In the Borough there is a School Clinic, a Tubercular Clinic, two General Hospitals, a Hospital for chronic aged and sick female patients, and an Orthopaedic Clinic held weekly at the North Cambridgeshire Hospital. Infectious Diseases are accommodated at Peterborough and East Dereham Isolation Hospitals.

Excellent Motor Ambulance facilities are available, whilst Diphtheria Antitoxin and Pathological and Bacteriological examinations are provided when necessary.

## PUBLIC HEALTH STAFF.

The duties connected with this are carried out by the M.O.H. who is a part-time officer, the Borough Engineer and Surveyor, the Borough Senior and Additional Public Health Inspectors, all full-time officers, together with those of the Council's employees who are specially needed for sanitary work.

### INFANT AND CHILD WELFARE.

The Infant and Child Welfare Clinic in Norwich Road is held weekly on Friday afternoons, a record number of attendances being made in 1956.





## Report of the Senior Public Health Inspector for the Year 1956

Public Health Department, Albion Place, Nene Quay, Wisbech.

To the Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors of the Borough of Wisbech

Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present to you my report for the year 1956, being my thirty-seventh Annual Report. This report appears mainly in summary form and covers the work undertaken by my department in the interests of the general health of the Borough.

### PUBLIC HEALTH ACTS.

Inspections numbering 295 have been made of premises where matters remedial under the Public Health Acts generally existed. In six cases only was it necessary to report matters to the Public Health Committee for statutory action where informal action had failed. The whole of the remaining cases brought the desired results after informal action by preliminary notice or interviews. Details of the work executed appear in the summaries at the end of this report.

We are again indebted to the Manager of the Wisbech and District Water Board for monthly reports of examinations of samples of drinking water from the Board's supply. In every case the results have shown a water of the highest standard of bacterial purity.

## HOUSING ACTS.

Progress has been made in dealing with properties coming within the scope of the Housing Acts. Repairs to old properties have again been carried out in order to render them temporarily fit for human habitation, but many houses remain to be dealt with. During the year repairs have been carried out at 61 houses in the Borough, 14 of these only were dealt with by formal action.

The Slum Clearance programme was well on the way by the end of the year, and many properties were earmarked for early attention. A statement of action taken in regard to the five-year programme would show us that in 1956 the total number of houses demolished was 36, houses vacated prior to demolition was 27 and a further 13 were declared due for clearance although still occupied.

## INFECTIOUS DISEASES.

The town has again been very free from infectious disease. Visits have been paid to houses from which infectious disease has been notified and the usual disinfection has been undertaken after the removal to hospital or recovery has taken place. Details of the notifications and action taken will appear in the report of the Medical Officer of Health.

#### FACTORIES AND WORKSHOPS.

One factory has been provided with improved sanitary accommodation, one workshop has been cleansed and limewashed and a certificate of means of escape in case of fire has been issued for one factory.

#### COMMON LODGING HOUSES.

There are two Common Lodging Houses in the Borough, registered to receive 45 male lodgers. These premises have been inspected periodically and so far as structural conditions will permit, have been carried on in a satisfactory manner.

#### MEAT AND FOOD.

As mentioned in my previous Annual Report, Meat and Food along with Housing are the two main duties falling to the lot of your Public Health Inspectors. Visits to slaughterhouses for the examination of carcases are made daily, and evening visits are also made when necessary. There are at present, operating in the Borough, seven slaughterhouses in regular use and these are serving the demand, although in two cases conditions are very cramped and structurally poor.

During the year a very large number of pigs were slaughtered in Wisbech for export to the London Markets, in addition to those slaughtered for local consumption. In this respect the number of pig carcases dealt with during the year increased to 14,411 out of a total of all animals numbering 20,512.
