# 2.—GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES IN THE AREA:—

Ambulance Services.—Ambulance services are provided by the Lancashire County Council under the provisions of the National Health Service Act, 1946. An Ambulance Station to cover the needs of the Rural District is established in Standish and the service is quite satisfactory.

Home Nursing.—Under the provisions of the National Health Service Act, 1946 home nursing facilities are provided by the Lancashire County Council.

LABORATORY FACILITIES.—Bacteriological examinations are carried out at the Wigan Royal Infirmary and chemical analyses by the County Analyst, Preston. These arrengements are satisfactory.

### 3.—SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

Water Supply.—The Makerfield Water Board are now the Statutory Undertakers for the Wigan Rural District.

Generally throughout the year the supply has been satisfactory in quality and quantity.

At present 18 dwellings rely on private wells and springs for water, which requires boiling before consumption.

During the year 3 samples of water were taken by the Council's Public Health Inspector for bacteriological examination, all the results being satisfactory. One sample of raw water from a private spring was found to be unsatisfactory.

During the year 10 privy closets were converted to fresh w.cs; 18 pail closets were converted to fresh w.cs; 8 movable dustbins were substituted for fixed receptacles.

## PUBLIC CLEANSING.—Refuse Collection and Disposal.

Two 18 cubic yard capacity Dual Tip Karrier Vehicles are used for collection. These vehicles have proved adequate in coping with the increased volume of house refuse without an increase in the labour force; eleven men and two drivers are employed in this work. A weekly collection of refuse has been maintained, with the exception of some of the remote areas of the Parishes of Dalton and Haigh, where a fortnightly service is carried out.

There are still a number of privy middens which the Council are anxious to have replaced by a standard movable bin for the storage of refuse. With the financial incentive for the conversion to water closets and the completion of the Parbold Sewerage Scheme the number of privies will decrease rapidly in the ensuing year.

Disposal of refuse is by controlled tipping. The only available tip at present in use is a disused quarry, now nearly filled. At frequent intervals a local Contractor levels the tip to secure greater compaction by using a track-type bulldozer, which reduces the danger of fire and nuisance from rodents and other pests. Sites are difficult to secure but negotiations are proceeding for a large site which will last many years.

### CESSPOOL EMPTYING.

A Cesspool Emptying Vehicle is used for the cleansing and desludging of cesspools and septic tanks and no charge is made for this service. The contents of the vehicle are discharged into the public sewer.

### SEWERAGE.

The Parbold and District Sewerage Scheme was commenced on 1st March, 1962 and was completed at the end of 1963. This Scheme provided main drainage for Parbold, Hilldale and the Higher Lane area of the Parish of Dalton, together with parts of the Ormskirk Urban District and the West Lancashire Rural District. As part of the Contract all premises were connected to the sewer, which discharges into the trunk sewer of the Wigan County Borough for treatment at the Hoscar Sewage Works.

A Sewerage Scheme for the Appley Bridge area has been submitted to the Ministry of Housing and Local Government and the approval of the Minister is now awaited.

## RIVERS (PREVENTION OF POLLUTION) ACT, 1961.

June 1, 1963 was the Appointed Day fixed by the Minister of Housing and Local Government by which it is unlawful to make any discharge of trade or sewage effluent into a stream (except a discharge for which consent had been obtained under the 1951 Act) without the consent of the River Board. Under the Rivers (Prevention of Pollution) Act, 1951 only post 1951 discharges required River Board consent. Under the 1961 Act pre 1951 discharges now require consent.

## SWIMMING BATHS AND POOLS.

There are no public swimming baths in the District.

# DISINFESTATION OF VERMINOUS PREMISES.

Two Council houses were found to be infested during the year. The use of dieldrin liquid spray and dieldrin powder proved most effective in the case of beetles and cockroaches.

The Council carry out a test baiting of the sewers every six months.

Free disinfestation of rats and mice is given to all dwellings. For business premises the work is chargeable on a labour/materials basis. For factories and farms the Council have adopted a Contract Service, and 48 farms, 6 factories and 1 hospital have taken out Contracts with the Council.

### OFFENSIVE TRADES.

The manufacture of glue is carried on in the Appley Bridge area. Frequent inspections are made of the premises. The factory also has a contract with the Council for rodent treatment which has proved very effective.

# COMMON LODGING HOUSES.

There are none in the District.

## CANAL BOATS.

No infringements of the Acts were discovered.

### SMOKE ABATEMENT-CLEAN AIR ACT, 1956.

Further improvement continues to be made in reducing atmospheric pollution from industrial plants, which have been inspected regularly during the year.

