To the Chairman and Members of the Worksop Rural District Council.

SIR, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to submit for your consideration the annual health report for the year ended 31st December, 1964, together with the vital statistics relative to that period.

The population figure of 18,480 represents an increase of 360 over the corresponding figure for last year.

The birth rate is 20.1 per thousand of the population. The figure for England and Wales is 18.4.

The death rate at 9.7 per thousand of the population is below that for England and Wales (11.3).

The infant mortality rate at 39.8 per thousand live births, is above that for England and Wales (20.0) and an explanatory note is included in the text.

The report includes information on the Health Services provided in the area by the Nottinghamshire County Council, and for this information I am indebted to the County Medical Officer.

PREVALENCE OF, AND CONTROL OVER, INFECTIOUS AND OTHER DISEASES.

Measles.

During the year 76 cases of Measles were notified.

Scarlet Fever.

Seven cases of scarlet fever were notified and the disease continues to be mild in type.

Whooping Cough.

Nine cases of whooping cough were notified during the year. The number of children immunised against the disease was 349.

Food Poisoning, Enteric Fever.

There were three cases of food poisoning notified during the year.

Dysentery.

Twelve cases of dysentery were notified during the year. The disease was mild in type and occurred mostly in the school population.

Tuberculosis.

There were six cases of pulmonary and two cases of nonpulmonary tuberculosis notified during the year.

B.C.G. Skin Testing and Vaccination.

Tuberculin testing followed by B.C.G. vaccination was offered to children in the 11th year age group and upwards:

Diphtheria.

There were no cases of diphtheria notified during the year.

In order to keep the disease from re-appearing, it is necessary to try to protect at least 75% of the children under 15 years.

Poliomyelitis.

There were no cases of poliomyelitis notified during the year.

Poliomyelitis Vaccination.

The number of persons who received three doses of oral vaccine was 345.

Smallpox.

The number of persons vaccinated against smallpox was 204.

Infant Mortality.

There were fourteen deaths under one year giving an infant mortality rate of 39.8.

The causes of death are analysed in Table II.

Of the fourteen deaths notified, five were due to prematurity, two to broncho-pneumonia and one to heart disease.

Prematurity is a problem in itself and until we know much more about its cause, there is little we can do about it.

ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH. Medical Examination of Staff.

For superannuation and other purposes twenty members of the Council's staff were medically examined by me during the year.

HOME HELP SERVICE.

The demand for Home Help in the Worksop Rural District increases as the amenities of the service become more widely known.

Home Helps are available for households where domestic help is needed owing to the presence of anyone who is sick, lying-in, an expectant mother, mentally defective, aged or a child not over compulsory school age.

The work undertaken by these women does not include nursing or midwifery duties, and they are not used as "sitters-in," but they do the ordinary domestic work usually undertaken by the mother of a family, which may include cleaning, cooking, washing, care of children, mending and shopping.

The charge for the service is 4/6d. per hour except where the patient is unable to afford that amount, when the County Council's Scale of Assistance is applied. Home Helps are paid by the County Council and necessary travelling expenses are reimbursed.

Cases needing help should be reported to the Home Help Service, 61 Carlton Road, Worksop—Telephone: Worksop 2884, where the service is administered by the District Organiser and an Assistant.

SANITARY INSPECTION OF THE AREA.

Report made to the Medical Officer of Health in pursuance of Article 25 of the Public Health Officers Regulations, 1959.

1. INFECTIOUS DISEASE.

The home conditions and possible sources of infection of all cases of infectious disease are investigated. Where necessary the rooms occupied by the patient are fumigated and the householders are given instructions on the cleansing of the houses and effects; disinfectant fluid is supplied by the Council, free of charge, for this purpose.

Six visits were made in connection with six cases of scarlet fever notified during the year in addition to 295 visits made to cases of suspected food poisoning, dysentery and contacts etc.

(c) Water Main Extensions.

One hundred and ten additional houses have been supplied with water from the public mains during the year.

