The death rate was high for the District compared with that for the previous years but was lower than that for the whole of England and Wales which had also increased. The cause was partly due to the severe winters and the large number of deaths from Bronchitis, Pneumonia and other respiratory diseases which was four times that of the previous year. There were also double the number of deaths from violence and four times that from causes not defined.

The incidence of infectious disease was very low considering there was a certain amount of overcrowding due to evacuees.

The deaths in the above table include residents who died outside and exclude non-residents who died within the district. Non civilian are excluded.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

All parts of the district have been regularly visited and inspected by me.

Water Supply.

The water supply has been satisfactory and there has been no serious pollution of rivers or streams.

Samples of water from the public and other supplies have been frequently analysed.

Sewerage and Drainage

The public systems remain the same and have worked satisfactorily. Good progress has been made in the Alresford scheme. Some nuisances have occurred in the West End parish from overflowing cesspools, and are bound to recur occasionally until we are able to proceed with the sewerage system which had to be postponed.

Prevalence of, and Control over, Infectious and other Diseases

The following table gives particulars of cases of infectious disease notified, excluding Tuberculosis, for which a separate table is given:-

All cases of infectious disease, with the exception of measles and whooping cough have been personally visited and advice given as to the necessary precautions to be taken.

Measles and Whooping Cough.

Measles and whooping cough were prevalent throughout the year and there were two deaths from each of these diseases. Several severe cases were removed to Hospital for treatment.

Scarlet Fever.

The 51 cases notified were spread out in various parts of the District and there was no serious outbreak.

Diphtheria

Only 5 isolated cases were notified none of which had been immunised. They were all removed to hospital and swabs taken of contacts.

Communicable Diseases.

Six cases were notified in five parishes. They were all removed to hospital and there was no further case amongst the contacts.

Infantile Paralysis

Four isolated cases were notified which were removed to hospital and there was no spread of the disease.

Diphtheria Immunisation

The number of children treated under the Council's scheme during the year was 95. The scheme has now been extended to include children up to 14 years of age and it is hoped by means of propaganda and school clinics to obtain much better results in the future.

Anti-typhoid Inoculation. Although there was no case of the typhoid group of fevers notified during the year, on the advice of the Ministry of Health that facilities should be available for the inoculation of persons desiring to avail themselves of the opportunity a scheme was drawn up by the Council on the same lines as that for diphtheria without age limit.