No complaints were received of smoke nuisance from factory chimneys during the year, and grates of an approved type capable of burning smokeless fuel are installed in all newly erected dwellings. During the course of two observations, however, dark smoke was being emitted in contravention of the Clean Air Act.

## NOISE ABATEMENT ACT, 1960.

It has not been found necessary to take any action under the provisions of this Act during the year.

### HOUSING.

### GENERAL HOUSING CONDITIONS.

Housing conditions and standards generally continue to improve due to the extensive provision of new private dwellings, the rehousing of tenants from substandard and overcrowded houses and the improvement of existing houses by the owners. 119 dwellings were built by private enterprise during the year compared with 102 in the year 1962. Many residents from outside the district have come to live within the rural area.

House Purchase and Housing Act, 1959—29 applications were received under the Act for the provision of standard amenities in the older-type houses, 25 of which were approved and 14 completed, compared with 16 applications received, 15 of which were approved and 6 completed in the year 1962.

Slum Clearance—The Council do not propose to erect any new houses to accommodate the tenants displaced as a result of their Supplementary Slum Clearance Programme. It is felt that they can be satisfactorily rehoused by vacancies which occur in the existing houses already provided by the Council. The building of old people's bungalows in the Shevington Moor and Wrightington areas is, however, contemplated.

# RENT ACT, 1957 :-

Five applications for Certificates of Disrepair were received during the year, and one Certificate was issued. Three undertakings by the landlord to remedy defects proposed to be included in a Certificate of Disrepair were accepted by the Council.

No applications for cancellation of previous Certificates of Disrepair were received.

# AGRICULTURE (SAFETY, HEALTH AND WELFARE PROVISIONS) ACT, 1956.

Twenty visits were made to farms during the year and no contraventions were observed in respect of sanitary accommodation.

### OFFICE, SHOPS AND RAILWAY PREMISES ACT, 1963:-

This Act, which received Royal Assent in July, 1963, provides for the health, welfare and safety of persons employed in Offices, Shops and Railway Premises and for the registration of premises. The main provisions of the Act do not come into operation until 1st August, 1964.

### INSPECTION AND SUPERVISION OF FOOD:-

## (a) MILK SUPPLY :-

Under the Milk and Daries (General) Regulations, 1959 all persons carrying on the trade of distributor from premises within the District and all premises used as dairies, other than dairy-farms, are registered with the Council. Dairy farms and dairy farmers are registered with the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food.

# THE MILK (Special Designation) REGULATIONS, 1960:-

Under the above-mentioned Regulations all dealers (other than producers) must obtain a licence from the Lancashire County Council, as the Food and Drugs Authority.

During the year 28 samples of milk were obtained by the Council's Public Health Inspectors and submitted to the Bacteriologist of the Wigan Royal Albert Edward Infirmary to ensure that the milk complied with the special designations. Adverse reports were received on two samples of raw milk. The vendors were interviewed but no legal action was taken.

## (b) ICE CREAM :-

Twenty inspections of registered premises were carried out during the year and the results were satisfactory. All the premises in the District are registered for the sale of pre-packed ice-cream, the only loose ice-cream being sold by itinerant vendors operating from outside the District.

### (c) SLAUGHTERHOUSES AND MEAT INSPECTION:—

There is one private slaughterhouse within the District, the application for renewal of licence of which was approved by the Council. All animals killed at the slaughterhouse are inspected by the Public Health Inspectors.

The premises from which poultry are killed and dressed are inspected frequently.

## THE MEAT INSPECTION REGULATIONS, 1963:—

These Regulations replace the Public Health (Meat Regulations), 1924 and came into operation on 1st October, 1963. The Regulations ensure that all home-killed meat is inspected before it leaves the slaughterhouse.

## FOOD AND DRUGS ACT, 1955.

The Lancashire County Council is the Food and Drugs Authority for the Wigan Rural District. Every effort is made to ensure that the food and drugs sold are genuine and unadulterated as required by the Food and Drugs Act, 1955 and the Food Hygiene Regulations, 1960.

During the year 71 samples of various kinds of food were submitted to the County Analyst, all of which were found to be satisfactory.

# PREVALENCE OF, AND CONTROL OVER, INFECTIOUS DISEASE.

204 cases of Measles were notified during the year, compared with 3 in 1962.

I am pleased to report that there was no outbreak of Food Poisoning in the District during the year.

Notification of the disease is prompt and satisfactory. The Manchester Regional Hospital Board provides facilities for the treatment of Tuberculosis, and these services are fully used and appreciated. The Chest Clinic is in Millgate, Wigan, and patients may be referred there for examination by their own doctors, or by the Assistant Divisional Medical Officers.
