Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present to you my Annual Report on the health and sanitary circumstances of the Urban District for the year ended 31st, December, 1971.

The Registrar General's estimate of population for mid 1971 was 5,140, an increase of 130 over that for 1970.

The total number of live births registered during the year was 75, a decrease of 16 on the 1970 figures.

The number of deaths registered during the year was 53 (that is 33 Males and 20 Females), and this figure shows an increase of 7 on that for the previous year's figures. There were no still births during the year.

Deaths from cancer of all sites numbered 11 and deaths from cancer of the lungs and bronchus were classed as being responsible for 3 deaths.

The Infant Mortality Rate of 18 for England and Wales was the same low rate as in 1969. This trend was reflected in this area with a rate of 1.00 per thousand live births.

A total of 28 notifications of infectious disease were recorded (as against 58 notifications received during 1970) made up as follows : Measles 15, Chicken Pox 13. There were no notifications of Tuberculosis.

It is very pleasing to report that due to our efforts of surveillance of farms that produce raw farm bottled milk, that in the year under review no farms were found to have Brucella Abortus in their herds. Any risk to humans contracting Brucellosis from these sources has now been eliminated and is a further step to our goal of a healthy environment.

During 1971 I am pleased to be able to report that we received no notification of food poisoning cases in this district.

I have once again to place on record my thanks to the Chairman and Members of the Health Committee, to Dr. A.H. Snaith, the County Medical Officer, to the General Practitioners, the Clerk of the Council, and the Public Health Inspector and other Chief Officers, for their support and assistance, and to the staff of the Department for their untiring efforts during the year.

The number of deaths registered during the year was 22 (that is 11 males and 11 females), and this figure shows an increase of 7 on that for the previous year's figure. There were no still births during the year.

Deaths from cancer of all sites numbered 11 and deaths from cancer of the lungs and bronchus were placed as being responsible for 1 death.

The Infant Mortality Rate of 16 for Milwaukee and Wales was the same for 1920 as in 1919. This trend was reflected in this area with a rate of 1.00 per thousand live births.

A total of 25 notifications of infectious diseases were recorded (as against 20 notifications received during 1919) made up as follows: Measles 12, Chicken Pox 11. There were no notifications of Tuberculosis.

It is very pleasing to report that due to our efforts of surveillance of cases that persons are kept notified with the year when review is made and found to have been notified in their homes. In 1920, 100 cases of measles were notified from those persons who had been notified and as a further step to our goal of a healthy environment.

During 1920 I am pleased to be able to report that we received no notification of food poisoning cases in this district.

I have once again to place on record my thanks to the Chairman and Members of the Health Committee, to Mr. A. H. Smith, the County Health Officer, to the General Practitioners, the Clerk of the Council, and the Public Health Inspector and other Civil Officers, for their support and assistance, and to the staff of the Department for their untiring efforts during the year.

B.C.G. VACCINATION

The two schemes in operation, that is, the scheme administered by the Chest Physicians on the one hand and the County Council Scheme on the other, continued to operate throughout the year. The Scheme administered by the Chest Physicians is limited to children who have been in contact with cases of Respiratory Tuberculosis and the County Council Scheme is for school children of the age of 13 years and upwards, and, here I would like to comment that there is a marked reluctance on the parents' part to agree to their children being given this very worthwhile examination and test.

POLIOMYELITIS AND POLIOMYELITIS VACCINATION

It gives me great pleasure once again to report that no confirmed cases of poliomyelitis occurred in the district during the year, but freedom from infection can only be maintained if parents continue to bring their children for vaccination.

RUBELLA VACCINATION

Vaccination against rubella is still being offered to girls between their 11th and 14th birthdays, but priority should be given to older children in their 14th year.

IMMUNISATION AGAINST WHOOPING COUGH AND TETANUS

Arrangements for immunisation against these two complaints is available through the Derbyshire County Council and the same arrangements remained in force throughout the year. Injections are given at the County Council Clinic, or by the General Practitioners and booster doses are given after the recommended interval has elapsed.

HOUSING BY THE URBAN DISTRICT COUNCIL

As is appreciated this is one of the most important functions for which the Local Authority is responsible, namely, the rehousing of families living in overcrowded or insanitary conditions.

Wirksworth has, I believe, a first class record of post war Council housing and taken by and large, its housing problem is much less intense than many other similar local authorities.

