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

# 2.—GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES IN THE AREA.

Ambulance Services.—Ambulance services are provided by the Lancashire County Council under the provisions of the National Health Service Act, 1946. An Ambulance Station to cover the needs of the Rural District is established in Standish and the service is quite satisfactory.

Home Nursing.—Under the provisions of the National Health Service Act, 1946, home nursing facilities are provided by the Lancashire County Council.

Laboratory Facilities.—Bacteriological examinations are carried out at the Wigan Royal Infirmary and chemical analyses by the County Analyst, Preston. These arrangements are satisfactory.

## 3.—SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

Water Supply.—The Makerfield Water Board are now the Statutory Undertakers for the Wigan Rural District.

Generally throughout the year the supply has been satisfactory in quality and quantity.

Five dwellings rely on private wells and springs for water: four in Dalton, and one in Wrightington.

## PUBLIC CLEANSING -- Refuse Collection and Disposal.

Ten men, including two drivers, are employed in collection work. A seven-day refuse collection service is operated throughout the Council's District. Two Dennis Paxit and one Eagle Compress Load 5 Refuse Collection Vehicles are engaged full-time on this work, and the disposable sack system is in operation throughout the Council's area. The hygiene of refuse collection has been considerably improved.

Disposal of refuse is by controlled tipping at Dalton.

#### CESSPOOL EMPTYING

A Cesspool Emptying Vehicle is used for the cleansing and desludging of cesspools and septic tanks and no charge is made for this service. The contents of the vehicles are discharged into the public sewer.

#### SEWERAGE

The built-up areas of the Rural District are sewered together with large rural areas.

Work has commenced on the Wigan Road and Crooke areas of Shevington and will be completed approximately mid-1973.

# RIVERS (PREVENTION OF POLLUTION) ACT, 1961.

With the extension of main drainage facilities and the abolition of numerous septic tanks, streams and ditches continue to show improvement in cleanliness and very few instances of pollution by septic tanks now exist.

To reduce ditch and stream pollution the Council desludge septic tanks free of cost.

#### SWIMMING BATHS AND POOLS.

There are no public swimming baths in the District. A swimming pool at Shevington Primary School has been provided by private subscription for the sole use of the school pupils. The bath water is analysed regularly and has been found to be satisfactory.

### DISINFESTATION OF VERMINOUS PREMISES.

There were no cases of flea infestation during the year.

#### OFFENSIVE TRADES

The manufacture of glue is carried on in the Appley Bridge area. Frequent inspections are made of the premises The periodic smell nuisance has now virtually been removed by discontinuation of the Iwell plant.

## SMOKE ABATEMENT—CLEAN AIR ACT, 1956.

It has not been necessary to take any legal action during the year but constant watch has been kept on industrial premises within the area.

Only grates of the approved type capable of burning smokeless fuel were installed in newly erected dwellings. More and more new and existing dwellings are being provided with full or partial central heating.

It has not been necessary to take any action under Section 172 of the Public Health Act, 1936, relating to the compulsory removal of tuberculosis patients to Hospital.

#### CANCER.

21 Deaths, 12 males and 9 females, occurred in the year 1972, compared with 20 Deaths, 5 males and 15 females, in the year 1971.

Cancer cases are treated at the Manchester Radium Institute and at the Wigan Infirmary Clinic, which works in close conjunction with the Manchester Unit.

#### TUBERCULOSIS.

No notifications were received during the year under the Public

Health (Tuberculosis) Regulations, 1930.

The Manchester Regional Hospital Board provides facilities for the treatment of Tuberculosis, and these services are fully used and appreciated. The Chest Clinic is in Millgate, Wigan, and patients may be referred there for examination by their own doctors, or by the Assistant Divisional Medical Officers.

No action has been taken under the Public Health (Prevention of Tuberculosis) Regulations, 1925.
