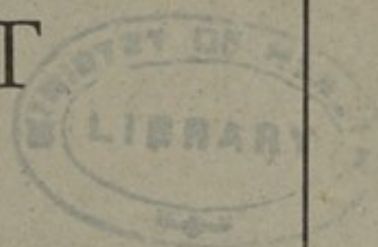

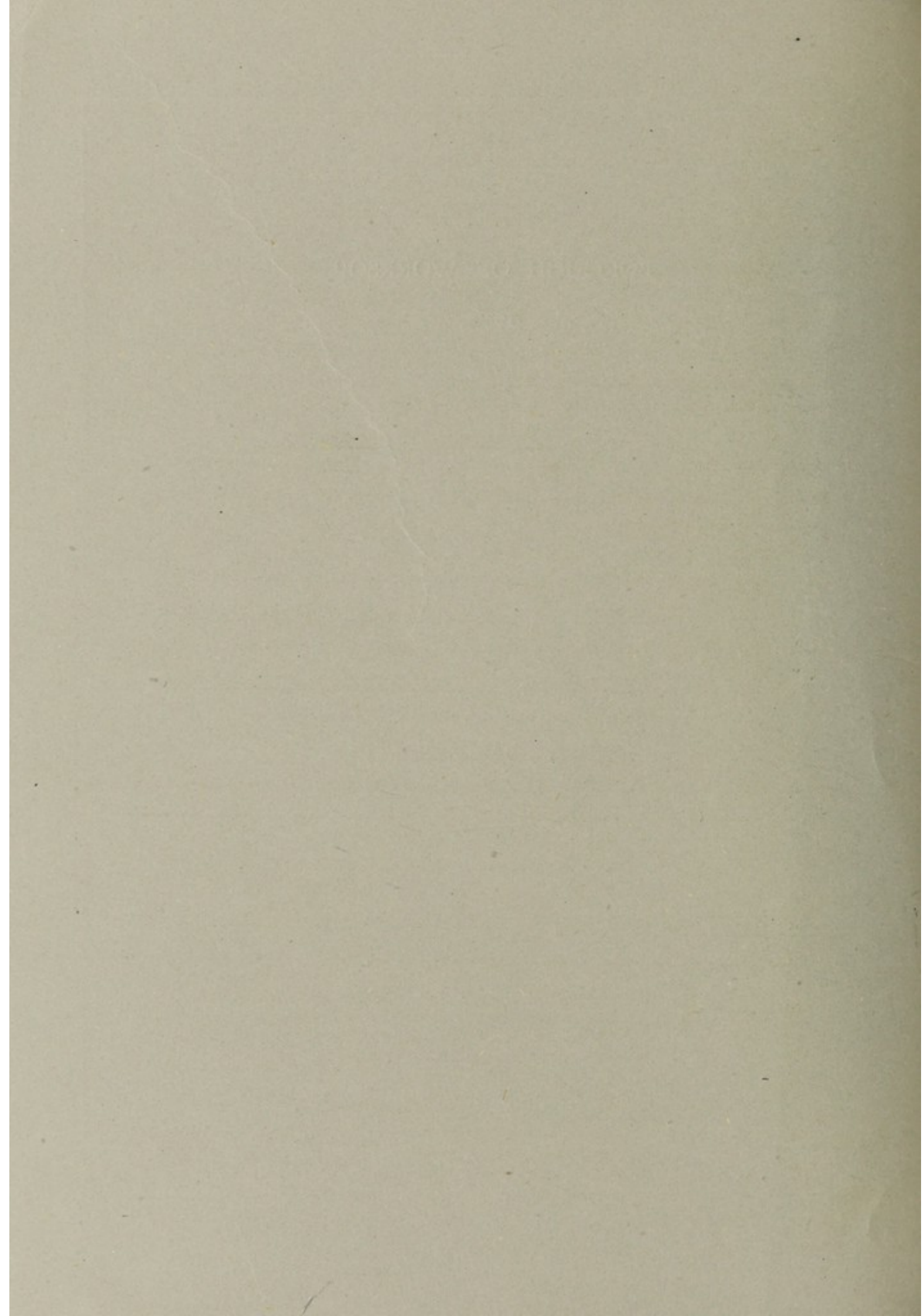

Under a scheme adopted in 1944, our district has the part-time service of a Welfare Officer of the County Council Almshouse Service, who co-operates with the Health Visitors and with the workers of voluntary moral welfare organisations.

