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

(2) Laboratory Facilities.

The old arrangements made with the Manchester Public Health Laboratory, and with the County Analyst proved adequate during the early part of the year for the examination of water, milk and ice cream supplies and pathological specimens of all descriptions. After 5th July these Services became "free" to the Council under the new Public Health Laboratory Service.

(3) Ambulance Facilities.

68 Winsford patients were removed by the Council's Ambulance Service and 7 by the Northwich Urban Council Ambulance Service up to the 4th July. The Ambulance Services were then transferred to the County Council under the day-to-day management of a local Divisional Health Committee. Under this new Committee the Public Ambulances of the district— 6 vehicles in all—were "pooled" and formed the nucleus of a County Service covering an area of some 100 sq. miles of Mid-Cheshire.

(4) Davenham Isolation Hospital.

The Davenham Isolation Hospital, Nr. Northwich, served adequately the needs of the District Council and admitted 15 Winsford Urban patients during 1948.

Since the 5th July this hospital has become the responsibility of the North and Mid-Cheshire Hospital Management Committee working under the Manchester Regional Hospital Board.

(5) Details of the other Health Services, e.g., Sanitary and Housing Inspections, Food Examinations, etc., etc., provided by the Winsford Urban Council are recorded later in this report.

(B) Provided by the County Council.

The Cheshire County Council have Officers discharging duties in the Urban Area under the following Services :--School Medical, Maternity and Child Welfare, Vaccination, Tuberculosis, School Dental. Health Visiting, Domestic Help, Care and After Care, Weights & Measures Inspection. Specialist Services e.g., Orthopaedic, Ophthalmic, Venereal Diseases, etc. In addition the County have assumed responsibility for the Ambulance Services, Diphtheria Immunisation, etc. since the 5th July. County Maternity Services were provided in neighbouring Hospitals, e.g., West Park, Clatterbridge, Chester City Hospital and County Maternity Homes. These Institutions after the 5th July passed out of the control of the County Council to the Regional Hospital Boards.

The following is a summary of the main changes in the local Health Services which occurred during 1948 as the outcome of the National Health Service Act :-

The District Council, after the 5th July, were no longer responsible for:-

- (a) Diphtheria Immunisation.
- (b) Ambulance Services.
- (c) The provision of hospital accommodation for Infectious Diseases.
- (d) The provision of Diphtheria Antitoxin.
- (e) The cost of certain Laboratory facilities etc. After the 5th July, the following changes took place :--

Pathological specimens e.g. Swabs, Faeces, Urine, Blood, Cerebro, Spinal Fluid, Exudates and specimens of food, milk, water, ice-cream etc. for bacteriological examination, to be sent to the new Public Health Laboratory, Monsall Hospital, Newton Heath, Manchester, 10. (Tel. Collyhurst 2733)

Vaccine Lymph and Diphtheria Prophylactics also to be obtained from this Laboratory.

Specimens for examination for tubercle bacilli to be sent to Altrincham General Hospital.

Specimens for the diagnosis of Venereal Disease to be examined at the York Place Laboratory, Manchester.

Reference has been made above to the newly formed local Divisional Health Committee; this body which acts under the auspices of the Connty Council is constituted as follows :---

18 County District Representatives from the four Mid-Cheshire District Councils.

7 County Council Representatives.

8 Co-opted Members.

The "personal" Health Services which locally this Committee has, since the 5th July, 1948, undertaken certain responsibilities delegated to them by the County Council, are:

- (4) Ambulance and Transport Service (N.H.S. Act, 1946. Section 27.)
- (5) Prevention of Illness, Care & After Care Services (N.H.S. Act, 1946. Section 28.)
- (6) Domestic Help Services (N.H.S. Act, 1946. Section 29)
- (7) Health Education and Mental Health Services.

Section C.

Sanitary Circumstances of the Area.

Water.

The Town's Public Water Supply has been maintained during the year in a satisfactory condition.

During the course of the year 3 samples were submitted to the County Analyst by the Council's Staff for Bacteriological and Residual Chlorine Examinations. All were reported upon satisfactorily.

In addition to the above, copies of 39 reports on the Town's Supply have been furnished to me by the Engineer & Manager of the Mid and South-East Cheshire Water Board. Of these 39 reports, 36 were reported upon satisfactorily, 2 were "borderline" and 1 was unsatisfactory.

All but 4 of the 3,552 houses in the Urban District are supplied from Public Mains and there are no standpipes in the area.