This is perhaps borne out by the undernoted statistics supplied to me by the Housing Officer as to the numbers of persons on the Housing Waiting List as at 31st December, 1971.

I am pleased to report that during the year modernisation and the improvement programme of twenty-five houses at Snowfield View was completed and a further programme for forty-eight houses at Gorsey Bank was started.

HOUSING GENERALLY

The work of securing essential repairs to rented houses in the district was maintained at much the same level as in 1970. This routine, but essential work carried out by informal action with property owners entails a considerable number of meetings and liaisons with solicitors, owners and occupiers by virtue of the fact that the action is informal and not statutory.

However, it has always been my experience that when informal action is carried to a successful conclusion, the result is more satisfactory to all parties concerned than when the Council is forced to take statutory action, although as I have already pointed out this informal action by its very nature is most time consuming.

Slum Clearance

Progress under this heading has been very limited indeed, and for your information, the following table shows the total number of houses dealt with by the Department since the Ministry called for a review.

IMPROVEMENT GRANTS

Work on improving suitable houses continued during the year at a steady rate. Nineteen applications for Standard Grants were received during the year, as compared with a total of fourteen in 1970. All these Standard Grant applications were approved. The work is, I think, one of the most satisfying aspects of the Department's work, as the applicant is in all cases very satisfied, with his improved standard of living, and in each case a house has been brought up to a standard which is more in keeping with modern ideas.

It is undoubtedly a fact that this work of improving houses leads to an improved standard of maintenance which, in the long term, prevents the deterioration of a house into a slum dwelling, thus avoiding the provision of a new Council dwelling in which to rehouse the occupants.

The following particulars of formal applications received and approved for Standard Grants for the inauguration of the scheme will no doubt be of interest to members of the Council.

It is indeed gratifying to be able to report that during the year 1971 there were no cases of infectious diseases notified within the urban area which necessitated the Medical Officer of Health instructing me to carry out disinfection.

Once again, the Council have continued to exercise strict control throughout the whole of their area, with the result that there has been no real growth of undesirable unlicensed dwellings or sites within the boundaries of the urban district.

Sporadic cases have occurred, of course, and these have been dealt with as expeditiously as possible.

DISINFESTATION

As in previous years, complaints were received from time to time regarding infestation of old properties with woodworm and the death watch beetle, and in all instances, the occupants were given the necessary advice, and instructions on how to deal with these pests.

The Council's Powder Blowers and Insecticide Sprayers were used whenever necessary with gratifying results, and a number of infestations of cockroaches (*Blattella Germanica*) yielded to extensive treatment, which consisted of the use of smoke generators.

The foreman, Mr. Walter Butlin, carried out the routine work of this nature during 1971, and was assisted by Mr. J. Sheldon, prior to his retirement in July 1971. Mr. W.R. Marples has now been appointed to assist Mr. Butlin with this work.

Throughout the whole of the period under review, the Urban District has worked in the closest co-operation with the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food Divisional Pests Officer, Mr. F.B. Oates, and again I would like to express my gratitude to him.

In addition to sewer treatments rat infestations at Intake and Middleton tips have been eradicated by routine treatments by Mr. Butlin.

Very few properties have been found to be infested as a result of notification but each complaint has been dealt with in an efficient and successful manner.

REFUSE COLLECTION

Despite the vagaries of the British Climate, a weekly refuse collection has been maintained reasonably satisfactory during the year. With the new compression type refuse vehicle it has been possible to maintain this service during the winter months with only the three regular collectors.

The West End tip has now been filled and all refuse is tipped at Intake Lane.

Refuse collection, is, I think, a service taken very much for granted until the rare occasion when for some reason or other the slightest variation from the expected weekly routine emptying of the dustbin occurs. Perversely the better the service the more noticeable any departure from the normal, particularly at holiday times when the men themselves, of course, entitled to expect a rest from their labours.

During the year a modified bin liner scheme was introduced covering 200 of the most difficult houses to collect, and this has improved the service in so much as the collectors only have one journey, rather than the return journey to collect the bin.

Also the trade refuse collection has been reviewed, and put on a more sound economical footing.

I would also like to take this opportunity of thanking the manual workers of this Department, under the able supervision of the Foreman, for their work during the year.

The enforcement of the Petroleum Acts and Regulations is not a minor duty requiring a minimum of attention, on the contrary, such Acts where loss of life, personal injury or damage to property may result through lack of proper enforcement, require a high standard of technical knowledge for their proper performance.

