PUBLIC HEALTH STAFF.

The duties connected with this are carried out by the M.O.H. who is a part time Officer, the Borough Surveyor, the Borough Senior and Additional Sanitary Inspectors, all full time officers, together with those of the Council's employees who are specially needed for sanitary work.

INFANT AND CHILD WELFARE.

The Infant and Child Welfare Clinic is held weekly in Park Hall, Ruby Street, and is well attended.

Sanitary Inspector's Report for the Year 1946

PUBLIC HEALTH DEPARTMENT,

NENE QUAY, WISBECH.

To the Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors of the Borough of Wisbech.

LADY AND GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to present to you my report for the year 1946, being my twenty-seventh Annual Report.

The report covers briefly the work carried out during the year and shows that regular attention is given to the many matters coming within the purview of my department and the accompanying summaries give the number of inspections made and the work executed under notice. It is gratifying to note that with few exceptions, the whole of the work has been executed after interviews or after service of informal notices, with the result that the time of the Public Health Committee has been saved in considering these matters and the work has progressed under amicable conditions.

Housing repairs are being proceeded with as fast as possible, but the scarcity of building materials renders the execution of this work very slow and although as will be seen from the summaries, some progress has been made, there is still a large accumulation of this work remaining to be dealt with. There is also the question of houses that are getting beyond repair. In these cases emergency repairs only are being asked for pending the time when the occupants can be re-housed and the houses demolished.

The number of cases of infectious disease notified during the year, has again been remarkably low. These cases have been investigated as they have occurred and disinfection has been immediately carried out.

Regular visits are paid to the various shops and stores where food is deposited or prepared for sale and where such foods are inspected. Daily visits are also paid to the Central Slaughter-houses in Bartlett's Yard for the purpose of inspecting carcases of slaughtered animals. In September the Council resolved to apply the Slaughter of Animals Act to sheep, so that sheep are now stunned by the humane method. No difficulty has been experienced in applying this method and I am pleased to report that slaughtering generally is carried out in a workmanlike manner by men who take an interest in their job and the slaughterhouses are well kept. The following summaries contain details of foods condemned.

Rodent Control, which was added to the work of my department during last year has proceeded satisfactorily. The main sewers throughout the town have received two extensive treatments, and every man-hole has been baited at least four times. In addition block control including a complete survey of premises has been carried out, and the Council's refuse dump has been extensively treated. The following is an indication of the operations:—
