartley by the British Caravan Club continued in a satisfactory manner although the facilities at the site are not up to the standard of the Model Site Conditions. This Club, being an exempted organization, operates without normal licence requirements as provided for in the Caravan Sites and Control of Development Act.

#### GENERAL SANITATION

The number of complaints and inquiries recorded in the Complaints Book was 803, concerning all manner of environmental health matters.

#### Drainage

The number of obstructed drains cleared by the Department was 253.

This work is a valuable and prompt service provided by the Department, considering not only the health hazards of obstructed house drains but also the anxiety to the occupants.

Inspection and testing of drainage systems involved the application of 11 water tests and 3 smoke tests.

#### Sanitary Conveniences

All sanitary conveniences in the area are connected to a water carriage system.

#### Piggeries

No complaints were received regarding nuisance from piggeries and this situation is particularly interesting in the situation at the large establishment at Murton Village, where several bungalows were build in 1963 within 30 feet of the piggery.

It would appear that the occupants of these houses have either 'given up' their efforts to rectify the situation or have become climatized to the inherent attributes of a piggery.

#### Offensive Trades (Public Health Act, 1936, Section 107)

The business of tripe boiling and fat extraction at the Hillheads
Slaughterhouse was the only "offensive trade" carried on within the
Borough, and at the end of the year this particular business closed
down. As a result no offensive trade remains in operation in Whitley Bay.

Inspection of these premises was carried out and only minor matters required attention by the proprietors.

#### Offices, Shops and Railway Premises Act, 1963

After a promising start in 1965 to the implementation of the many Regulations and Orders made under this Act, the year 1966 was a disappointment.

#### Visits to Registered Premises -

During the first six months of the year the Department operated with two Public Health Inspectors instead of four and the number of visits to premises fell from 307 to 118. The details of contraventions dealt with consequently show a reduction from 166 to 48. No prosecutions were necessary.

#### Totals of Registered Premises - .

The reduction of 27 is attributable to many persons submitting information on O.S.R 1 forms when, in fact, they were not obliged to do so, being family businesses etc.

#### Reported Accidents

The table on page 32 provides the details of the accidents investigated during 1966. In particular, information was obtained in the Department regarding an accident to a person employed in servicing the operating machinery in a Ten Pin Bowling Alley. Such establishments are outside the scope of the Act, nor are employees protected by the provisions of the Factories Acts. The fact that persons can be employed in work incorporating obvious dangers, without legal protection, appears to me as an omission of existing protective legislation. A detailed report was submitted to the Deputy Superintending Inspector of Factories.

Routine inspections were carried out having regard to the various licensing conditions prescribed in the interest and welfare of the animals involved.

#### Pest Control

Details below again indicates that apart from rodents the main pest in dwellings was the cockroach. The presence of this particular insect in older type properties is difficult to eradicate completely, although modern insecticides have proved completely effective in many cases.

Sectional sewer treatments were again applied and this method has proved to be economical while maintaining satisfactory control when compared to wide scale baiting. Details of the incidence of rats and mice in the Borough are contained in the following table.



The result of the inquiry was confirmation of Smoke Control Order No.2 without modification, apart from the date of operation, which originally was 1st November, 1966, and became 1st September, 1967.



### FOOD INSPECTION

## Meat Inspection

For the first six months of 1966, ensuring complete post mortem inspection of all animals slaughtered at Hillheads Slaughterhouse placed quite a burden on the total inspectoral staff of two during this period. A measure of this work can be derived from the details on pages 37 and 38. The severely restricted space at the slaughterhouse for purposes of carrying out examinations add to our problems and I can see little hope for resolving this situation in the existing buildings. The great part of bovine inspections must be carried out within the actual slaughter hall simultaneous with actual carcase dressing.

During the month of October the Slaughterhouses (Hygiene) (Amendment) Regulations, 1966, were confirmed. These Regulations dealt with certain aspects of hygiene and controls of lairing of animals, an interesting aspect of which is the prohibiting of the use of wiping cloths in the dressing of the carcase after the 1st November, 1968. Until that date wiping cloths must be sterilised between use on each carcase. While this latter requirement is being complied with a process to effectively replace the wiping cloth has not yet been proven and developments are awaited.

## Disposal of Unsound Meat

All meat and offal surrendered is weighed and detained awaiting collection in a locked detention room. The material is then dyed green before collection for processing by Tyneside Butchers By-Products Limited, into animal food and fertilisers at their Gateshead Factory.

#### Sale of Horseflesh

There are no premises in the Borough from which horseflesh is sold for human consumption.
