Report of the Medical Officer of Health for 1959

To the Chairman and Members of the WIRKSWORTH URBAN DISTRICT COUNCIL.

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen.

I have the honour to submit this, my Thirtieth Annual Report, on the state of health and conditions in the Urban District of Wirksworth for the year 1959. My report is set out, as last year, in accordance with the request of the Ministry of Health, and gives detailed information and statistics, including vital statistics of the area. The work of the Sanitary Department is described in some detail in the Public Health Inspector's report and illustrates the variety of services which that department is called upon to perform.

The historic town of Wirksworth, as you will observe, has an estimated population of 4980, a figure which does not vary much over the years. Possibly the most striking addition which has taken place in the past is the Council House Estates. Some of the houses are occupied by persons displaced from properties which have been condemned as unfit for human habitation, and all the tenants are now enjoying accommodation of comfortable and up-to-date standard.

The water supply has been improved and in spite of the increased consumption, mainly due to the requirements of new houses, the maintenance of supply is considerably better than in the past, in fact, as you will read, there was no shortage of water in Wirksworth, when many parts of the country were suffering from drought.

The quality of the water at the 'spring' source is excellent, but, unfortunately, suffers deterioration from storage in open reservoirs.

To effect improvement, in addition to chlorination, which is disagreeable, efficient filtration is necessary, or, alternatively, a covered reserve and water softening plant where required.

The expansion of the quarries in and around the district has been considerable in the past few years, giving rise to more atmospheric pollution by dust. This has lead to complaints from the public, which

It is, I feel, extremely difficult, in spite of modern, improved plant, to eliminate the dust nuisance entirely, and some tolerance is needed on the part of the public, and continual vigilance and curative effort on the part of the industry. Diphtheria Immunisation.

I find that most parents are very mindful of this dread disease, and readily come forward to have their children protected.

Poliomyelitis Vaccine.

The response to the need for protection against this disease has been extremely gratifying for this area, and the campaign continues.

National Health Service.

In the light of past experience, alterations and improvements continue to be made, and one looks forward to the findings of the Royal Commission, although I feel that more consideration and attention to working conditions is necessary than to those of remuneration entirely.

I cannot help feeling that provision of Health Centres more widely, as visualised at the inception of the Health Scheme, would have made for a better service. Whether these could be operated to the best advantage under the present practitioner system or as part of a salaried service, is debatable.

Food Hygiene.

More attention is undoubtedly being given to cleanliness in the handling of foodstuffs, and to the maintenance of quality by frequent sampling. As you will observe from this report, the shops in the Wirksworth Area have attained a reasonable standard of Hygiene. Still more should be done and this applies to the country in general; more protection of foodstuffs from flies and hands and more care in the serving of non-wrapped foods for immediate consumption. As I have stated on a previous occasion, I should like to see a greater use of "servers" in this respect, which is essential if proper precautionary methods are adopted.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA

Water Supply

- (a) Both the quality and quantity of the water supplied for the Middleton and the Wirksworth Area have been satisfactory during the year 1959, except for the short period in December, the cause of which is more fully explained in my Public Health Inspector's Report. The actual results of all samples taken by the Public Health Inspector and submitted for Bacteriological Examination are set out in the Inspector's portion of this report.
- (b) No major works of improvements to plant or sources of supply have been carried out during the year.
- (c) Several lengths of water main were relaid in the Willowbath Lane and Bournebrook Avenue area during 1959 and loan sanction has also been obtained for the extension of the main from Adam Bede Crescent to Haarlem Mill. It is anticipated that this work will be carried out early in the New Year.
- (d) Discussions are still taking place with regard to the provision of water supplies to certain outlying farms, which are at present situated above the limits of normal gravitational flow.

