

To the Chairman and Members of the Education Committee of the County Borough of Wigan.

Sir, Ladies and Gentlemen, .

I have the honour to submit my annual report on the Medical Inspection of School children for the year 1944.

The report has been typed and curtailed in order to save expense and paper.

Owing to war conditions, the new extensions have not been adequately furnished, Suitable furniture will have to be provided after the war.

Diphtheria is less prevalent in the Borough. There is a marked reduction in the number of notifications of the disease. In 1943 there were 61 cases amongst school children, and 32 in 1944.

The number of children for whom acceptances were received for free incoulation against diphtheria was much less than in 1943 being 354 against 784, and the total immunised since the scheme commenced was 7556. Much has been done nationally and locally to encourage parents to have their children inoculated and yet many are apathetic, and a large number definitely opposed to ait.

At the end of 1944 it is estimated that 56% of all school children had been immunised.

The provision of milk and meals has been extended and improved and the children have benefited accordingly! (See page 6).

On October 1st a Speech Therapy Bervice was commenced, and Miss C.E.Renfrew was appointed Speech Therapist to serve jointly the County Borough Of St. Helens and the County Borough of Wigan.

For the present the Wigan sessions are all day Monday and Friday each week and alternate Thursdays. Miss Renfrew's report appears of page 7.

I desire to express my thanks to all the members of my staff for their continued excellent work and loyalty. The war has called for greater efforts and increased duties.

My thanks are also due to the Director of Education and his staff, and to the Teachers and Attendance Officers for their help and co-operation.

I am grateful for your continued confidence and support.

#### DIPHTHERIA IN THE SCHOOLS.

During the year 1944 diphtheria was again prevalent in many parts of this country, and although Wigan is usually comparatively free from this disease, the outbreak which commenced in 1936 still continues, but shows a reduction on the 1945 figure.

The average number of notifications of diphtheria per annum during the ten years 1935 to 1944 for all ages was 196.

In 1944, 61 cases were notified, of which 32 were school children, a marked decrease on the previous year.

Protective inoculation against diphtheria is offered free, and the written consent of the parents is obtained before any child is immunised.

Consent forms have been issued to each child to take home to his parents for wignature on several occasions, and the Head Teachers have been asked to co-operate in advising parents to have their children inoculated.

The number of acceptances for school children during the year 1944 was :- 354
The total number completed since the scheme commenced was 1- 7556

All cases of diphtheria were promptly removed to hospital and the usual diminfection carried out at the home. Investigations by Medical Officers and Nurses were made at the schools involved, and a search for carriers or cases was made in various classes. Many nose and throat swabs were taken and some positive cases found. Several children attending school clinics were found to be positive and removed to hospital.

The suggested preventive measures against diphtheria in schools have been fully dealt with in previous reports.

All school children should be inspected for dental defects twice a year. An Assistant Dentist was appointed in 1941 and was on duty from February 1941 to September 1941 when he was called up to H.M. Forces.

#### PROVISION OF MILK AND MEALS.

In 1944, the Authority's school meals and milk service has continued to operate with extremely beneficial results.

The meals are now sumplied from the three Depots operated by the Authority at Wood-house Lane, Wigan, at Whelley, Wigan, (opened in 1944) and at Horwich. They are served at forty eight school centres, and six new dining halls which have been opened during the year.

Meals are supplied free of charge to children whose parents' incomes fall below the prescribed scale and to children recommended for free meals by the School Medical Officer.

#### CO-OPERATION OF PARENTS.

The number of parents present at Medical Inspection varies considerably in the different schools. The total number of parents present was 2171 and the total number of children medically inspected was 3787 a percentage of 57.

#### CO-OPERATION OF VOLUNTARY BODIES.

During the year the help of the N.S.P.C.C. Inspector has been given in 20 cases involving the welfare of 64 children. In all instances the results were satisfactory The Inspector made 99 visits of supervision in connection with the above cased. Of the 26 cases two were prosecuted and parents convicted.

#### WIGAN LOCAL YOUTH COMMITTEE.

During the past 12 months the Worsley Boys' Club has been formed on the large Scot Lane Housing Estate and already it has a very large membership. Two other clubs, both mixed, have been formed, one in connection with the St. John's RC Church and the other at St. Matthew's C of E Church. Both these clubs are developing very satisfactorily, although the St. John's Club is suffering from a lack of suitable accommodation. Of the clubs already in existence the Wigan Boys' Club have now regained possession of part of their premises used for Civil Defence purposes and this will result in greater ability to cater for their very large number of members. The Springfield Boys' Club have obtained new premises and the Girls Training Corps have secured premises for a Rest Room and Canteen. In addition the Army Cadet Force has been fortuate in securing the use of the Drill Hall as their headquarters and the Wigan Sea Cadet Corps have now obtained their own "Stone Frigate" which has been excellently equipped. The Sea Cadets have also been granted permission to use the

lake at Wrightington Hospital for boating practice in their own 32 foot whaler.

# SPEECH THERAPY.

Miss C.E. Renfrew, speech therapist, has submitted the following report. It will be noted that the work described extends into 1945 and is included to give a more comprehensive account of the launching of this new service:-

Regular treatment of 32 cases was begun at the end of January. The Speech Clinic is held on Mondays and Fridays at the Y.W.C.A. premises, 13 Library Street. Mondays are devoted to the teaching of children with articulatory defects; Fridays to stammerers, in groups during the morning session, and individually during the afternoon session. Sessions are also conducted on alternate Thursdays, during which new cases and those under supervision can be seen, and contacts made with the schools and homes of the children under treatment.

Two girls were discharged at the end of February, one with the defect cured and the speech now satisfactory - the speech of the other had improved considerably, but, having obtained employment, she can no longer attend. Many of the cases selected for treatment will undoubtedly be slow in yielding results, but a vast improvement has been noted in the speech of most of those children attending.
