2.—GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES IN THE AREA:

Ambulance Services.—Ambulance services are provided by the Lancashire County Council under the provisions of the National Health Service Act, 1946.

Home Nursing.—Under the provisions of the National Health Service Act, 1946 home nursing facilities are provided by the Lancashire County Council.

LABORATORY FACILITIES.—Bacteriological examinations are carried out at Wigan Royal Infirmary, three satisfactory reports being obtained during the year. Two samples of raw water from private supplies were submitted for bacteriological examination, one sample of which was found to be unsatisfactory. Pending the provision of a piped supply the occupant of the house was warned to boil all water used for human consumption.

Samples for chemical analysis are submitted to the County Analyst, Preston, a report being obtained on each sample or specimen. The arrangements are satisfactory.

3.—SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

WATER SUPPLY.—The water supply throughout the District has been very satisfactory during the year.

The final reinstatement works in connection with the Council's Water Supply Extensions and Reconstruction Scheme have been satisfactorily completed, apart from two minor items which are receiving attention.

The Makerfield Water Board Order, 1960 came into force on 23rd November, 1960, the Appointed Day being 1st January, 1961 and the Day of Transfer being 1st April, 1961, from which date the Water Undertaking of the Wigan Rural District Council will be transferred to the Makerfield Water Board.

During the year 28 privy closets were converted to fresh w.c.s; 30 pail closets were converted to fresh w.c.s; 6 movable dustbins were substituted for fixed receptacles.

PUBLIC CLEANSING.

Two refuse vehicles with 12 workmen are engaged on Refuse Collection. The collection of house refuse is carried out weekly except in the remote areas of Dalton and Haigh, where a fortnightly collection is carried out.

Pails are emptied by the Council's Cesspool Emptying

Vehicle.

CESSPOOL CLEANSING.

A special Cesspool Emptying Vehicle is engaged on regular cleansing of cesspools and septic tanks. Tipping is carried out on agricultural land when suitable, or otherwise into the public sewer. Two controlled tips are in use.

SEWERAGE.

The Sewerage Scheme for the Mossy Lea area of the Parish of Wrightington commenced on 28th May, 1959, has been comppleted and all properties which could be served by the new sewer have been connected.

In connection with the Parbold Sewerage Scheme agreement has been reached with the Ormskirk Urban District Council and the West Lancashire Rural District Council regarding the provision of drainage facilities in the Newburgh and Bispham areas. An indication has been given by the Town Clerk of Wigan that the Corporation were prepared to accept and treat sewage from the two additional areas on the same basis as that already agreed in connection with sewage from the area of the Wigan Rural District Council. This information will be supplied to the Minister of Housing and Local Government and it is hoped that he will then be in a position to authorise the Council to invite fixed price tenders for the Scheme.

The Council are anxious to proceed as quickly as possible with a Sewerage Scheme for the Appley Bridge area of the Parish of Wrightington and are awaiting a preliminary report thereon.

SWIMMING BATHS AND POOLS.

There are no public swimming baths in the District.

DISINFESTATION OF VERMINOUS PREMISES.

No Council or privately-owned houses have been found to be infested during the year.

58 Farms, 1 Hospital and 6 Factories have entered into Contracts with the Council in connection with the Rat Destruction Service which came into operation in October, 1958. 443 treatments were carried out during the year.

OFFENSIVE TRADES.

The manufacture of glue is carried on in the Appley Bridge area. The stocks are inspected regularly and the conditions are satisfactory.

CAMPING SITES.

There is one Camping Site in the Rural District.

CARAVANS.

The main object of the Caravan Sites and Control of Development Act, 1960, which came into operation on 29th August, 1960, is to introduce a licensing system to be operated by all Local Authorities and regulate the establishment and operation of caravan sites and secure good standards of accommodation. At the time the Act came into operation there were 16 caravan sites in the Rural District. No applications for licences were received during the year.

COMMON LODGING HOUSES.

There are none in the District.

CANAL BOATS.

No infringements of the Acts were discovered.

SCHOOLS.

The water supply to the Schools in the area is constant and sufficient, and the facilities for handling meals are considered to be satisfactory.

SMOKE ABATEMENT—CLEAN AIR ACT, 1956.

