Excellent Motor Ambulance facilities are available, whilst Diphtheria Antitoxin and Pathological and Bacteriological examinations are provided when necessary.

PUBLIC HEALTH STAFF.

The duties connected with this are carried out by the M.O.H. who is a part time officer, the Borough Surveyor, the Borough Senior and Additional Sanitary Inspectors, all full time Officers, together with those of the Council's employees who are specially needed for sanitary work.

INFANT AND CHILD WELFARE.

The Infant and Child Welfare Clinic is held weekly in Park Hall, Ruby Street, and is well attended.

Sanitary Inspector's Report for the Year 1949

To the Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors of the Borough of Wisbech.

LADY AND GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to present to you my report for the year 1949 being my thirtieth Annual Report.

This report, as usual, is mainly in summary form and covers the work carried out by my department in the interests of the general health of the Borough.

PUBLIC HEALTH ACTS.

The inspections for nuisances and matters generally coming within the Public Health Acts numbered 812 and have again been above normal. This again is due to extra visits paid for the provision of dust-bins. The supply of these bins to every house was well on the way by the end of the year and 128 bins had been provided after the service of notices. In five cases only was it found necessary to report the existence of nuisances to the Council for statutory action and all five were subsequently abated.

Housing.

The position regarding house repair is still a matter presenting many difficulties owing chiefly to the lack of material, which causes delay in getting work done and in view of the high cost of this work compared with the rents charged, there is not that willingness to put the work in hand as was experienced prior to the late war. There are many houses which are deteriorating rapidly owing to their old age and whereas these houses would in all probability in the normal way, have by this time been eliminated, it is necessary that the life of these houses be extended by doing a minimum of repairs in order that families may have an indifferent house rather than none at all until better accommodation is available.

Repairs to old property are therefore proceeding and repairs at 100 houses have been executed after notice from my department. 37 representations have been made for statutory action where informal notices were not complied with and where houses could be repaired at a reasonable expense, and two representations were submitted for demolition orders in cases of houses beyond repair. One certificate was issued under the Rent and Mortgage Interest Restrictions (Amendment) Act 1933. One family was removed who were living and sleeping in a dilapidated outhouse and Legal Proceedings were taken for possession of a house where a demolition order had become operative and in this case an Order was obtained for possession in one month.

NATIONAL ASSISTANCE ACT, 1948.

Two cases were dealt with under this Act where Orders were obtained from the Court for the removal of persons to hospital, where the persons concerned were found to be unable to devote to themselves and were not receiving from other persons proper care and attention. Two other cases were dealt with where persons were in similar circumstances and in these cases the persons were removed to hospital by voluntary action after persuasion.

INFECTIOUS DISEASES.

The number of notifications of infectious disease has again been low as will be seen from the report of the Medical Officer of Health. These cases were all investigated as they occurred and disinfection was immediately carried out after removal to hospital or recovery of the patient.

WATER SUPPLIES.

The application for grant towards the scheme under the Rural Water Supplies and Sewerage Act 1944, which was submitted to the Ministry of Health in August 1948, and which provided for the laying of water mains in the rural parts of the Borough, was disallowed by the Minister who reached the conclusion that the district was not a rural locality within the meaning of the Act. The scheme, however, was transferred for consideration to the Agricultural Executive Committee and progress was being made by the end of the year.

Three cases were dealt with in the rural area of the Borough where the water in the storage cisterns was proved on analysis to be unfit for drinking purposes.

CAMPS.

Fruit Pickers Camps were given the usual attention. The camp in Weasenham Lane designed to accommodate approximately 300 persons was put on a permanent footing, and in this respect new Kitchens, Ablution rooms, W.C.'s and Food Stores were built on up-to-date lines with drainage system and a direct supply of water provided from the town's mains.

ICE CREAM.

There are three premises in the Borough registered to manufacture Ice Cream, and at these premises the Ice Cream (Heat Treatment Etc.) Regulations 1947 are being carried out in a satisfactory manner. There are 28 premises registered for the sale and storage of Ice Cream and at the majority of these premises wrapped Ice Cream only is sold.

FACTORIES AND WORKSHOPS.

Two certificates have been issued with respect to adequate means of escape in case of fire.

RODENT CONTROL.

Rodent control is operated systematically in the Borough and the necessary sewer treatment has been carried out in order to qualify for grant. In addition to sewer treatment the following work has been in hand at various properties:—
