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To The Chairman and Members of The Urban District Council of Woodhall Spa.

Mr. Chairman, Mrs. Farmery and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present my annual report for 1968.

Your programme of bungalows for the elderly, with Warden, came into operation and, as elsewhere in the country, it promptly proclaimed its success by attracting many more good applicants than could be accommodated. I am glad to hear that further bungalows are envisaged for this is one of the most practical ways of helping the maximum number within the availability of money. It was stated at the Health Congress at Eastbourne, 1969 that the cost of maintaining 2% of the elderly in part III accommodation (such as Eagle Lodge) was equal to all the welfare services provided for the other 98%. Whilst one accepts that those in Part III are those in greatest need and that many of those otherwise accommodated are in little need of welfare services and can thus properly be the subject of economies, such a disparity in costs is fantastic.

The figures were quoted for Eastbourne, which is a favourite place for "retiring immigrants", whose numbers are overwhelming the facilities - in fact, the situation which could, possibly, develop in Woodhall Spa. The figures go a long way to explain the lack of expansion of Part III accommodation and the sharp change of emphasis toward wardened bungalows, the necessarily high economic rents being largely or wholly met by national contributions through supplementary pensions. Hitherto, there has been a feeling that supplementary pensions recked of charity, whereas the cost of administration renders them no more a charity than winnings on the football pool! To combat the increased cost of building it would be interesting to consider the conversion of some of the existing large buildings in the Spa. Bungalows are, of course ideal, having no stairs and no lifts to complicate life for the residents, but there might prove to be a chance of producing reasonably suitable dwellings at a reasonable cost, provided always that Central Government would play ball, because a small authority can only act as a sort of agency for national expenditure in such matters.

Looking at the causes of death of the under 65's - serious because of the lost earning power for the family and community - two, due to lung cancer might be regarded as potentially avoidable - two, due to coronary thrombosis, possibly preventable, whilst the remaining three are not, apparently, susceptible of preventive action. King Edward VII made a famous aphorism "If preventable, why not prevented?" The answers are complex. The middle aged smoke, worry and alternatively sit and hustle less because of immediate need but more because that is the way life has made them.

Probably the years before school age do more to predispose a man to worry, to smoke, and so on, than all the rest of his life. How then can we hope to prevent cancer caused by smoking or heart disease produced by worry? Whilst we have the intelligence to know the tools to prevent these diseases we have not yet the emotional motivation to employ them. This is true also of cancer of the neck of the womb - supremely amenable to early diagnosis and treatment - but the women just will not attend for examination, and so they die!

Since my last remarks on Big Brother and the faceless "they", the report of the Maud Commission has been published and received with universal disapproval. That it will be implemented despite all opposition, I have no doubt; just as Seebohm is being implemented, subtly, and without full public discussion. Only the Ministers Green Paper on the Health Services has been crushed by the weight of opinion. Still, in the withdrawal of the Green Paper, there is some little evidence that democracy for which so many of my generation thought they fought and died, has not died - yet.

#### INFECTIOUS DISEASES

A total of 6 notifications of measles comprise the total of notified infectious diseases during the year.

Immunization against measles was duly provided when authority was received but, in the absence of statistics, I am left with the feeling that there is a discrepancy between the number of children born and the number notified as having had measles. This has existed for years, but I am not aware of any vast campaign to immunize the remainder.

I doubt whether anyone now has a complete picture of the pattern of natural and induced immunity to the disease in Woodhall Spa.

## The National Health Service

No changes have occured in the National Health Service during the year.

## Water Supply

The water supply of Woodhall Spa is under the control of the East Lincolnshire Water Board. No complaints have reached me regarding the quantity or quality of the water supplied.

The Department is now pressing Health Authorities to carry out a policy of fluoride correction on public water supplies.

After 11 years study, the benefits have been clearly shown whilst adverse effects have not. Until it is implemented I can only continue to advocate "tea for toddlers" as a partial source of the fluoride they need.

Out of 739 dwelling houses, 737 had a direct supply into the dwelling.

#### Sewerage and Sewage Disposal

Short of a complete relaying of almost all the sewers with a modern leak proof system, there is no means available by which recurrent crises and excessive pumping costs can be averted. Such relaying would rank as maintenance and attract no grant. It is utterly beyond the resources of this authority and the policy of make do and mend will last as long as the authority does.

These factors are not new but need periodic mention.

## Refuse Collection and Disposal

No change has been made to the collection system which is now somewhat overloaded. The number of gravel paths and distance from bin to kerbside slows the collection and makes it appear unfavourable compared with more compact districts.

The tip is rapidly filling up and additional land must be acquired. No one ever wants refuse on their land and difficulty is usually to be expected in acquisition of land for this use. Where machinery is available to remove soil to a suitable depth and subsequently replace it in the proper layers, it is possible to actually benefit low-lying land by raising it on a layer of refuse.

#### Common Lodging Houses

This item is required by the Department. It may suffice to say that no such institution has ever, to my knowledge, existed in Woodhall Spa.