Observations were made in respect of 16 chimneys during the year. In 8 instances dark smoke was emitted longer than the prescribed period. A further survey and observations are being made to assist the Factory Managers to comply with the Act.

ANTI-LITTER CAMPAIGN.

A further supply of 12 litter bins was obtained in connection with the Anti-Litter and the Keep Britain Tidy Campaigns and a supply of posters obtained for distribution to shops and other premises in the Council's District.

NOISE ABATEMENT ACT, 1960.

Official Circular No. 58/60 dated 21st November, 1960 from the Ministry of Housing and Local Government was submitted to the Council at their December Meeting. This drew the Council's attention to the Noise Abatement Act which had received the Royal Assent and would come into operation on 27th November, 1960.

HOUSING.

GENERAL HOUSING CONDITIONS.—There has been a continued improvement generally in housing conditions and an increase in the lesser-expensive dwellings built privately. There is still a shortage of ground-floor accommodation for old people.

House Purchase and Housing Act, 1959.—31 applications were received under the Act for the provision of standard amenities in older-type houses. One application was refused.

SLUM CLEARANCE.—The Council's Supplementary Slum Clearance Programme which provides for the demolition of 25 houses during the next three years has been approved by the Minister of Housing and Local Government. The Council do not propse to erect any new houses to accommodate the tenants who would be displaced as it was felt that they could be satisfactorily re-housed in the vacancies which occur from time to time in the existing houses already provided by the Council.

MILK (SPECIAL DESIGNATION) (PASTEURISED AND STERILISED MILK) REGULATIONS, 1949 to 1953:

Six Licences were issued to retail distributors in respect of "Pasteurised" milk and four Licences were issued in respect of "Sterilised" milk.

During the year four samples of raw milk were subjected to biological tests, all of them being free from tuberculous infection.

Four samples of raw milk were subjected to the Methylene Blue reduction test, three samples being satisfactory and one sample unsatisfactory.

Eleven samples of "pasteurised" milk were subjected to the Phosphatase Test and eleven to the Methylene Blue reduction

Test. All the results were satisfactory.

Two samples of "sterilised" milk were subjected to the Turbidity test and were found to be satisfactory.

THE MILK (SPECIAL DESIGNATION) REGULATIONS, 1960.

These Regulations, made jointly by the Minister of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food and the Minister of Health, came into operation on 1st October, 1960 and govern the conditions under which specially designated milk may be sold. They replace and consolidate with amendments earlier Regulations and their object is to ensure that the milk is so produced, treated, bottled and distributed that it reaches the consumer in a safe and clean condition. As from 1st January, 1961 all licences other than producer-licences will be issued by the Food and Drugs Authority.

- (b) ICE CREAM.—Seven inspections of registered premises were carried out during the year and the results were satisfactory. All the premises in the District are registered for the sale of prepacked ice-cream. At only one premises was loose ice-cream sold. Due to the inadequacy of the premises the shop-keeper voluntarily ceased to sell this product and is now selling wrapped ice-cream.
- (c) MEAT.—There is one private slaughterhouse in the District, which is visited regularly and all carcases are inspected before sale.

SLAUGHTERHOUSES ACT, 1959.

The Minister of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food accepted a report submitted on 3rd June, 1960 under Section 3 of the Slaughterhouses Act, 1958 and proposed to appoint 1st July, 1961 as the Day from which all slaughterhouses in the Council's District must comply with the Construction Regulations.

DISEASES OF ANIMALS (WASTE FOOD) ORDER, 1957.

Two premises are licensed under the Order but only one plant is in use. Four inspections have been made during the year.

FOOD HYGIENE (GENERAL) REGULATIONS, 1960.

These Regulations, made jointly by the Minister of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food and the Minister of Health, came into operation on 1st October, 1960. They amend and consolidate the Food Hygiene Regulations, 1955 and 1957. The amendments do not affect the main substance of the Regulations.

PREVALENCE OF, AND CONTROL OVER, INFECTIOUS DISEASE.

64 cases of Measles were notified during the year, compared with 55 in 1959.

1 case of Dysentery and 1 case of Erysipelas were notified during the year.

I am pleased to report that there was no outbreak of Food Poisoning in the District during the year. The following statistics show the number of persons resident in Wigan Rural District who were immunised and vaccinated during the year 1960:—