Four water main extensions were carried out during the year as follows:—

- A 4-in. cast iron water main extended for a distance of 222 yards in Whitby Road, Harworth, to serve houses in course of erection by the Council.
- (2) A 3-in. cast iron water main in Church Lane, Harworth, extended for a distance of 77 yards to serve houses in course of erection by private enterprise.
- (3) A 4-in. cast iron water main extended for a distance of 612 yards to serve houses in course of erection by the Council off Knaton Road, Carlton-in-Lindrick.

3. DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE.

The following extensions of foul and surface water sewers were completed during the year :—

- 1,184 yards of 12-in. and 167 yards of foul water sewer in 9-in. earthenware pipes were constructed to serve houses in course of erection by the Council on a site off Knaton Road, Carlton-in-Lindrick; 516 yards of surface water sewer in 12-in. concrete pipes were also laid to serve this site.
- (2) 27 yards of 9-in. and 83 yards of 6-in. foul water sewer in earthen ware pipes were constructed to serve houses in course of erection by the Council in Whitby Road and Welbeck Road, Harworth; 157 yards of surface water sewer in 9-in. earthenware pipes were also laid on this site.
- (3) The foul water sewer at The Green, Carlton-in-Lindrick, was extended for a distance of 52 yards in 6-in. earthenware pipes to serve an existing dwelling.

Styrrup Sewerage Scheme.

The Scheme for the laying of sewers throughout the village of Styrrup and the erection of a pumping station with ancilliary works was completed during the year.

Hodsock Sewage Disposal Works.

The construction of additional filter beds, humus tanks, settlement tanks, and other ancilliary works at Hodsock Sewage Disposal Works was completed during the year.

4. CLOSET CONVERSIONS.

The Council continued to approve a grant to owners of dwelling-houses of 50% of the total cost, but not exceeding £15 per dwelling-house, towards the cost of converting sanitary conveniences of the conservancy type into water closets where application was made and a contribution recommended under Section 47 of the Public Health Act, 1936.

Applications for contributions towards the cost of conversions were approved under this Act in respect of 4 dwellinghouses during the year.

Conversions were also carried out with the aid of grant under the House Purchase and Housing Act, 1959, and the Housing (Financial Provisions) Act, 1958.

A total of 11 conversions were completed during the year, 2 in the parish of Carlton-in-Lindrick and 9 in the parish of Styrrup with Oldcotes.

5. PUBLIC CLEANSING.

Refuse collection services were operated by direct labour throughout the district.

The service consisted of the weekly emptying of dustbins and pail closets and the cleansing of privies and ashpits every six weeks.

Controlled tipping was carried out as far as possible.

Routine treatments of refuse tips were carried out during the year to prevent nuisance from rats etc.

At the beginning of the year the Council were operating one Austin refuse collection vehicle, one Shelvoke & Drewry vehicle of 16/18 cubic yards capacity and two Shelvoke & Drewry vehicles, each of 13 cubic yards capacity. In April the Austin vehicle was replaced by a further Shelvoke and Drewry vehicle of 16/18 cubic yard capacity.

21 men were employed on an average throughout the year on refuse collection and disposal.

Towards the end of the year the Council decided to engage the services of a firm of Works Study Consultants to undertake work study and to formulate a bonus scheme in respect of the refuse collection service.

6. INFESTATION.

(a) Bed Bugs.

Only two cases of infestation of bed bugs came to the notice of the Department during the year.

The treatment consisted of the removal of all skirting boards, picture rails, architraves etc. followed by thorough spraying with insecticide containing D.D.T. repeated until complete disinfestation was achieved.

(b) Rodent Control.

The refuse tips, sewage disposal works and other lands and premises owned and occupied by the Council were kept under observations, and treatment carried out when necessary.

55 minor infestations of rats and 3 infestations of mice were also dealt with in connection with dwellinghouses.

7. MEAT AND OTHER FOOD.

There are no licensed slaughterhouses in the district, the butchers obtaining their meat wholesale or by using licensed slaughterhouses in adjoining districts.

Licences to slaughter or stun animals outside the Council's district were renewed in respect of three slaughtermen.