Drainage, Sewerage and Sewage Disposal.

I am indebted to Mr. P. Heaton, the Surveyor and Engineer of the Council, for the following statement under this heading :

"During the year considerable further sewer laying has been carried out in connection with housing development on the Dene Housing Estate and elsewhere, where necessary to deal with housing development. The sewerage system for the whole estate was so designed that as the work proceeded, so the expense for drainage work became less as the large sized sewers were laid in the early stages of the scheme.

A length of approximately 5,000 feet of sewers of various sizes from 15 inch. to 6 inch. have been laid during the year.

The separate system of sewerage is still operative, so that only foul sewage has to be treated at the disposal works and removes the large fluctuation in flow which would otherwise have to be dealt with by laying excessively large and expensive combined sewers. A main sewer 12 inch. dia. has been laid in Wharton to take the drainage from the Wharton Steelworks of Messrs. Henry Smith (Constructional Engineers) Ltd. and from future and expected developments in that area. This also enables some privy conversions to be effected.

The Council, in conjunction with the County Council, have decided to obtain an independent report on the sewerage and sewage disposal conditions in the Urban District and have engaged a Consulting Engineer to prepare a comprehensive report and scheme for the revision of the sewage disposal system. The possibility of a joint drainage scheme with adjoining authorities will be examined and reported upon."

Closet Accommodation.

The work of converting pail and privy closets to the water carriage system has been continued, and the summary below shows the progress of this work during the year :—

Refuse Collection.

The Engineer, who is the Official responsible, reports under this heading as follows :—

"The refuse collection and disposal is associated with the collection of salvage. Refuse collection proper is carried out by motor vehicles and the material is dumped under controlled tipping conditions at the Council's Sewage Works.

The work of salvage collection associated with the refuse collection has so far provided approximately 900 tons of baled paper (or an average of roughly 110 tons per year), 8 tons of kitchen waste per month together with quantities of other materials. The kitchen waste is processed for pig food at the Winsford Bacon Factory belonging to the C.W.S. Ltd.

The Council have placed on order this year a new Dennis Refuse Collection vehicle, specially designed for the work and delivery is expected during 1949."

Recreational Fields and Open Spaces.

On the subject of the further provision of Recreational Fields and Open Spaces the Engineer reports :--

"The total area of playing fields belonging to the Council is $26\frac{1}{2}$ acres in 10 different localities in the Urban Area.

The Council are in process of purchasing further land to provide 9.67 acres adjoining the Wharton Recreation Grounds for playing fields which will in the future be laid out for football and cricket etc. In addition wartime allotments have been resited on new sites and the land returned to playground use.

It is found that the open spaces in the Dene Housing Estate are used a great deal. The Council's intention is to develop some of these spaces as park areas by easy stages.

The public generally are not helpfulin preserving woodlands and trees from destruction and new plantations have to be heavily protected or continually renewed."

Canal Boats.

No Canal Boats are now registered with the Council. One inspection has been made in regard to minor repairs to cabins which were forthwith remedied.

Destruction of Rats and Mice.

A full-time rodent operative is now employed and systematic inspections are made throughout the area.

The whole of the town's sewers have been treated under the inspection of the Ministry of Agriculture; approximately 380 manholes were baited. The results showed an almost complete freedom from infestation in the sewerage system generally, far below the usual degree in towns of similar size.

Common Lodging Houses.

There are none in the District.

Licensed Camping Sites.

There is only one licensed camping site within the District. This site is approximately 3 acres, and is situated off William Street near the River Weaver.

Swimming Baths.

A sample of water taken from the Winsford Swimming Bath in June, 1948, was reported on satisfactorily by the Public Health Laboratory.

Schools in the Area.

There are 9 Schools, including the Verdin Grammar School. 7 of these have satisfactory closet accommodation, whilst the remaining 2 (Darnhall and Whitegate) have pails as no adequate sewage facilities are available. All schools are supplied with a satisfactory mains water supply.

No progress has been made so far in establishing a sewage scheme for the Swanlow South Area, which would accommodate Darnhall School.

The conversion of Vale Royal by the I.C.I. Ltd. is well in hand and is to be used as a hostel for the firm's workers. This conversion will house approximately 280 persons including a few families but mostly single workers are to be accommodated.

The inspection, and registration where called for, under the Food & Drugs Act, 1938, of premises in which other foods, e.g. prepared meats, fried fish, etc. are prepared has been conscientiously carried out during the year.