Re-Grouping of Water Undertakings

Following on my least year's report upon this matter, the Council supplied data regarding their water undertaking to the Derbyshire County Council, which was summarised by that authority and presented to Parliament, together with the South Derbyshire Water Board Bill. In the meantime, the Derby Corporation had presented their own private bill to Parliament and in March of this year, the Clerk of the Council, together with certain delegate members, attended at the House of Commons and met the Minister of Housing and Local Government, to discuss the pros and cons of the two bills, at which meeting it is understood the Minister came out in favour of the single board. In October, 1959, the Derbyshire County Council and the County Borough of Derby together drafted a proposed South Derbyshire Water Board Order, and the latest information which has been received from the Clerk of the Derbyshire County Council is contained in a

HOUSING BY URBAN DISTRICT COUNCIL

It is with pleasure that I am able to report the recommencement of Council House building during the year under review. Although the programme only consists of two Old Age Pensioners' Bungalows and two pairs of semidetached houses, yet it is gratifying to note that a further six units of housing accommodation will be forthcoming in 1960, after a total cessation of building for the last $2\frac{1}{2}$ years.

In addition to the six units mentioned above, the Council have now received Ministerial approval to a further extension of their housing estate roads and sewers, which I hope to see completed early in the coming year. Naturally, with the completion of these additional estate roads, the Council will then be in a position to continue house building should they consider this desirable in the light of the financial conditions then prevailing.

HOUSING - GENERALLY

You will recall that in my report last year I stated that, on the whole, owners were still reluctant to spend more than the bare minimum on old cottages of 50 years plus vintage.

It is again my duty to report that this statement still holds good, and the Public Health Officer's task has been no easier during the present year under review when dealing with the question of repairs.

My prophecy, insofar as the Wirksworth Urban District is concerned, proved correct (with the advent of the House Purchase and Housing Act, 1959, which came into operation on the 14th June,) because, despite the fact that my Council have encouraged owners to apply for the Standard Grant from the very word "GO", and have administered this Act with alacrity, yet of the 14 standard grants approved up to the end of the year, only two apply to tenanted houses, the remainder, of course, being for owner/occupiers.

Further reference to my last year's report will remind you that I pointed out the omission of any administrative device in the House Purchase and Housing Bill then before Parliament which would enable a tenant to force an owner to carry our improvements, and thus for many tenants of substandard houses the prospects of modern amenities might remain as remote as before.

From a review of the problems met by the officers responsible for administering the scheme it would appear that procedure and strictures adopted throughout the country vary considerably, and it would undoubtedly be helpful if the Ministry could see fit to issue codes of procedure or practice notes, in order to obtain uniformity and obviate anomalies.

It will be apparent from my remarks above that the question of repairs to older type tenanted cottages will still require all the powers of persuasion of the Public Health Officer.

Local Authority building has been dealt with in my preceding Section of this Report but there still remains the question of private building, upon which you will wish to have information.

At the time of writing this report, I am happy to state that a total of 14 privately developed houses have been completed and occupied during the year and a further two are under construction.

There has been little development of the private estate which received Town Flanning approval on the 25th February, 1958.

The Council themselves have a large area of land available for private development and towards the end of the period under review a further plot was sold on the site.

In September, joint action of the irksworth and Matlock Public Health Officers was successful in removing two moveable dwellings illegally stationed on Flot 227 of O.S. Derbyshire XXXIV (10) (i.e. on the northern boundary of the Matlock and Wirksworth Urban District; and again in October, prompt action was taken by the Public Health Department to secure the removal of another caravan illegally stationed on Flot 1058 of O.S. Sheet XXXIX 3 (i.e The Moor, Wirksworth).

No application has been received under either the Public Health Act, 1936, Section 269, or the Town and Country Planning Act, 1947.

On no other occasion during the year was it necessary to take any specific action regarding individual infringements of the Acts relating to tents, wans and similar structures.

INFECTIOUS DISEASE AND DISINFECTION

It is indeed gratifying to be able to report that during the
year 1959 there were no cases of infectious diseases notified within
the Urban Area which necessitated the Medical Officer of Health instructing
me to carry out disinfection

DISINFESTATION

Once again no cases of bed bug infestation were brought to my notice during the year.

As in previous years, complaints were received from time to time regarding infestation of old properties with woodworm and the death watch beetle, and in all instances the occupants were given the necessary advice and instructions on how to deal with these perts.

The Council's Powder Blowers and Insecticide Sprayers were used whenever necessary with gratifying results. One of the instances worthy of recall was a severe infestation of cockroaches (Blatta Orientalis) which only yielded to extensive treatment carried out on three occasions and necessitated the removal of skirtings, floorboards and other fixtures, and spraying with a powerful liquid insecticide followed by the depositing of insecticidal powder.

