Annual Report of the Medical Officer of Health.

To The Chairman and Members of the Williton Rural District Council,
Gentlemen,

It is my privilege to present to you my 13th Annual Report upon the Health and Sanitation of your District.

The District extends over an area of 97,000 acres and for about 32 miles along the shores of the Bristol Channel.

The population of the District is estimated at 12,400 and the estimated number of inhabited houses is 3626.

The rateable value is £82,402 and the sum of £252 - 7 - 6 is represented by one penny rate.

VITAL STATISTICS.

The Registrar General's Return shows 179 births of which 89 were males and 90 females.

The birth rate is therefore 14.43 per 1000, compared with 11.51 of last year.

The Registrar General's Return of deaths shows 144, (72 males and 72 females), and this gives a death rate of 11.61 per 1000, compared with 13.70 of last year.

The number of deaths of Infants under one year were 7, which gives an Infant Mortality of 39.1 compared with 51.09 of last year.

No women died in consequence of childbirth.

There were no deaths from Measles, Whooping Cough, Scarlet Fever or Diphtheria.

HEALTH SERVICES.

There is an Isolation Hospital, known as the Minehead and Williton Hospital, where cases of Infectious Diseases, (other than Small Pox) which cannot be satisfactorily isolated at home are sent.

There is a Steam Disinfector where all bedding and clothing can be disinfected, and a motor ambulance provided, in which infectious cases can be removed from their homes to the Hospital.

The County Authorities have a Small Pox Hospital at Polden Hills to which any case occurring in the District can go.

The County have a Tuberculosis Dispensary at Minehead at which Dr.Short the County Tuberculosis Officer or Dr.Martyn the Assistant Tuberculosis Officer attends every Thursday, and to which all residents in the District can go for examination.

A Lady Health Visitor visits every known case and reports upon it.

Care Committees have been formed in the District, who, when necessary provide extra nourishment in needy cases.

In needful cases a shelter is provided on the recommendation of the County Tuberculosis Officer.

There is no Institution in the District which provides for unmarried Mothers, Illegitimate Children or Homeless Children, other than the Public Assistance Institution.

Scarlet Fever. No area was chiefly affected, and the cases were of a mild type. The rate for the whole Country being 1.89 per 1,000, whilst this District was .96 per 1,000.

Diphtheria. One case of Diphtheria was notified during the year. The rate of the whole Country being 1.14 per 1,000.

A supply of Diphtheria Anti-Toxin is kept by the M.O.H., and can be supplied at any time when required, and in doubtful cases, swabs are sent to the County Laboratory for examination.

Neither the Selrick nor the Dick Test has been used in this District.

WATER SUPPLY.

Private enterprise is chiefly responsible for pipe borne water in most of the villages in the District, the District Council being responsible for comparatively few.

For instance, there are private water supplies in 14 villages, in 11 villages the supply belongs to the District Council, leaving 7 without a piped water supply.

By an arrangement with the County Authorities, the Public and Private Water Supplies are periodically examined, by this means a defective supply can soon be discovered.

Most of the 7 villages without a piped water supply are scattered and the inhabitants depend upon isolated springs and wells.

There is not much cause for comment for the water supply of the District as a whole.

Six Maps have been prepared showing the source, storage and distribution of all the Public and Private Water Supplies in the District. One copy has been deposited with the Somerset County Council and one is kept in hand. These maps show very clearly the exact condition of the Council's area with regard to piped water services and how well the District is served in this respect.

The question of a new water supply for Luckwell Bridge in the Parish of Cutcombe is in hand.

Water main extensions have been carried out at Wootton Courtenay, Williton and Doniford.

RIVERS AND STREAMS.

There is no pollution of the Local Streams worth mentioning, other than the complaints with regard to the Wootton Courtenay and Withycombe sewerage emptying into the Local Streams.

With regard to Withycombe, a new sewerage scheme has now been provided and all the houses in the Village are connected up.

A Local Inquiry by the Ministry of Health was held early in 1938, and the work has been carried out in accordance with the Scheme approved by them.

DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE.

Most of the larger Villages have a system of piped sewers which are kept in good working order. The villages of Roadwater, Bossington, and Holford are however still unsewered.

A Scheme has been prepared to provide a system of sewers for the whole of the Parish of Selworthy, which will include Allerford and Bossington, and the same is now before the Ministry of Health for their approval.

There are no closely built or populous centres in the District, where closets on the conservancy system remain in any great quantity.

There are still however scattered Privies and Earth Closets in the District, and these are to be found in every Parish.

SCAVENGING.

The collection of house refuse in the District is dealt with by the Council in a very thorough manner, and practically the whole of the Rural Area has its refuse collected.

Dumps are provided as follows:-

1. At Bossington with a forced draught Incinerator to serve Porlock, Luccombe, Selworthy, Wootton Courtenay and Minehead Without.
2. At Dunster with a forced draught Incinerator to serve Dunster, Timberscombe, Cutcombe, Carhampton, Withycombe and half of the Parish of Old Cleeve.
3. At Woolston to serve Williton, Treborough, Luxborough, half of the Parish of Old Cleeve, Nettlecombe, Elworthy, Brompton Ralph, Monksilver Glatworthy, Stogumber, Bicknoller and Sampford Brett.
4. At Strington to serve Strington, Dodington, Stogursey, West and East Quantoxhead, Kilve, Holford and Kilton.

The collections are made fortnightly for Porlock, Williton and Dunster, and Monthly elsewhere.

The whole of the collections are made by means of a modern covered Dustless Motor Vehicle, and there is no waste or unsightliness during transit.
