TO THE MEMBERS OF THE PUBLIC HEALTH AND MATERNITY AND CHILD WELFARE COMMITTEE.

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I beg to present my Annual Report for the Year 1941.

The health of the community has been well maintained during the year, and this statement is confirmed by the low mortality rates and the small number of infectious diseases.

Compared with the previous year the birth rate remains about the same, the general death rate is less, and the infantile mortality rate is remarkably low.

The number of cases of infectious diseases was very small, with the exception of Whooping, Cough which assumed epidemic form.

Unfortunately there is no provision for the hospital treatment of severe cases of Measles and Whooping Cough. Hospital treatment of these cases is very necessary where the home conditions are overcrowded and unsatisfactory.

The situation with regard to housing conditions remains difficult.

I again express my appreciation to all Members of the Staff of the Public Health Department for the efficient manner in which they have carried out their duties.

SECTION E.

INSPECTION AND SUPERVISION OF FOOD.

Particular attention has been paid to this subject, and every possible consideration is given to the salvage of foodstuffs without detriment to the consumers. Whenever possible, condemned foodstuffs are allocated for animal feeding.

Milk Supply.

The number of Milk Producers in the Borough is 26, and the number of Purveyors on the Register is 59. On 7 farms within the Borough Accredited Milk is produced under licence from the County Council. Two Purveyors are licenced to retail Accredited Milk, 2 Pasteurised Milk and 1 Tuberculin Tested Milk.

During the year 2 samples of Accredited Milk, 3 samples of Pasteurised Milk, and 6 samples of Tuberculin Tested Milk were submitted to the Bacteriologist for examination and all proved satisfactory and to comply with the prescribed conditions. One hundred and fortyeight samples of Ordinary Milk were examined and 61 proved satisfactory. Careful attention is given to the production and distribution of Milk, and during the year 246 visits were made to dairies and cowsheds. Three samples of Milk upon examination were found to contain Tubercle Bacilli and the Divisional Veterinary Officer of the Minister of Agriculture and Fisheries was immediately notified so that herds in question could be examined and the cows affected isolated and slaughtered.

Meat and Other Foods.

Warehouses, shops, stalls and vehicles have been frequently inspected and generally speaking the various Acts and Regulations have been well complied with. Details of meat inspection, foodstuffs condemned, etc., are dealt with in the Report of the Chief Sanitary Inspector.

Small number of cases of Diphtheria and Scarlet Fever.

Small number of cases of Cerebro-Spinal Meningitis. Whooping Cough present in Epidemic Form.

Diphtheria.

There were eight notifications of this disease. None of the cases had been immunised. All the cases were removed to Hospital and two cases proved fatal after admission.

Diphtheria Immunisation.

The percentage of children immunised under 5 years-14.00%.

The percentage of children immunised between 5-15 years-67.68%.

Scarlet Fever.

The number of notifications of cases of Scarlet Fever was twenty-two—six more than in the previous year. Sixteen cases were removed to Hospital and six cases were isolated at home.

There were no deaths from this disease.

Typhoid and Paratyphoid Fever.

There were no cases of Typhoid or Paratyphoid Fever.

Erysipelas.

There were eleven cases of Erysipelas notified and no deaths from this disease.

Measles and Whooping Cough.

There were twenty-two cases of Measles notified none of the cases proved fatal.

Cerebro-Spinal Fever.

There were six cases of Cerebro-Spinal Fever notified—none of the cases proved fatal.

Ophthalmia Neonatorum.

No case occurred.

Puerperal Pyrexia.

There was one case of Puerperal Pyrexia notified.

Considerable difficulty was experienced in getting work done owing to lack of materials, shortage of labour, etc., thus involving much additional work and visits. The severe frost at the beginning of the year rendered many sanitary fittings defective.

VERMINOUS PREMISES.

Owing to the presence of vermin (bugs, fleas, etc.) 18 houses were disinfested by this Department. The number of Council houses found infested with bugs was 2, other houses 16.

The disinfestation methods employed are the same as outlined in the previous annual report.

INSPECTION OF MEAT AND OTHER FOODS.

During the year 631 visits were paid and the carcases and organs of all animals slaughtered were carefully examined prior to release for sale. The number of animals killed was 26,053, as compared with 16,999 for the previous year, made up as follows : —