(i) (a) QUALITY:-

I have continued to take monthly samples of Public Water Supplies from both Wirksworth and the Middleton Areas throughout the year, and once again the quality of the various supplies has been maintained, any unsatisfactory samples being due to the open reservoirs and not to the actual sources of supply. The Council's Water Bailiff has continued to carry out chlorination of the supplies whenever necessary during the warmer months of the year. but he has not found this to be essential during the Winter months.

(i) (b) QUANTITY

Once again, as in previous years, it is very good indeed to be able to state that there was no actual shortage of water from the combined sources of the Wirksworth Urban District during the period under review. In fact, whilst many areas throughout the country had to impose restrictions on the use of water, full supplies were available throughout the whole of the Wirksworth Urban District at all times, except for a few days at the end of the year. Unfortunately, on Monday, 14th December, when, as reference to the Spring Yield Table above will show, these were at their lowest ebb, the submersible pump at the Lady Flatts Scheme developed a fault. It will be realised that at this period the Council were relying on their borehole supplies, and without this particular borehole, there was insufficient water to maintain a 24 hours supply.

As in 1958, collections ran at a weekly frequency, except for a few days only after the Easter and Whitsuntide holidays, when the men get two days' holiday on each occasion, and following the Christmas holidays. During the annual August Week holiday, when all men are obliged to take their holiday, then, of course, there is no collection.

The number of dustbins being emptied increased during the year as building took place, and this consequently involves additional walking and lifting by the refuse collectors.

It has been said that the standard of living of any community can be assessed by the rate at which refuse accumulates and, if this is so, then the standard of living in Wirksworth is quite considerable.

Once again, I report that the men engaged in refuse collection have worked very well and very few complaints indeed were received during the year, but, unfortunately, the Department has experienced a high incidence of sickness during the period under review, and in order to maintain collections it has, of course, been necessary for me to allocate labour from other departments, to the detriment of other services.

In addition to the work of refuse collection, a weekly collection of pail and privy closets was also carried out. All the refuse collected in the Urban District is disposed of at the Hopton Refuse Tip for the Wirksworth Town Area and the Middleton Tip takes the Middleton-by Wirksworth refuse.

Quarrying industry. Unfortunately, on the 7th October, 1959, complaints began to be heard at the office regarding a dust nuisance from one of the quarries. I immediately arranged a meeting between the Quarry Manager and the Clerk of the Council, and at that interview the Manager admitted the dust nuisance, but pointed out that Messrs. Airplant of Leicester hoped to complete the new plant installation for dust extraction in the very near future. His instructions from his Head Office were to invite the Public Health Committee to view the completed plant when it was in operation. On the 22nd October, further interviews took place with the Quarry representatives but by this time six new cyclones had been installed and were working on the new plant. The old plant had still to be connected up. The position at the time of writing this report is that the Council was still awaiting notification from the Quarry concerned that the whole of the new dust extraction plant had been completed and it was then hoped to visit the site and inspect the plant under working conditions.

Throughout the whole of the period under review, the Urban District has worked in the closese co-operation with the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food Divisional Pests Officer, Mr. Fieldhouse, and his assistant, and I would like to express my gratitude to them.

In November Mr. J.A. Fearn of the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food, was loaned to my Council, and, together with Mr. Sheldon, carried out the sewer testing and treatment of the whole of the higher reaches of the sewerage system, when most gratifying results were obtained and recorded.

It will be appreciated by the Council that in normal periods of rainfall, little sewer treatment is possible in the Wirksworth Urban Area, as the majority of the sewers are surcharged in times of storm.

With the excessively dry summer, however, it was possible for advantage to be taken of the low flow in the sewers, and accordingly the opportunity was seized to carry out the above-mentioned successful combined operation.

You will recall that in my last year's report I expressed the hope that it would be possible to resume meetings of the Derbyshire Workable Areas Committee, and in January and September two such meetings were held, both at the Town Hall, Matlock, at which I represented your Authority. It is hoped that further meetings will be arranged early in the New Year.

