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MATERNITY AND CHILD WELFARE.

Notification of Births: - Live births 561, Stillbirths 13 - Total 574. Health Visiting: - Two full-time Health Visitors are employed by the Council.

Visits paid during the year :-

To Expectant Mothers - First visit 289. Total Visits 319.

To Children under 1 year - First visit 575. Total visits 2232. To Children 1 to 5 years - Total visits 5656.

Infant Welfare Centre: - Provided and maintained by the Council - 1.

Children under 5 years who first attended the Centre during the year, and were under one year of age 413 - over one year of age 94.

Total number of children under 5 years who attended the Centre during the year, and were under one year 361 - over one year 380.

Clinics are held twice weekly . Monday and Wednesday 2 . 5 p.m.

Health Visitors attend daily 9 - 10 a.m., for minor ailments.

The Clinic is open daily for the sale of dried milk, and the distribution of Cod Liver Oil, Fruit Juice and Clothing Coupons for Expectant Mothers.

Orthoresdic Treatment: Children under 5 years,

Children with minor deformities are referred to the Clinic of the Worksop and District Cripples Guild.

The Surgeon attends one day in each month, and Nurses on two days each week.

Number of cases referred to the Clinic in the year ~ 13. Number of old cases attending for treatment ~ 18.

Three children were admitted to Harlow Wood Hospital during the year. The Maintenance charges amounting to £288, 14, 9d, were paid by the Maternity and Child Welfare Committee.

Ante-Natal Centre - Provided and maintained by the Council - Lo

Total number of women who attended the Clinic in the year ~ 319, which was 55,5% of the total number of births (live and still).

Provision of Hospital Beds for Maternity cases.

Under agreement with the County Council, cases are admitted to Kilton Hill County Hospital. 57 Cases were admitted in the year. Maternity Outfits are provided by the Council. Sold at cost price or provided free, Number supplied in the year 29.

Home Helps were provided in 7 cases.

Dental Treatment (Mothers).

10 Expectant Mothers attending the Ante-Natal Clinic received Dental treatment. In 8 of these cases, new Dentures were provided.

Child Life Protection.

Number of persons who were receiving children for reward - 5. Number of children at the end of the year - 5. Number of children who died in the year - 0. Number of Child Protection Visitors (Health Visitors) - 1.

INFECTIOUS DISEASE CONTROL:

In the year the total number of notifications received was 274, as compared with 1,002 in 1941 (see table).

The fall in number of notifications was mainly due to the decline of the epidemics of Measles and Whooping Cough, which prevailed in 1941.

During the year, no (civil) case of Diphtheria was notified until the last week in December, when 4 cases occurred in one family, and one contact from this source.

All notified cases of Diphtheria and Scarlet Fever were treated in Hospital except 1 Scarlet Fever.

DIPHTHERIA PROPHYLAXIS.

Immunisation of children was continued throughout the year.

At the end of 1941 the percentage of the child population immunised in the district was: aged 1 ~ 5 years 21.5%. 5 ~ 15 years 70.8%.

During the year special efforts were made to secure the immunisation of children under 5 years, and the new entrants to Infant Depts. of the Elementary Schools, who had not received treatment before reaching 5 years of age.

In the latter age group, much help and willing co-operation was given by Head Teachers of Infant Schools, with the result that 627 of these children, the majority of whom were in the first year of school life, were immunised.

In the age group 1 - 5 years, good results have been obtained, from the personal appeal to parents, made by our two Health Visitors, in the course of their ordinary visits to the homes of all notified births, and during the visits of parents to the Child Welfare, and Ante-Natal Clinics.

At the end of 1942, the estimated percentage of the child population immunised was:- aged 1-5 years 58.8%. 5 ~ 15 years 89.8%. Number immunised in 1942:- aged 1 - 5 yrs 771; aged 5 - 15 yrs 627. Total 1.398.

SCABIES ORDER 1941.

Arrangements were made early in the year for carrying out this work. With the consent of the County Medical Officer, the pray room in the First Aid Post, housed in the County Council School Clinic was adapted for the treatment of Scabies. A full sized bath was installed for bathing children and adults.

The treatment was carried out by a trained Ambulance Officer, with nursing and hospital experience, who works in close co-operation with local Doctors, the County Council School Medical Officer and School Nurses. The Officer visits infected homes, in search of contacts, and makes arrangements for special evening sessions for parents, and adults who are unable to attend the ordinary day-time sessions.

Most of the infected bedding, and articles of clothing, were dealt with in the homes, under the supervision of the Scables Officer. To assist the householders in this extra washing, an additional ration of soap was granted for infected families.

Cases of mixed infection requiring hospital treatment, were admitted to Kilton Hill County Hospital. Number of cases notifies during the year ~ 184. Number of individuals cleansed under the Council's avrangements during the year ~ 184.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

The Severage system and Town Water supply continued to function, as in previous war years.

No extensions or improvements have been made. Both Services are under the supervision of the Borough Engineer.

Samples of Water taken during the year, were reported to be satisfactory, Chemically and Bacteriologically.


The usual inspections of the district have been carried out, so far as the depleted Staff was able to cover the ground.
