

### INFECTIOUS DISEASE.

After the removal of all cases of infectious disease to the Isolation Hospital, including Scarlet Fever 15, Diphtheria 5, investigations have been carried out of the home conditions.

During such inspections, instructions as to cleansing and disinfection are given, but fumigation of the patients' rooms has now been discontinued.

### WATER SUPPLIES.

### Chlorination-

During the year the several Authorities concerned gave consideration to the chlorination of the six public supplies in the Worksop Rural area. Although all plants were not provided during the year 1941, I can now report that all water supplied in the Worksop Rural area is now chlorinated in accordance with the Ministry of Health's recommendations.

### Samples Taken-

During the year 1941, 33 samples of water were submitted for bacteriological examination; 25 of these samples were taken from the six public supplies, namely, Worksop Corporation Bulk Supply, Welbeck Estates Bulk Supply, Blackwell Rural Bulk Supply, Worksop R.D.C. Bulk Supply, and two of these samples proved to be unsatisfactory. These unsatisfactory samples were presumably due to foul household taps, because subsequent samples taken immediately after the results were received proved the water to be of a satisfactory bacterial standard of purity.

The remaining eight samples were taken from two shallow wells. One sample proved the supply to be satisfactory for domestic consumption, but the other well supply proved after several samples to be totally unfit for drinking purposes.

Certain remedial works were carried out by the owners, but these proved to be unsatisfactory to render the supply safe, and therefore the Owner was requested to make alternative provision. An application for a grant towards the cost was submitted to the County Council, and to date no decision has yet been given.

### PUBLIC CLEANSING.

### (a) Contract-

As in the previous year the scavenging work in the parishes of Norton, Cuckney, and Nether Langwith, was carried out by Contractors, and the refuse collected was disposed of on two tips situated in the Parish of Cuckney and Nether Langwith.

### (b) Direct Labour-

The whole of the northern part of the district, which includes six parishes, is scavenged by direct labour, and the household refuse is collected by three 3-ton refuse vehicles owned by the Council.

The collections are disposed of by tipping on two refuse disposal tips in the parishes of Styrrup and Harworth.

The Council considered the desirability of purchasing an additional lorry for scavenging duties, and although a licence to purchase from the Ministry of War Transport was sought early in the year, and subsequently granted, it was not until the year 1942 that the new vehicle was available for service.

### SALVAGE SCHEME.

The collection of waste and dormant materials was continued by the Council's scavenging department during the year 1941, and the weight and value of such materials was as follows:—

The Salvage Scheme in the Worksop Rural area was not organised until May, 1940, and I am pleased to record that the weight of materials disposed of during the 12 months of 1941 was more than twice the total weight sold during the eight months of 1940.

The collection of salvage in a rural area presents certain difficulties not ordinarily met with in the cities, but nevertheless I feel that the above statement of disposals reflects a credit on the workmen engaged in the scavenging department.

In addition to the non-graded herds referred to above, there are six accredited herds and one tuberculin tested herd for which licences are granted by the County Council.

The periodical inspection of cowsheds and premises revealed a standard of cleanliness to be generally satisfactory, and notices to limewash had been observed.

### Designated Milk-

Five licences were issued during the year to retailers to sell designated milk in the Worksop Rural area, under the Milk (Special Designations) Orders.

### MEAT AND FOOD.

### Slaughterhouses-

For the year 1941, eight applications were considered for the renewal of licences to keep premises as slaughterhouses, and licences were granted in each case. No new licences were issued during the year.

### Slaughtermen-

Under the Slaughter of Animals Act, 1933, seventeen licences were renewed to slaughtermen, to slaughter or stun animals in a slaughterhouse.

### Premises-

Regular inspections have been carried out during the year of premises where food is sold or prepared for sale, and as a result of these inspections the following foodstuffs were surrendered as unfit for human consumption:—
