The Highways, Sewerage and Public Health Committees deal with the majority of Public Health Matters although a separate Parks and Playing Fields Committee deal with swimming baths.

All members of the Council sit on all Committees.

Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present my annual report for 1967.

1967 has been a year without incident in the Spa; no epidemic raged; no untoward lapses in standards of public health were detected and, indeed, one would be tempted to wonder why, indeed, a public health inspector and a medical officer of health, albeit part-time officers, are still required.

The standardized death rate hit a new low at 6.85 which is well below the national figure of 11.2. The mean age at death was 73.7 for males and 77.2 for females. These figures would have been fractionally higher but for the deaths of two children and one young woman. The proportion of the population all over the country who live their three score years and ten has greatly increased in recent decades but there has been much less progress in prolonging life beyond its natural span, especially if by "life" we mean more "full life" rather than "medicated survival".

Whilst writing, a programme of wardened dwellings for the elderly is nearing completion, to complement the County Councils Hostel and the various private homes. The importance of these places is shown (perhaps regrettably) by the distribution of deaths between private houses and institutions. Institutional deaths equal or exceed those in private homes. The new dwellings will be occupied by those elderly folk who are less frail than those for whom a hostel or nursing home would be appropriate but who feel that they need a small dwelling with modern facilities and a neighbour(warden) on whom they can rely in time of need.

Private housing continues steadily and in variety so that much of the Spa retains its superior appearance on which its prosperity must, to a degree, depend. Whilst the districts concerned vary greatly in character it may be of interest to record the rate of housebuilding in the districts which I serve.

A replacement time is calculated as being that period of time required, at the 1967 rate of building, to double the number of dwellings in the district.

A little thought will soon show the local factors responsible for the vast variation. Welton is accommodating a substantial number of Lincoln overspill; Woodhall attracts the retired and some of the well-to-do who can afford to conduct their business from a distance, whilst Horncastle R.D. includes growth points at Wragby and Tattershall/Coningsby, with employment in those parishes. The function of Horncastle itself is traditional - that of the Market town for the district and it is unlikely that more people will be required for this service. Consequently, housebuilding is related more nearly to local internal need.

This year some additional information regarding child health in the district has been provided by courtesy of the County Medical Officer of Health. It will be borne in mind that Woodhall Spa is unusual in having no senior school and most of the information relating to children over the age of 11 is thus buried in the statistics for Horncastle Urban and Rural Districts.

It will be seen that the number of smallpox vaccinations recorded is grossly unsatisfactory whilst the lesser discrepancies between the oral poliomyelitis vaccinations and the infections against Diphtheria, Pertussis and Tetanus suggest the obvious - that the spoonful of sugar is more popular then the needle and that fear rather than common sense is what motivates the mothers. This remark will be unpopular but is important because it is in this air of indecision that Big Brother and the faceless "they" can gain power.

Whilst welcoming, this year the chance to include more information regarding the health of children, it is with bitter regret that I have now to state that this information will not, in future, be made available.

With the catachysmic changes to be brought about by Seebohm, the Green Paper, and the Royal Commission on Local Government, it may well be that soon there will be no District Councils to receive Annual Reports of Medical Officers, nor Medical Officers to write them.

The variety of causes of these 'premature' deaths suggests that little organised 'prevention' can occur.

INFECTIOUS DISEASES

Notifications from Woodhall Spa comprised only 16 cases of Measles and 1 case of whooping cough during the year.

During the past six years there have been notifications of 65 cases of measles whilst, during the same period 218 children have been born. This implies that either there is a substantial reservoir of susceptible children or that many have already had sub-clinical measles. Since to ascertain the true position would be costly in resources and have mainly an academic interest, I would recommend that all children who are not known to have had definite measles should be regarded as susceptible and given vaccination under the recently announced scheme.

All family doctors and the County Councils doctors are eligible to take part in the scheme and the first batches of consent-slips and vaccine are to hand (May 68).

Unfortunately, measles is endemic at present so that if children are vaccinated, some may already be incubating natural measles. If vaccination takes place within a day or two contracting natural measles, some protection may occur, but if given too late it will seem to the uninformed that the vaccination caused the measles. At the moment this is a risk worth taking for nothing but good can result to the child. It is still not known with certainty whether one injection of live vaccine protects for life or whether when natural measles no longer provides "boosters," it may at some time later be desirable to give further doses.

The National Health Service

No changes have occured in the National Health Service during the year.

Water Supply

The water supply of Woodhall Spa is under the control of the East Lincolnshire Water Board. No complaints have reached me regarding either quantity or quality of the water supplied.

No recent analyses in respect of fluoride is available but there is no reason to hope for improvement. The Spa is supplied from a local upland surface supply and is substantially independent of other districts, it is thus theoretically possible for fluoride correction to be applied to this source without reference to local politics.

Out of 708 dwelling houses, 706 had a direct supply into the dwelling.

Sewerage and Sewage Disposal

The nature of the subsoil (running sand is widespread) predisposes to the influx of soil water, so that the volume of of sewage normally exceeds the domestic water consumption by a considerable margin. In wet weather thus becomes excessive. The lack of natural fall results in some sewers being particularly deep and inaccessible and pumping by ejector stations is necessary. Much of the equipment has been in service for many years and the possibility of breakdown is ever present, whilst financial restrictions limit the provision of standby equipment.

These factors are not new but need periodic mention.

Refuse Collection and Disposal

This is by dust-bin, skip and side-loading vehicle to a reasonably controlled tip beside the sewage works.

In common with the Councils of small districts, improvements were considered early this year and, whilst it was agreed that there was room for improvement, this was barred by financial stringency.

Common Lodging Houses

This item is required by the Ministry. It may suffice to say that no such institution has ever, to my knowledge, existed in Woodhall Spa.

Food and Drugs Act, 1955

(a) Milk Supplies - Brucella Abortus

This is dealt with mainly at County level. I am always informed of positive results. No action was necessary in respect of Woodhall Spa.

(b) Liquid Egg (Pasteurization) Regulations 1963

No pasteurization plant operates in the area.
