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

GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to present to you my third Annual Report on the Sanitary Condition of the United Urban District of Wolstanton, with the Vital Statistics for the year 1906.

The District is composed of the three Parishes of Wolstanton, (including part of Basford, May Bank, and Longbridge Hayes), Silverdale, (including 'Knutton and Cross Heath), and Chesterton, (including Red Street).



The Birth-rate in England and Wales for 1906 was 27.0 per 1,000 of the population, which is 0.2 per 1,000 below the rate in 1905, and lower than the rate in any other year on record; compared with the average in the ten years 1896-1905, the birth-rate in 1906 shows a decrease of 1.7 per 1,000.

Deaths.

The total number of deaths registered in the District was 296. This gives an annual Death-rate of 10.9 per 1000.

Of these deaths, 4 were of non-residents at the Bradwell Sanatorium. There were also 23 deaths of residents occuring in Institutions outside the District:—

North Staffordshire Infirmary 9
Chell Workhouse 14

The corrected number of deaths thus becomes 315, (Males 155, Females 160), giving an annual Death-rate of 11.7 per 1000 of the estimated population of the District.

This is a great improvement on the last two years, as will be seen from the following figures:—

Thus, there were 73 deaths less than last year, in the whole District, and the death-rate is 3.25 below that of last year. While all portions of the District, share in the diminished death-rate, that of Silverdale shows the greatest improvement, being 10.4 per 1,000, and 4.9 below that of last year.

For all England and Wales, the death-rate in 1906 was 15.4 per 1,000, which was 0.2 per 1,000 above the rate in 1905; compared with the average rate in the ten years 1896-1905, the death-rate in 1906 shows a decrease of 1.4 per 1,000

Infant Mortality.

The deaths under 1 year in 1906 were 95, equal to a mortality of 112 per 1,000 registered births.

This is a great improvement on the last two years as will be seen from the table given below, and is considerably less than the infant mortality for all England and Wales in 1906, which was 133.

As will be seen however the infant mortality in Chesterton, continues to be much higher than the other parts of the District, and leaves much to be desired, being 135.

This is no doubt due in a great measure to the greater number of women who are working in Chesterton, and also to poorer housing conditions.



Infectious Diseases Notification Act, 1889.

277 cases have been notified during the year, including the following ---

This is a considerable increase on last year in which 193 cases were notified. The increase is chiefly due to an epidemic of Scarlet Fever in Chesterton, and a greater number of Diphtheria cases in Wolstanton and Chesterton.

The usual method of dealing with these cases has been carried out throughout the year.

The houses are visited, enquiries made and noted on printed forms, and instructions as to isolation given. Removal to the Bradwell Sanatorium is urged where possible.

The Sanitary condition of the premises is carefully inquired into and inspected, and any defects found remedied.

Every infected house is disinfected, either on removal of the case, or at the expiration of the period of infection as certified by the Medical practitioner in charge.

Disinfectants are supplied throughout the illness, where the cases are treated at home.

BRADWELL SANATORIUM

Since the opening of the new Infectious Diseases Hospital in Burslem, last May, the Bradwell Sanatorium has proved amply sufficient to meet the needs of the District, and no cases have been refused admission for want of room since last April.

121 cases have been removed during the year. This is a very great increase on the last two years in which the numbers removed were 56 and 62 respectively.

The Sanitary arrangements at the Bradwell Sanatorium still continue to be very bad. There are still no water-closets, and the bath and laundry accommodation is insufficient.

A Steam Disinfector which could conveniently be kept at the Bradwell Sanatorium is urgently needed for the district. At present articles requiring disinfection by this means have to be sent to Burslem.

SMALL-POX. .

No cases of Small-pox have occurred in the district during the year.

ENTERIC OR TYPHOID FEVER

16 cases have been notified. 6 of these occurred in Wolstanton, 8 in Silverdale, and 2 in Chesterton.

4 cases were removed to the Bradwell Sanatorium.

There were 5 deaths from Enteric Fever, giving a deathrate per 1000 living of 0.18.



SCARLET FEVER

174 cases have been notified during the year. The following shows the distribution in the district for each month:—

Among these there were 6 deaths, giving a case mortality of 3.4 per 100 cases.

89 cases—51 per cent were removed to the Bradwell Sanatorium, 5 cases during the early part of the year could not be moved for want of room, and 18 cases were too young for removal.

