To The Chairman and Members of The Urban District Council of Woodhall Spa.

Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present my annual report for 1963.

This year the emphasis in public health has been the enforcement of 100% meat inspection and stamping with the mark of an individually recognisable inspector. This has caused no problem to this Council, since all meat is brought into the district and the question is merely that of observing the presence of a recognisable stamp mark.

Similarly, there is only a minor task in dealing with other foodstuffs. Contamination is largely prevented nowadays by pre-packing and more trouble is caused by excess wrapping then insufficient. The growing trend to home-warming and cooking by other than open fires reduces the facility of burning all forms of refuse, which there-upon goes into the dustbin without any absorptive ashes and by the end of a week can be a pretty putrid mess. The importance of maintaining a weekly collection, especially in Summer, needs an emphasis.

The Offices, Shops and Railway Fremises Act will come into effect in 1964 with the intention of providing for office and similar workers, similar protection to that given by the Factories Acts for factory workers. The occupiers of all the types of premises specified are required to register them with the authority which thereafter will have to satisfy themselves upon the size, lighting, heating, and sanitary facilities, together with provision of suitable seats where the work can be done sitting down: the emphasis being upon the suitability of the seats. The implementation of this act may contribute quite considerably to the work of your Public Health Inspector.

Street Lighting rarely calls for comment, but as the Council are aware, it is a hardy perennial, although it does not flourish when too overgrown by trees. This is the problem - autumn means falling leaves and damp pavements on which the elderly with any tendency to shuffling gait are particularly liable to falls. Yet it is the trees that mark Woodhall apart as a sheltered spot in a wind-swept County and very serious thought would be required before any serious interference with the trees could be allowed. Nevertheless, in the interests of safety, the Councils' investigations into methods of improving street lighting must be warmly welcomed. In the same way the improvement of streetsurfaces, conducive to the safety particularly of the elderly, may be regarded as an extension of Fublic Health works.

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The maintenance and improvement of the Park also has a bearing on health obviously so far the swimmers and sunbathers, but not necessarily less for those who come just for a 'day out' to break the monotony of their lives, and the young mothers who are glad to have a place to take the toddlers where they can see children of other families on neutral ground and so begin the first social approaches.

Control of the Councils Water Undertaking was taken over by the newly formed East Lincolnshire Water Board in April, 1964, after a protracted struggle. It is naive to suppose that a new major authority will deal with all its functions, especially minor ones, to everybody's satisfaction immediately.

I cannot conclude these introductary remarks without, as usual axknowledging with gratitude the help of the Members, Officers and Staff of the Council.

Last year I commented upon the panic rise in Smallpox Vaccinations. This year I must explain the reasons underlying the very low incidence of primary vaccinations.

This is entirely intentional: it has been shown recently that the risk of severe reaction to vaccination is considerably less in the second year of life, and in all cases where early vaccination is not essential, routine vaccination is being delayed.

It is to be expected that the 1964 figures will show a return to normal.

The National Health Service

The Urban District is well served by General Fractitioners but public transport to the Hospitals is very poor - the railway to Boston has been closed, there is neither bus nor train to Louth and the train service to Lincoln appears threatened. This throws an additional burden on the Ambulance Service which is called upon additionally to bring a considerable number of rheumatic patients to the Spa for treatment.

National Assistance Act 1948 Section 47

No action was taken under this Section. In my experience in other districts, it is very rarely that this section is of value, although in slum districts of large urban areas it might be used.

Water Supply

The only criticism I have of the supply is that which is general throughout the county - deficient fluoride content.

Although the County Council has requested the Water Board to remedy this, and the Woodhall supply is a self-contained entity to which a suitable plant could be fitted, it is unlikely that action will be taken until after the larger supplies have been dealt with. This is the natural order of priorities. Had the Council still been in control of the Water Undertaking I have little doubt that they would have seen their decisions promptly implemented.

Sewerage and Sewage Disposal

There has been no significant change.

Refuse Collection and Disposal

The method of weekly emptying of dustbins is almost universal and is amenable to critisism only on the amount of dust when bins are emptied into the wagon and the double walk to return the bin. Faper sacks have been tried with some success, particular, in new housing estates where no solid fuel heating is used, and hence there is no problem of hot ash, but instead, a putrid collection of vegetable and animal remains with an insect population depending on the fit of the bin lid. Fly breeding is not a problem so long as weekly collection is maintained.

The Swimming Pool

The Summer of 1963 was not a very propitious one and the new equipment associated with the enlarged pool was never put really to the test. Comparator estimation of chlorine residue was satisfactory.
