Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present the Annual Report of your Medical Officer of Health for 1958.

There are minor changes in the arrangement of the statistical section, but the same range of details will be found. Basically the change is made to enable officers of the Ministry to compare one report with another from another area.

The Council are, of course, aware of the continuing high rate of deaths and have taken action to provide additional cemetery space.


Births, on the other hand, are substantially below the national level, after allowance is made for the unusual age and marital distribution of the population. Few of the births properly attributed to Woodhall Spa actually take place at home - 10 out of 28 in 1958. In view of the absence of either maternal or infant deaths, either at home or in hospital, there is little local evidence that home or hospital is to be preferred.

On the other hand, when large figures are considered, it has been estimated that hospital infections are very much commoner and harder to treat than those arising at home.

The causes of death are predominantly those degenerative processes which begin early in adult life and continue unsuspected until their encroachment on some vital function is noticed. There is an increasing belief that a high standard of nutrition predisposes to certain arterial diseases. Cancer in its various forms accounts for a substantial number of deaths but, it should be noted, only a comparatively short loss of life-expectancy for many of its victims had already reached old age.

Preventive measures against infectious diseases have been satisfactorily maintained, except for those respiratory infections, such as influenza and the streptococcal infections which produce only a poor immunity and spread rapidly among school children and their families.

Vaccination and Immunization

Priority was given throughout 1958 to vaccinating as many eligible children as supplies of vaccine allowed, and only towards the end of the year, in the interim between the substantial completion of second doses and the start on third doses, was there time to organize an intensive programme to bring up to date diphtheria immunization in schools. During the course of this it was found that a number of children are now reaching school age who were initially protected against diphtheria and whooping cough and in some cases also tetanus, by means of combined vaccine, whilst parents had been issued with forms of consent for diphtheria injections only. In cases where parents were present, no difficulty arose, but in other cases, the lack of written consent deprived the children of the wider protection they should have had.

Within Woodhall Spa, there was a substantial drop in the number of children immunized, compared with the previous years, despite an increase in births. In the absence of other explanation, the preoccupation of doctors with poliomyelitis injections and the confusing effect upon parents of the intense propaganda about polio were the chief causes. Despite this however, it is surprising to find that smallpox vaccination showed an increased demand, especially amongst older persons.

This table also gives some idea of the range of materials provided through the County Health Department and the way in which provision is made for parents wishes to over-ride expediency.

It is unfortunate that no individual figures for districts are available regarding poliomyelitis vaccination.

Tuberculosis Prevention

The prevention vaccination of 13 year old children attending local schools continued uneventfully. During the year the use of Danish liquid vaccine was abandoned in favour of British freeze-dried vaccine which can be stored and used when required.

Food Poisoning

Despite the large catering interest, or perhaps because of the large size of the individual hotels, no case of food poisoning has been notified. Obviously, the major hotels would suffer greatly if any imputation were brought against them, and their standards are accordingly high.

National Health Service

No changes in service of either General Practitioners, Hospitals or the County Council have been made.

There is a tendency towards the use of Lincoln rather than Horncastle ophthalmic clinic.

Water Supply

This has remained satisfactory and, naturally, after such a wet summer, adequate. The large reservoir was, at the end of the year filled to capacity.

Sewage Disposal

During the year it was found that the incorporation of humus tankage had caused the fall from the two old filters to become inadequate and for effluent to stand on the filter base to a level that obstructed the inflow of air. Arrangements were made for the replacement of the pipes by open channel to allow freer flow and easier maintenance. In connection with this, it was the opinion of the consulting engineers that the medium in the two small beds was crumbling. Accordingly, the Council will be advised to consider the necessary replacement as it becomes due.

Refuse Collection

This continues as a wekkly service and pressure was brought to bear in one case where despite repeated representations, an open refuse pit was in use adjacent to important catering premises. Dustbins have now been provided.

Disposal continues to be by controlled dry tipping.

The Swimming Pool.

Although at the time of writing, the exceptional summer of 1958 has caused all the Park facilities to work to the utmost limit of their capacity, there was no difficulty in maintaining a reasonable satisfactory condition in the pool.

Food and Drugs Act, 1955

No contraventions were noted during the year.

Insofar as unsound food is concerned, this has been a trivial matter and has involved a negligible amount of your Inspectors time.

It would be desirable to make arrangements for period sampling of ice-cream. The principal difficulty has been the necessity of keeping the sample frozen during transit to the public health laboratory at Lincoln. Insulated containers containing solid carbon dioxide might be the answer, but efficient sampling at reasonable cost would call for sampling at all, or most retailers during a morning, followed by a direct journey to the laboratory to ensure there was no deterioration in sample quality between sampling and reaching the laboratory.

No animals are slaughtered in the district and meat inspection therefore revolves upon the surrounding districts.

The amount of other food condemned was even smaller than in previous years, amounting only to 6 lbs. of corned beef and 18 lbs. of wet fish.

Housing

The only new houses built during the year were two for private owners, and the list of applications for Council Houses is practically a dead letter.

Improvement and conversion grants made little progress and it is evident that the perish of financial stringency has reduced the circulating money for the private share of such projects.

The two families, whose overcrowded state has been reported previously, remained unrelieved.

Temporary Dwellings

The existing caravan site was not fully occupied during the year, as the R.A.F. residential station was then below strength. The Council's own site adjacent to Jubilee Park was available for Caravan Club Members and others bringing their own vans to enjoy the amenities of the Spa.