From April to July, Scarlet Fever became very prevalent in Chesterton, but owing principally to the large proportion of cases removed to the Bradwell Sanatorium, as soon as discovered, and prompt disinfection of the houses, it was checked, and from the end of July only 7 cases were notified in Chesterton during the rest of the year.

DIPHTHERIA

Diphtheria has been rather prevalent in the district. especially during the latter half of the year, most of the cases having occurred in Wolstanton and Silverdale.

66 cases were notified. The following table gives the part of the district and the months in which they occurred.

57 houses were infected.

Amongst these cases 9 deaths occurred, giving a mortality of 13.6 per 100 cases. This is a high mortality, and is chiefly due to the fact of the early symptoms of Diphtheria having been neglected. In at least 3 or 4 of these cases, medical assistance was not called in until within a few hours of death. The value of the Antitoxim treatment of Diphtheria is thereby lost, as it is successful in direct proportion to the day of the disease in which it is injected.

The death-rate per 1000 living from Diphtheria was 0.33. This is higher than the last two years in which it was 0.15 and 0.24 respectively.

28 cases—42 per cent, were removed to the Bradwell Sanatorium. Last year only 22 per cent of the cases were removed.

3 deaths occurred at the Bradwell Sanatorium among cases from outside the district.

Antitoxin continues to be supplied by the Council free of charge, for use in necessitous cases.

MEASLES

There has been no epidemic of Measles in the district during the year.

Closure of Schools

In consequence of an epidemic of Mumps at Knutton, the Knutton National Schools were closed on November 21st, for a fortnight and disinfected.

This is the only school that was closed during the year.

Constitutional Diseases

There were 38 deaths under this head, viz :-

Phthisis.—The death-rate from Phthisis was 0.48 per 1000. This is lower than the last two years, in which it was 0.8. 3 of the deaths occurred in Chell Workhouse, and of the others 6 were in Wolstanton, 2 in Silverdale, and 2 in Chesterton,

SANITARY WORK.

The district has been thoroughly and systematically inspected, and altogether over 9,000 house to house visits have been made. In addition special visits to Cowsheds, Slaughterhouses, etc., have been made, as enumerated below.

422 nuisances and defects have been discovered, as enumerated on the accompanying table.

A Fire-escape has been erected at the Cotton Factory, Cross Heath.

The Privy accommodation at this Factory is insufficient, but will be remedied as soon as the new premises now in course of construction are completed.

1 Notice to lime-wash a Bakehouse has been served and complied with.

New Privy accommodation has been provided at the Boneworks.

All the Workshops were found to be in fairly good condition

Water Supply

The Water Supply to the District by the Staffordshire Potteries Water Works Company has been good, and no complaints have been received during the year.

Scavenging

This year the Scavenging of the District has been divided into 12 portions as follows:—

This has effected a very great improvement in the efficiency with which the scavenging has been carried out during the year, and has also effected a saving in cost.

18 Privy Cesspools have been converted into Water Closets, and 45 into earthenware Pans during the year.

Sewage, &c

The Sewage Disposal of the District remains the same as last year.

The following particulars of the Sanitary work done in the District during the last 12 months have been furnished by the Surveyor-Mr. W. F. Slater:—

The Gibsons Row, Chesterton, and Hempstalls sewers have been laid, and are working satisfactorily.

The main sewers in London Road, Church Street, and Cross Street, Chesterton, which had sunk owing to mining operations have been relaid.

The Holditch Sewage Farm has received considerable attention. The County Medical Officer, and Inspector, together with the Wolstanton Sanitary Committee and Officers, met on the Farm on Oct. 5th., 1906.

The cest of distribution of the Sewage having become a serious consideration, with the sanction of the County Medical Officer and the Council, I have in course of construction, large Detritas Chambers.

These will obviate the rapid clogging of the carriers, and effect a considerable saving.

The Tanks are arranged in such a position, that emptying will involve the least possible labour and expense; and on the suggestion of Dr. Reid they are so schemed that they will answer in conjunction with bacterial tanks and filters if these become necessary. To avoid this expense if possible, the surface of the land is being improved by levelling up depressions with suitable material, permission has been given to the tenant to plough the land which cannot be used for irrigation, and a new agreement has been entered into making the treatment of sewage the primary consideration.

Negotiations re. the out-fall site for the new Basford Sewage Scheme have been completed, and as soon as the sanction of the Local Government Board is obtained, operations will be commenced.

This scheme will relieve the Wolstanton out-fall sewer and the Holditch Farm.
