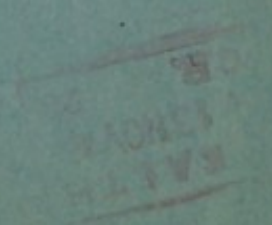

Mr. Chairman, Mrs. Flury and Gentlemen,



HEALTH SERVICES - GENERAL PROVISION

Nursing in the Home

The Woodhall Spa Nursing Association employs a certified Midwife, also employed by the Lindsey County Council under the Midwives Act, 1936, whose services are also available for the adjacent rural parishes.

Laboratory Facilities

- Bacteriological - The Public Health Laboratory, St. Edmund's Chambers, Bank Street, Lincoln.
- Chemical (when required) - Mr. W.W. Taylor, B.Sc., F.R.I.C., Public Analyst and Consulting Chemist, 1 Regent Street, Nottingham.

Ambulance Provision

(1) Accident and General

This service is provided by a voluntary Committee whose modern ambulance, garaged in the Urban District, also serves the neighbouring Parishes.

(2) Infectious Diseases

The transport of such cases is dependent on the Ambulance, facilities provided by those Authorities which accept into their Isolation Hospitals cases of infectious disease from the Urban District.

Treatment Centres and Clinics

The Education, Maternity and Child Welfare, and Tuberculosis Authority for the District is Lindsey County Council, which provides necessary Clinic facilities at Rolleston House, Bridge Street, Horncastle, where Clinics are held as under:-

Similar facilities are provided at the County Council's Clinic, Lindum Hill, Lincoln, and plans are in hand to provide School Clinic and Infant Welfare Centre services in the village of Coningsby, reasonably accessible to residents of Woodhall Spa, and not so far removed as Horncastle.

HOSPITALS

General Hospitals (Local Authority)

Lindsey County Council operates at Louth the County Infirmary, providing full General Hospital Services, which are available to the residents of the Urban District.

General Hospitals (Voluntary)

Lincoln County Hospital, Lincoln, and the Horncastle War Memorial Hospital and Dispensary supply services which may likewise be utilised by Woodhall residents.

The Alexandra Hospital, within the Urban District boundary, deals entirely with Rheumatic and Arthritic conditions and operates in close conjunction with the valuable treatment facilities of the Spa Baths.