SLAUGHTERHOUSES ACT, 1958

THE SLAUGHTERHOUSES REFORTS, (Appointed Day Order, 1959)

The above Order appoints 2.11.59 as the earliest day by which Local Authorities may submit their reports to the Minister under Section 3 of the Act about the slaughterhouse requirements of their district. These reports have to be made during the 12 months after the appointed day, i.e. not later than the 2nd November, 1960, except where a longer period is allowed by the Minister in any particular case.

There is now only one licensed slaughterhouse within the Urban District of Wirksworth, and on 1st October, 1959, I carried out an inspection of this slaughterhouse, together with the following veterinary officers of the Ministry: - Mr. E.G. Morris, Regional Veterinary Officer, Mr. J. Bennison, Deputy Regional Veterinary Officer and Mr. R. Neil Morris, Veterinary Officer. Following this inspection and subsequent discussions which I have had with the proprietor. I am given to understand that in the very near future plans will be submitted for the modernisation of this slaughterhouse in order to ascertain if they will be able to conform with the requirements of the Slaughterhouse Act, 1958, the Slaughterhouses (Hygiene) Regulations, 1958, and the Slaughter of Animals, Prevention of Cruelty Regulations, 1958. Meanwhile, at the time of writing this report, and in accordance with Circular PSH/4/59, the Clerk of the Council has written to all interested parties representing the wholesale and retail sections of the Meat Trade, asking them for their views on the slaughtering facilities available in the area. I hope that early in the New Year it will be possible for the Council to formulate a policy upon this matter and at the same time deal with any plan submitted in respect of the above-mentioned slaughterhouse so that an early report may be submitted to the Minister.

No inspection of large or special consignments of food was necessary during 1959, but there was one minor instance of a complaint being registered at my office regarding crystals in canned salmon. Upon examination, the County Analyst found these crystals to be magnesium ammonium phosphate of natural origin. The County Analyst stated that this compound was probably present in all the cans, but only occasionally are conditions just right to produce crystals large enough to be noticed. It would appear that they have been reported before in canned salmon and canned fish of other kinds.

7. Ice-Cream Regulations:

additional shop where it was desired to sell ice-cream and after our recommendations had been carried out, the premises were registered by the Council. The total registration of premises for the sale of Ice-Cream now stands at 17. Only one of the 17 registered retailers of ice-cream actually manufactured this article during the year, and again relied exclusively on the cold mix method. Towards the latter part of the year this shop closed down and the premises reverted to private use, and on the advice of the Medical Officer of Health, the refrigeration plant and apparatus was disposed of for purposes other than the manufacture of cold mix ice-cream. All the 17 premises have been regularly visited by me and monthly samples have been taken wherever possible and submitted to the Director of the Public Health Laboratory Service for examination.

Food Hygiene Regulations, 1955/1956

I have continued to carry out routine inspections under this heading and it is gratifying to be able to report that, for the most part, all the shops in the Wirksworth and Middleton Areas have now been brought up to a satisfactory standard in order to comply with these regulations.

Reference to my 1958 report will remind you that there were still three outstanding cases where improvements were required.

I am now able to report that major alterations have been carried out in order to comply with the regulations at two of these shops, whilst the remaining one has closed down owing to the cost of the improvements which would have been necessary to bring it up to the standard required.

In accordance with paragraph 5 of the Health Circular, 22/58, I have to report that no prosecutions were instigated by my Council under the Food Hygiene Regulations throughout the period under review.

FOOD AND DRUGS (MILK AND DAIRIES)

ACT, 1944

MILK AND DAIRIES REGULATIONS, 1949

(a) Routine sampling of Pasteurised milks has been carried out by me during 1958, and a total of 81 samples have been submitted to the County Bacteriologist and the Director of the Public Health Laboratory for examination. Of these, 65 were pronounced satisfactory under the Methylene Blue Test and 81 satisfactory under the Phosphatese Test.

The reason for the discrepancy between the number of samples taken and the number of Nethylene Blue Tests carried out, is explained by the fact that in 16 instances this test was not carried out owing to the shadt temperature exceeding 65° F.

