SOCIAL CONDITIONS.—The Social Conditions still show little variation. Occupations and Industries are varied and cover numerous activities, the chief of which are agriculture, stone quarrying, bleaching and dyeing, and linoleum manufacture. No new works have been established in the District, but there does not appear to have been any falling off in trade and unemployment is not extensive. Conditions of occupation have no apparent serious prejudicial effect on health.

GENERAL PROVISIONS OF HEALTH SERVICES.—Arrangements are made with outside authorities for the reception and treatment of infectious cases where necessary. The cost of Hospital treatment for the year ending 31st March, 1937, was £182 15s. 6d.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

WATER SUPPLY.—A good supply of water is available in all Parishes though there are still isolated houses which have their own private supplies.

During the year considerable improvements in water supplies have been carried out in Haigh and Shevington. 3,000 yards of new mains were laid in Haigh and 500 yards in Shevington where no mains previously existed, and in addition the distributive systems have been improved in both parishes to remedy shortages. The total cost was £8,000.

An additional Pump has also been completed at Wrightington Pumping Station, and No. 1 Pump was thoroughly overhauled to avert the danger of a water shortage. Preparations are also proceeding to instal a Water Softening Plant at the Parbold Waterworks. SEWERAGE.—The Council have provisionally approved Draft Sewerage Schemes for the Parishes of Shevington, Parbold and Wrightington, and the preparation of the schemes is in the hands of the Surveyor.

CONVERSIONS.—During the year 42 Privy Closets were converted to W.C.'s, and 30 to Pail Closets. Moveable Ashbins were provided to 40 houses to replace Ashpits.

The Council do not contribute towards the cost of conversions, and all the foregoing have been done in response to informal notices.

PUBLIC CLEANSING.—Scavenging of the District is carried out by direct labour and the Council's own Motor Wagon. Since 1st June Dalton scavenging has been carried out under contract by a Motor Wagon.

These figures show that the gradual increase in refuse removal has continued, though there has been a slight reduction in total cost compared with previous years.

The method of disposal is by tipping into disused pits or hollow land and the larger tips are covered as frequently as possible with earth and kept levelled.

HOUSING.

GENERAL HOUSING CONDITIONS.—Building development, whilst showing no signs of ceasing, has not been continued as rapidly as in former years. Drainage is discharged into septic tanks and the effluent into the nearest watercourse, or in some instances into the Council's sewer.

NEW BUILDINGS.—During 1937, 83 New Dwelling Houses were erected in the Rural District, all by private enterprise.

DAIRIES AND COWSHEDS.—Lime washing is carried out twice during the year or as often as may be necessary. The number of Cowkeepers who are Accredited Producers is 8.

Sanitary conditions on the whole in the remaining cowsheds are also good.

MEAT INSPECTIONS.—There are three registered slaughter houses, two with shops attached and one other meat shop. Frequent inspections are made and any unsound meat rejected.

Many vans sell meat in the district, and these are also inspected. 5 parts of carcases or organs were condemned as being unfit for food on account of tuberculosis, and 12 for diseases other than tuberculosis. These were surrendered voluntarily by the owners and destroyed.