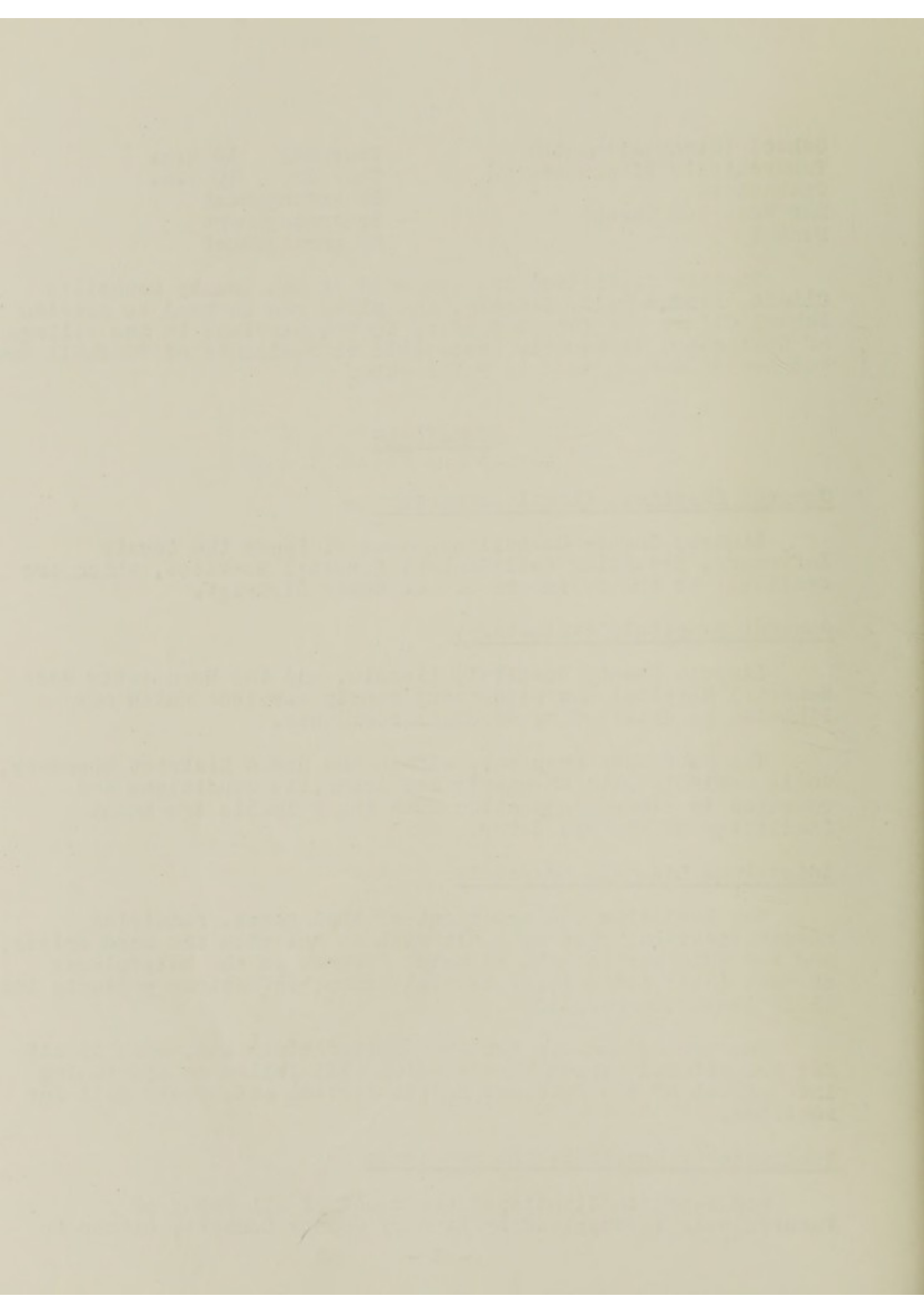
Infectious Diseases Hospitals

The isolation and treatment of such cases, requiring hospitalisation, must be dealt with as and when the need arises, and for this service the District depends on the helpfulness of such Local Authorities as will accept infectious patients into their isolation hospitals.

The arrangement is far from satisfactory and, were it not for the altered circumstances which will follow on the coming into effect of the National Health Service Act, would call for revision.

Tuberculosis Hospitals and Sanatoria

Necessary institutional treatment of all forms of Tuberculosis is supplied by Lindsey County Council, either in



its own establishments at Branston, Louth or Brumby, or by co-operation with other Authorities.

It is greatly to be regretted that lack of Nursing Staff more than actual lack of beds, sometimes necessitates periods of waiting before admission to sanatoria is possible.

Maternity Hospitals

Provided by Lindsey County Council, as Maternity and Child Welfare Authority for the Urban District.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE URBAN DISTRICT

Water Supplies

The water supply for the District is the same as in previous Annual Reports. The quality continues to be extremely satisfactory and there is no lack of an adequate supply.

Fourteen samples of the main supply were submitted for bacteriological examination during the year. All were satisfactory except one which, it is believed, was accidentally contaminated before reaching the laboratory, or at the time of sampling.

One chemical analysis of the water was performed, the result being again satisfactory.

The Council's employees engaged on water duties, were investigated to exclude enteric infection or carrier condition and were found to be clear of all risk from such a source.

The Council's scheme to extend the water mains into neighbouring parishes, which, although outwith the Urban District lie within its Statutory Area of Supply, did not materialise during the year, but it is hoped that all obligations in this direction will be met, as soon as present difficulties permit. These plans must be regarded as urgent.

Sewage Disposal

Throughout the year the Urban District sewers and sewage disposal plant, which are as described in the Medical Officer of Health's Report for 1946, have proved themselves adequate to deal with the needs of the area. It is, in fact, justifiable to infer that there is a considerable reserve capacity, when it is remembered how great was the increase in resident population during war years.

Rivers and Streams

The River Witham, bounding the Urban District on the South West, is supervised by the Lindsey County Council as Rivers Pollution Authority, and during the year there have been no complaints of nuisances arising from this source.

Public Cleansing and Refuse Collection

The Council carries this out by direct labour using a "Karrier Bantam" motor vehicle for the purpose. A weekly collection is made from all houses in the District; and from hotels and business premises twice weekly.

In addition the Council organizes the systematic collection of salvage.

The refuse tip is situated well away from dwelling houses and is carefully supervised to prevent vermin infestation.

Swimming Baths

The public open-air swimming bath in the Jubilee Park, Stixwold Road, is managed by the Council. Numerous bacteriological examinations of the water have shown it to be of a high degree of purity and estimations of residual chlorine, made at frequent intervals, have shown that the filtration and chlorinating plant is being operated correctly and to the best advantage.

