While our Health Visiting Staff and Clinic accommodation remain the same, the work continues to increase, specially with regard to the amount of work and time nvolved in the ever increasing amount of Infant Foods. itamins, etc., disposed of in the year, the work in onnection with the Ante-Natal Clinic and expectant mothers, he provision of Maternity Outfits and arrangements for ome Helps; to which has been added new duties relating to he distribution of Dockets for extra sheets for confinements, nd the distribution of rubber tests for infants bottles, lso new duties in connection with the care of Premature hildren.

More advantage is being taken of the welfare facilities rovided both for expectant mothers and for mothers on chalf of the health of their children.

The general health condition of the children attending he Child Welfare Clinic is very satisfactory, except in a 'ew isolated cases: I have seen no incidence of malnutrition nd very few cases of deficiency diseases, e.g. Rickets.

Under agreement with the County Council, Maternity ases are admitted to the County General Hospital, on ecommendation of the Medical Officer of Health. Emergency ases are admitted on the request of local practitioners.

The supply of water from the Council's boreholes at Sunnyside is of uniform good quality, and sufficient in quantity for present needs in the area of the piped supply.

98% of the inhabited houses in the district are supplied from the public water mains, the remaining houses are supplied from private water works, or from deep wells.

RAT and MOUSE DESTRUCTION - INFESTATION ORDER, 1943.

During the year your rat catcher's operations included the investigation and dealing with complaints of minor infestations. The banks of the river Ryton, and streams, sowers, sewage disposal works and lands, tips, allotments, etc. have all received attention and have produced good results in some sections. His activities have proved most beneficial to the Borough and throughout his 790 visits he has destroyed and collected 2060 rats and 852 mice.