During the year, visits were made to premises for the purpose of the inspection and examination of sites, installations and the electrical equipment associated with the pumps. The number of licences issued was eleven and the fee for licensing, etc., amount to £38.00.

On every occasion whenever it has been necessary, I have received the closest co-operation and assistance from the Fire Prevention Officers of the Derbyshire County Council through their Chief Officer, Mr. T.N. Watkins.

All new tanks together with those which have been installed for more than 20 years are subjected to pressure tests.

Pressure tests and all electrical installations are now certified as being up to the standard before the licences are issued.

SEWERAGE AND SEWAGE DISPOSAL

4. Education Activity

With the approval of the Medical Officer of Health, various posters and wall sheets on clean food and the dangers of food poisoning have been displayed in the area. The subject matter of these posters is, of course, changed from time to time.

5. Disposal of unsound food

Unsound food is disposed of locally, either by incineration whenever possible, failing this, on the Council's refuse tips. There remains a close liaison with proprietors of food businesses in the voluntarily surrender of food unfit for human consumption.

The total registration of premises for the sale of Ice-Cream, now stands at 20. None of the 20 registered retailers of Ice-Cream actually manufacture Ice-Cream, but all are registered as retailers of pre-packed, individual Ice-Creams obtained from manufacturers of national repute. All the 20 premises have been regularly visited by me and monthly samples have been taken wherever possible and submitted to the Director of the Public Health Laboratory Service for examination.

The following table shows the results of the samples which I have taken on your behalf during the year 1971. As will be seen, all samples taken were pronounced satisfactory by the Director of the Public Health Laboratory.

The following results and particulars of samples taken in this District on behalf of my Council by the Derbyshire County Council Food and Drugs Authority have once again been supplied to me by the County Analyst, Mr. J. Markland, B.Sc., F.R.I.C.

"32 samples, including 4 milks were taken in this area. All the milk samples were classed as satisfactory.

A packet of Potato Mash Mix carried an unsatisfactory label. The Manufacturers were cautioned.

One sample of Pork Sausage Meat contained preservative, although this was not declared at the time of sale. A caution notice was issued.

A Dried Apple Drink was of unsatisfactory composition, and further samples are to be taken.

The remaining samples were all classed as satisfactory."

FISH FRYING PREMISES

The two fish frying premises in the area received routine inspections during the year, and I am pleased to be able to report that the conditions obtained therein are satisfactory.

There have been no further major alterations worthy of note carried out to either of these premises during the period under review, and they continue to operate in a clean and hygienic manner.

BAKEHOUSES

As will be seen from my statistics under General Sanitary Administration at the commencement of this report, there is now only one bakehouse in use in the Wirksworth Urban District and I can only continue to bring to your notice each year the conditions prevailing in this establishment. Work on improvements have been carried out within the retail shop, but because of the lack of space, etc., for building these premises cannot be brought up to an absolutely modern standard.

However, the standard of bread and confectionery produced from these premises appears to be of good quality and I have no complaints whatsoever from the public during the period under review.

WATER SUPPLY

The South Derbyshire Water Board provide the water supply for the town, and I am indebted to Mr. I.G. Edwards, Engineer and General Manager, South Derbyshire Water Board for his observations which are given below :-

- (a) The water supply to the area has been adequate in quantity and generally satisfactory in quality.
- (b) Regular examination is made of both raw and treated waters. A total of 48 bacteriological, 1 chemical and 47 partial chemical samples were taken during the year, both at the works and from various points in the Wirksworth Urban District.

Consumers in the Middleton and Bolehill areas of Wirksworth are supplied with water from the Homesford Works via the Breamfield Reservoir. The water is treated to raise the fluoride content to 1.00 p.p.m. The remainder of the Urban District is supplied from the two local sources given below :-

In addition 31 bacteriological samples were taken by myself, all of which proved satisfactory, and in addition 6 samples of private water supplies were taken, 1 of these was satisfactory and 5 were bacteriologically unsuitable for drinking purposes .

During the year the delivery of water for domestic use has continued to three cottages at Godfreyhole. Apart from the "Salty" taste to the water, as reported last year, samples have indicated that the well water is bacteriologically unsuitable for domestic use. At the time of writing negotiations are still in hand with the South Derbyshire Water Board for the properties to be connected to the mains supply.