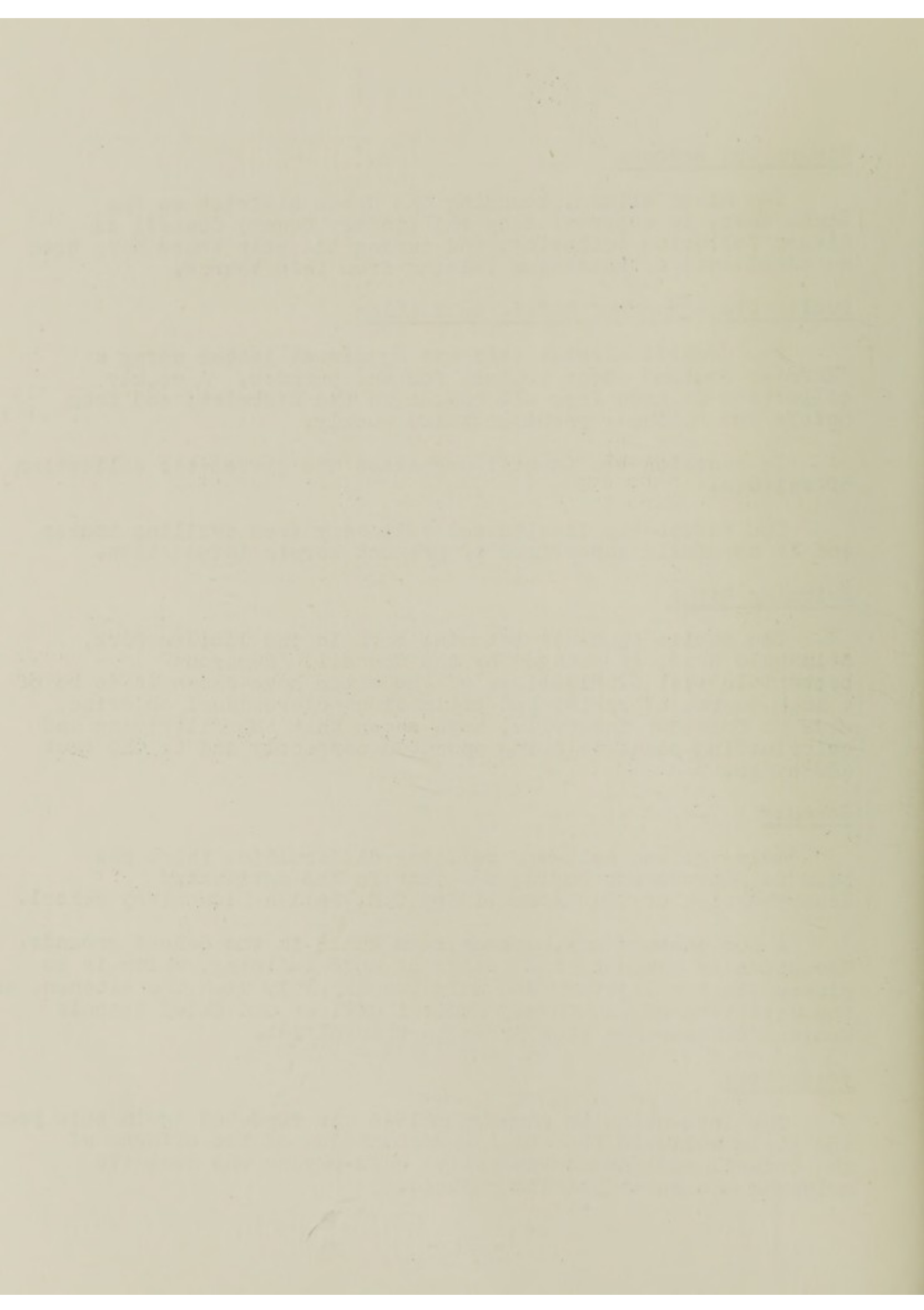
Schools

Owing to the post-war building difficulties there has been no improvement during the year in the antiquated accommodation of the Woodhall Spa C.E. Public Elementary School.

A new canteen has, however, been built in the School grounds. Exception is taken to the design of this building, which is so planned that a lavatory communicates directly with the kitchen, and the attention of the County Medical Officer and Chief Schools Medical Officer has been drawn to this defect.

Mosquitoes

The Ante-mosquito campaign of 1946 was repeated again this year, and it is believed that by the combination of the efforts of the Council and many co-operative rate-payers the mosquito nuisance was substantially reduced.



