This year is satisfactory from a Public Health point of view. The birth rate is higher. Death rate and infant mortality is lower than the previous year. The chief difference in the causes of death is the higher incidence of Pheumonia, Cancer, and Premature Birth in the female and Bronchitis and Inter Vascular Lesions in the Malo causes of death are in many cases identical with those of the previous year, while in both male and female there is a marked reduction in

unspecified causes.

The deaths in the above table include residents who died outside and exclude non residents who died within the district. Non civilian are excluded.

Water Supply.

The water supply has been satisfactory and there has been no serious pollution of rivers or streams.

Samples of water from the public and other supplies have been frequently analysed.

Sewerage and Drainage.

The public systems remain the same and have worked satisfactorily. The Alresford sewage scheme is now in operation and progress is being made in connecting premises to the sewer. Some nuisances have occured in the West End parish from overflowing cesspools, and are bound to recur occasionally until we are able to proceed with the sewerage system which had to be postponed.

Prevalence of, and Control over, Infectious and other Diseases.

The following table gives particulars of cases of infectious disease notified excluding Tuberculosis, for which a separate table is given:-

Me Only certain forms of pneumonia are notifiable, but the deaths are from all forms.

All cases of infectious disease, with the exception of measles and whooping cough have been personally visited and advice given as to the necessary precautions to be taken.

Measles and Whooping Cough.

Measles and whooping cough were prevalent throughout the year; there were two deaths from measles and three from whooping cough.

Scarlet Fever.

The forty-one cases notified were spread out in various parts of the District and there was no serious outbreak.

Diphtheria.

Thirteen cases were notified only one of which had been immunised. They were all removed to hospital and swabs taken of contacts.

Cerebro-Spinal Fever.

Four cases were notified in two parishes. They were removed to hospital and there were no further cases amongst the contacts.

Diphtheria Immunisation.

The number of children completely treated under the Council's scheme during the year was 3,576. This scheme now includes children up to the age of 15 years.

Paratyphoid.

Two cases were notified in 2 parishes, one having contracted the disease in another area. Both were removed to hospital.

Tuberculosis.

The following table refers to new cases and mortality during the year.
