LIBRARY

In the Borough there is one School Clinic, a Tubercular Clinic, a General Hospital, an Infectious Diseases Hospital and an Orthopædic Clinic held bi-monthly at the North Cambridgeshire Hospital.

Excellent Motor Ambulance facilities are available, whilst Diphtheria Antitoxin and Pathological and Bacteriological examinations are provided when necessary.

PUBLIC HEALTH STAFF.

The duties connected with this are carried out by the M.O.H. who is a part time Officer, the Borough Surveyor, the Borough Senior and Additional Sanitary Inspectors, all full time Officers, together with those of the Council's employees who are specially needed for sanitary work.

INFANT AND CHILD WELFARE.

The Infant and Child Welfare Clinic is held weekly in Park Hall, Ruby Street, and is well attended.

Sanitary Inspector's Report for the Year 1948

Public Health Department,
Albion Place,
Nene Quay, Wisbech.

To the Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors of the Borough of Wisbech.

LADY AND GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to present to you my report for the year 1948, being my twenty-ninth Annual Report.

This report, as usual, is mainly in summary form and covers the work carried out by my department in the interests of the general health of the Borough.

NUISANCES.

General inspections for nuisances and matters coming within the Public Health Acts have increased to a total of 864. This increase is partly accounted for by the visits paid for the provision of proper dustbins. This is a matter which was long overdue and was impeded by the war and up to the end of the year difficulty was experienced owing to shortage of materials. However, during the year 218 notices were served for the provision of suitable bins and 190 of these notices were complied with. With regard to other nuisances investigated, all but three were dealt with by informal notice and abated, the three cases which had to be reported to the Council for statutory action were subsequently abated.

Housing.

Housing repairs at the present time is one of the matters calling for chief attention owing to existing houses, mainly by their age and unavoidable neglect when labour and materials were unobtainable, having deteriorated and fallen into bad repair. Whilst new houses are being built and until the supply nearer reaches the demand, these old houses will require patching and re-patching, so that they may not be allowed to outlive their usefulness. It would indeed be bad policy, if for every new house built two existing houses became uninhabitable for the want of this process of patching. Therefore, repairs must go on in order that as many families as possible can have a seperate house to live in. In an endeavour to accomplish this work, repairs have been carried out under notice from my department, at 135 dwelling-houses during the year. 28 representations have been made for statutory action where informal notices were not complied with and where houses could be repaired at a reasonable expense and two representations were sut mitted for demolition orders in cases of houses beyond repair. One certificate was issued under the Rent and Mortgage Interest Restrictions (Amendment) Act. 1933 in a case of non repair. It would seem that for some time to come, clearance schemes will remain in abeyance.

INFECTIOUS DISEASES.

The number of cases of Infectious Diseases notified has again been low as will be seen from the report of the Medical Officer of Health. These cases were all investigated as they occurred and disinfection was immediately carried out after removal to hospital or recovery of the patient.

RODENT CONTROL.

Rodent control is operated systematically in the Borough, and sewer treatments have been undertaken in order to qualify for grant. In addition to the sewer treatments the following work has been in hand at various properties:—

WATER.

In August, an Application for Grant with a Scheme under the Rural Water Supplies and Sewerage Act, 1944, was submitted to the Ministry of Health for the extensions of Water Mains to the Rural areas of the Borough. This scheme is mainly concerned with those parts of the Borough situated on the North and South Brinks, and which are dependent on rainwater for their supplies. The scheme provides for the laying of 28,346 yards of mains at an estimated total cost of approximately £22,954. Details of the scheme were being supplied up to the end of the year.

A sample of drinking water from the Wisbech Waterworks Company's supply was submitted for Analysis by the Public Analyst in August 1948, the report of the Analyst being as follows:—"The results obtained on the Analysis of this sample do not show any evidences of pollution with harmful organic or inorganic matter. I am of opinion that this water is fit for drinking purposes."

CAMPS.

Fruit Pickers' Accommodation was given attention during the fruit season. One large canvas camp was erected in Weasenham Lane to accommodate approximately 300 workers. The ablution and drainage services at this camp were quite inadequate and several adjustments of a temporary nature were carried out. However, a more permanent type of camp with all necessary facilities for cooking and general sanitary arrangements was being planned towards the end of the year and arrangements were being made for the laying of a new water main so as to have a camp designed on modern lines by the 1949 season.

FOOD.

Food supplies have again been given regular attention. The Central Slaughterhouses have been given one or more visits daily and the premises have been found to be carried on in a satisfactory manner. The following particulars of condemnations are submitted:—