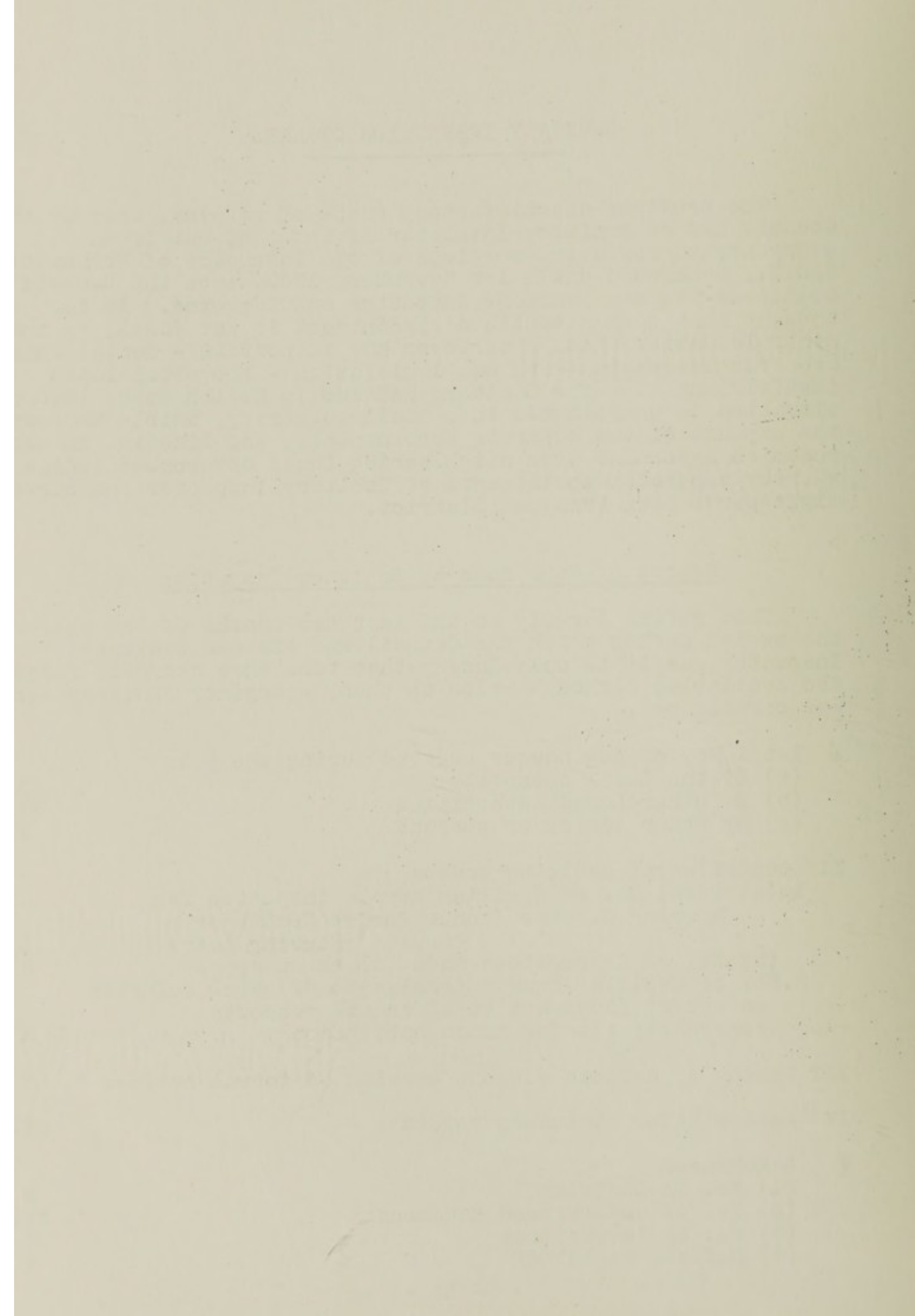
SANITARY INSPECTION OF AREA

The previous unsatisfactory state of affairs, whereby the Council had no Sanitary Inspector of its own, but in an emergency borrowed the services of the Inspector of Horncastle R.D.C., continued until 1st November, 1947, when the Council appointed its own Sanitary Inspector and Surveyor. It is thought that such a combined appointment is not ideal, as the manifold duties which a surveyor has to perform - duties which are ever increasing with new legislation - too often leave insufficient time for Sanitary and Public Health work, but the situation is unavoidable in a small authority, unable to justify the expense of two separate appointments, and likewise unable to reach an agreement with neighbouring Local Government bodies whereby separate appointments of Sanitary Inspector and Surveyor might serve more than one District.

Report of Work done by Sanitary Inspector

This refers largely to the last two months of the year the period during which the Council had its own Sanitary Inspector, as it is only during that time that accurate records are available, although prior to then, emergency sanitary work was carried out.
