Only certain forms of pnoumonia are notifiable, but the deaths recorded are from all forms.

The case of Infantile Faralysis and all cases of Diphtheria and Scarlet Fever have been visited and advice given as to the necessary medical precautions to be taken.

Infantile Paralyzie: in

This occurred in a school child at Itchen Stoke - she was admitted to the Royal Hants County Hospital and, later Transferred to the Lord Mayor's Trelear Home, at Alton, where she is still a patient. No evidence of contact with any previous case was found.

Diphthoria

Four cases were notified - one of which, an adult, died. Mone of them were immunised.

Immunisations

The number of children treated under the Council's Scheme was 911 of whom 488 were five years of age and over, but under fifteen - and 423 were under five. The percentage of those immunised is 37% under five years of age and 79% over five, but under fifteen. During the year, the free treatment of immunisation, already carried out at the schools and at the family Dector's Surgery, was extended to the children attending the Child Welfare Centre Clinics for the County Counteil. There the treatment is carried out by the Medical Officer in charge who, at some centres, is an Assistant County Medical Officer, and, at others, a general practitioner.

In a recent campaign for the purpose of propaganda urging the parants to protect their children against Diphtheria, slides were shown at the two Cinemas in the area -Alresford and Netley. Leaflets were distributed and propaganda was much assisted by the co-operation of the County Council and County Nursing Association. To all these parents making application to the Food Office for Cod-Liver Gil and Fruit Juice, a personal letter wassent urging the importance of having their children immunised.

Scarlet Fever

The 57 cases notified were distributed in various parts of the districts. There was no serious outbreak.

Mumps was provalent throughout the year.

Typhoid and Paratyphoid Fevers

Under the Council's Scheme, Anti-Typhoid Vaccine, for innoculation purposes, has been supplied to those practitioners, within the area desirous of obtaining it. Tuberculosis

24 of the total number (35) of cases were aged between 20 and 40 years. Among the 9 Non-Pulmonary cases 7 occurred in children.

Water Supply Sample of water from public supplies have been periodically examined during the year and reported to be satisfactory.

There has been no serious shortage of water-supply in the Council's area and no illness, traceable to water, has been reported.