Once again the above results speak for themselves, of course, and when one realises that there were no failures out of 81 samples taken by me in your area, then this is indeed an excellent result. I feel sure the Council will agree that the sampling undertaken bears positive proof of the high standard of the milk sold to the Fublic in this area, and when results such as these can be obtained over a period of one year it is obvious that organised sampling has the desired effect.

(b) In addition to the above designated milk samples, 10 samples of Raw T.T. Milk were taken by me from two farms and submitted to the County Bacteriologist for Methylene Blue Tests and Biological Tests. In all 10 samples a condition of tuberculosis was not found in guinea pigs by post mortem examination forty-two days after inoculation, and these were, therefore, pronounced satisfactory under the Biological Tests.

Generally MILK

On no occasion during the year have I found it necessary to draw the attention of either the Milk Wholesalers or Retailers in this area to any particular items of complaint, and I think it fair to state that the District as a whole is well supplied with a choice of designated milks from various sources.

FOOD AND DRUGS ACT, 1955.

The following results and particulars of samples taken in this district on behalf of my Council by the Derbyshire County Council Food and Drugs Authority have once again been supplied to me by the County Analyst, Mr. R.W. Sutton, B.Sc., F.R.I.C., F.C.S.,

22 samples, including 13 milks, were taken under the above Act in the area of the Wirksworth Urban District Council during the year 1959.

All samples were found to be satisfactory.

Crystals found in Canned Salmon were submitted by your Authority for identification. These were identified as magnesium ammonium phosphate - a compound of natural origin found in fish and liable to form crystals in a processed product.

FISH - FRYING PREMISES

The two Fish Frying Premises in this Area have all received routine inspections during the year, and I am pleased to be able to report that the conditions obtaining therein are satisfactory.

You will perhaps recall that I was able to report last year upon the complete modernisation of one of these establishments. Fortunately this year I am able to do likewise with respect to the other fish-frying shop.

In August, 1958, the proprietor decided that he would like to transfer his business from Coldwell Street to St. John Street. Initially this met with a refusal from the Town Flanning Officer. However, upon my Council supporting this application, Town Flanning permission was officially granted on the 3rd March, 1959. Extensive alterations were carried out at the new premises, consisting of two dining rooms, new food preparation room with double sinks and hot and cold water over, new fish frying room complete with a "Hartley" cocking range fitted with steam and fume extractors, together with a bain-marie for storage of hot food. Formica fittings have been used wherever necessary and walls and floors have been constructed of impervious materials. Two large refrigerators have been installed in the food preparation room and the Rumbler is located in the building at the rear. The first floor of these premises has been converted into a modern living flat for the proprietor.

The fish-frying premises at Middleton-by-Wirksworth have now ceased to be used for this purpose.

The Urban District is, therefore, fortunate in that both its fish frying establishments have been completely modernised and comply in all respects with the Food Hygiene Regulations.

The procedure of "voluntary Surrender" has continued to work satisfactorily, and in no instance has it been necessary to take Statutory Action over the condemnation of diseased or unsound fish.

BAKEHOUSES

As will be seen from my statistics under General Sanitary
Administration at the commencement of this report, there is now only
one bakehouse in use in the Wirksworth Urban District.

The usual regular routine visits of inspection have been made to the two bakehouses which were operating up to 21.5.59, when one of these was removed from the Factory Register upon instructions from H.M. Inspector of Factories. This private bakehouse was acquired by a multiple firm who intend to continue the supply and delivery of bread and confectionery from one of their central depots. Unfortunately, in so far as hygione is concerned, this bakehouse which has ceased to be used was the modern one situated in Middleton-by-Wirksworth, and from a Public Health point of view I would have preferred the old establishment in Wirksworth to be discontinued rather than this one.

No further improvements have been carried out to the Wirksworth bakehouse where the business is still carried on in very grim surroundings with little room for extension and I would dearly like to see these premises either brought up to the modern standards now enjoyed by the majority of the workers in this industry or cease to be used.

Unfortunately on the 3rd June, 1959, complaints were received regarding illegal sleeping on the premises at this old bakehouse, but I am happy to report that this offence under the Act was quickly dealt with by informal action and the nuisance abated.
