To His Worship the Mayor, Alderman and Councillors of the Whitley Bay Borough Council.

Your Worship, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in presenting the Annual Report on the health of the Borough for the year ended 31st December, 1972. This report has been prepared in accordance with the Department of Health and Social Security's Circular No.1/73.

In November 1972 the Health Department moved to new premises at 4A Park View. This provided satisfactory accommodation for a department which had been working under considerable difficulty for some time owing to lack of space, caused by the large increase in staff resulting from the greater volumne of work connected with improvements to houses. The only disadvantage in the move was the distance from other departments of the Council: the best working relationships with other sections of a unit are more likely if all staff work under one roof.

According to the Registrar-General's estimate there was a further decrease in population from 37,890 to 37,590.

The Birth Rate, following the national trend showed a slight reduction, 13.0 per 1,000 population when adjusted by the area comparability factor, compared with 13.4 in 1971. This figure remains appreciably lower than the national rate of 14.8.

Likewise the Death Rate, adjusted by the area comparability factor, continues to be lower than the national rate, i.e. 11.6 compared with 12.1.

In 1971, the Infant Mortality Rate was exceptionally low at only 4 per 1,000 live births and so it is hardly surprising that in 1972 the Rate proved to be higher at 12 per 1,000 live births. However, this rate is still lower than that for the whole of England = 17.

Infectious Diseases again continued at a very low level.

A most unusual occurrence was a case of Cholera contracted abroad by a visitor to the town: fortunately as a result of early recognition of the disease, routine measures of control were undertaken in good time and no spread of infection occurred. There was also one case of Typhoid Fever, contracted on holiday abroad by a resident: again there were no further cases. These two instances draw attention to the importance of all people who travel abroad being aware of the ever present risks in countries where standards of hygiene are lower than our own. Neither case was notified in Whitley Bay as in each instance the diagnosis was made in hospital in another area.

In conclusion, I would like to thank the Chief Public
Health Inspector and the Staff of the Health Department for
their co-operation and also the Chairman and Members of the
Social Services Committee for their support and interest in
all measures designed to improve the health of the people
of the Borough.

## SECTION "A"

#### STATISTICAL AND SOCIAL CONDITIONS OF THE BOROUGH

The Borough comprises an area of 3,612 acres, including the foreshore which is 510 acres. It continues in popularity as a holiday resort and has excellent rail and bus connections to and from all parts of the country. It has a wide variety of interests and entertainments with the picturesque St. Mary's Island and Lighthouse at the North end of the Bay. Fine golden sands stretch for nearly two miles.

The Borough is divided electorally into eight wards which are represented by twentyfour councillors and eight aldermen. The rateable value now stands at £1,566,470, the product of the penny rate being £14,700. The population at midyear 1972 was 37,590 a decrease of 300. There are 13,333 houses in the area of which 1,792 are owned by the Borough Council.

#### Births

The number of live births for the year was 434, giving a birth rate of 11.5 per 1,000 population. 241 of these were males and 193 females. The Registrar General's comparability factor is 1.13 which alters the birth rate for the area to 13.0 per 1,000. There were 26 male and 11 female illegitimate births, representing 9 per cent of the total births, and the number of still births was 2 (1 female, 1 male) representing .458 per cent of the total births.

#### Deaths

572 deaths were recorded by the Registrar General, consisting of 281 males and 291 females. The crude death rate for the area was 15.2 per 1,000 of the population, but adjustment by the Registrar General's comparability figures of .76 reduces this figure to 11.6.

The cause of all deaths are shown in the table on the following page.

#### Longevity

Of the 572 deaths in the area, 458 of them occurred at the age of 65 years or over. This represents 80.07 per cent. Details are given in the following table.

#### SECTION "B"

#### HEALTH SERVICES IN THE AREA

#### 1. Infectious Diseases

The Newcastle Regional Hospital Board administers the clinics, hospitals and sanatoria dealing with treatment necessary for Tuberculosis cases under the National Health Service 1946. Other infectious diseases which require hospitalisation are treated at Walkergate Hospital, Newcastle upon Tyne.

#### 2. Medical and Surgical Cases

These are mostly treated in hospital and infirmaries under the jurisdiction of the Newcastle Group Hospital Board and the South East Northumberland Hospital Management Committee.

#### Child and Maternity Welfare.

These services and the clinics connected with them are administered by the Northumberland County Council.

## 4. Home Nursing.

This service is also controlled by the County Council.

## 5. Ambulance Service.

This is a radio controlled service administered by the County Council. The Ambulance Depot is at Hillheads and gives a 24 hour daily service.

## 6. First Aid.

A fully equipped station, manned by qualified personnel, is operated by the Borough on the Central Lower Promenade and it is of great service to visitors and residents during the busy season. The personnel consists of one full-time nurse and volunteer members of the St. John Ambulance Brigade. 473 cases were dealt with during the season, including 310 cases of injury from cuts and grazes, many of these from broken glass. 29 of these cases were sent to hospital for treatment.

#### 7. Lost Children

This station is provided by the Borough and is also situated on the Lower Promenade. A full time attendant cares for the children when brought in, until recovered by the parents. The number of lost children was 202.

## 8. Public Health Laboratories

These laboratories are attached to the Newcastle General Hospital and are of great service to this Department and also to the medical practitioners in the area.

- (i) The water supply during the year proved of good quality and was plentiful. The water is supplied by Tynemouth Corporation.
- (ii) 24 samples of water were taken for bacteriological examination and all were satisfactory.
  - (iii) No water samples for chemical analysis were taken.
- (iv) There are no houses in the Borough of Whitley Bay which are not provided with an internal water supply.
- (v) Sewerage and Sewage Disposal Two farms have septic tanks in use and a cesspool serves Trinity Road Public Conveniences. With these exceptions the area is fully served by water carriage system with a final disposal via outfall sewers to sea.

#### TUBERCULOSIS