Immunisation has been carried out throughout the year, monthly clinics are held for schoolchildren and children under 5 years.

Head Teachers of Junior Schools have co-operated by sending lists of entrants who have not been immunised.

Birthday postcards, with circular, are sent to the children on their first birthday, urging parents to give their children the advantage of immunisation before entering school.

**Scabies Treatment.**

The incidence of this complaint shows a reduction on the figures for 1945.

Cases were notified from 362 houses in which, on investigation, 605 persons were found to be infected, and received treatment.

320 Home Visits were made.

Excellent and convenient premises for treatment are available in the County Council School Clinic, with the kind permission of the County Medical Officer.

The work is carried on in close co-operation between the County Council

School Medical Officer and School Nurses, and the Local Officer appointed to carry out the treatment.

The same facilities are available for children under 5 years. Cases of infection, discovered by Health Visitors in their homes are referred to the Clinic for treatment.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

Towards the end of 1945 two housing estates (one Corporation, one private) were laid out ready for house building.

Mr. C.O. Allsopp, Borough Engineer has supplied the following details of the Housing position on the 31st December 1946:-

Local Authority Schemes in Progress.

80 three-bedroom type traditional houses in Shrewsbury Road and Pelham Street, Manton; of which 16 are occupied.

70 three-bedroom type traditional houses in Netherton Road and Pelham Street, Manton.

70 Tarran MarkIV two-bedroom prefabricated bungalows in Manton all of which are occupied.

28 two-bedroom bungalows for aged persons in Bracebridge.

28 two-bedroom bungalows for aged persons in Manton.

28 families took possession of hutments in two vacated military camps, Sparken Hill, in June 1946, and every effort was made for their comfort.

#### Private Enterprise.

41 houses and 1 bungalow were built in the Borough by private enterprise during the year.

No extensions to sewers were made during the year 1946.

#### Water Supply.

The supply of water from the Council's boreholes at Sunnyside is of the uniform good quality, and sufficient in quantity for present needs in the area of the pipe supply.

98% of the inhabited houses in the district are supplied from the public water mains, the remaining houses are supplied from private water works, or from deep wells.

During the year, 11 samples of water were submitted for Bacteriological examination and 2 for Chemical analysis. All proved satisfactory.

The total quantity of refuse and salvage collected (including 1,701 tons 6 cwt. of cesspool liquid and wet refuse) for the year ended 31st March 1947, was 11,165 tons 10 cwt.

Prior to the transfer of the Clumber Park Estate to the National Trust, on the 24th June, 1946, The London & Fort George Land Company Limited, had always undertaken the collection of refuse etc. from the houses and other premises on the Estate, and they stated that after the above date they would not be in a position to continue such service.

Arrangements were made to extend the services of the Corporation's Cleansing Department to 53 premises situate in Clumber Park within the area of the Borough as

from the 25th June 1946.

During each period of collection 28 miles would be covered by the Department's transport.

A letter of thanks was sent to the London & Fort George Land Company Limited, for their kind offices in undertaking independently of the Council for so many years, the cleansing of premises within the Clumber Estate, and that the Council place on record their appreciation of this service.

Further extensions carried out during the year, rendered Cleansing Services to 70, M.O.W. Temporary Bungalows, 50, New permanent houses, 28, Squatters Huts at Sparken House Camp, and 8 other premises.

RAT AND MOUSE DESTRUCTION - INFESTATION ORDER, 1943.

During the year your rat catcher's operations included the investigation and dealing with complaints of minor infestations. The banks of the River Ryton, and streams, sewers, sewage disposal works and lands, tips, allotments, etc. have all received attention and have produced good results in some sections. His activities have proved most beneficial to the Borough and throughout his 691 visits he has destroyed and collected 1,748 rats and 420 mice.

FACTORIES ACT, 1937.

Notices in pursuance of Section 9 were received from H.M. Inspector of Factories in respect of three factories. The defects were (1) insufficient Sanitary accommodation (2) dirty pail closet and (3) lack of separate approach. Additional Sanitary accommodation and washing facilities were provided at two other factories.
