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

To the Chairman and Members of the Worksop Rural District Council.

SIR, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

I have had the honour of being appointed as Medical Officer of Health of this Rural District on 1st December, 1966, the last month of the year of which this is the current Annual Report.

I wish to pay my tribute to the late Dr. McCann, who was your Medical Officer since 1948. On my coming to the neighbouring borough in 1960 he proved to be an excellent colleague, and gave me a good deal of encouragement and support, for which I shall always be grateful.

The population figure of 19,150 represents an increase of 370 over the corresponding figure for last year.

The birth rate is 18.8 per thousand of the population. The figure for England and Wales is 17.7.

The death rate at 8.9 per thousand of the population is below that for England and Wales (11.7).

The infant mortality rate at 18.0 per thousand live births, is above that for England and Wales (19.0) and an explanatory note is included in the text.

The report includes information on the Health Services provided in the area by the Nottinghamshire County Council, and for this information I am indebted to the County Medical Officer.

# PREVALENCE OF, AND CONTROL OVER, INFECTIOUS AND OTHER DISEASES.

#### Measles.

During the year 364 cases of measles were notified.

### Scarlet Fever.

Fifty-two cases of scarlet fever were notified and the disease continues to be mild in type.

# Whooping Cough.

Five cases of whooping cough were notified during the year. The number of children immunised against the disease was 335.

# Food Poisoning, Enteric Fever.

No cases of food poisoning were notified during the year.

# Dysentery.

One hundred and thirty-one cases of dysentery were notified during the year. The disease was mild in type and occurred mostly in the school population.

#### Tuberculosis.

There were three cases of pulmonary and no cases of non-pulmonary tuberculosis notified during the year.

# B.C.G. Skin Testing and Vaccination.

Tuberculin testing followed by B.C.G. vaccination was offered to children in the 11th year age group and upwards:

### Diphtheria.

There were no cases of diphtheria notified during the year.

In order to keep the disease from re-appearing, it is necessary to try to protect at least 75% of the children under 15 years.

# Poliomyelitis.

There were no cases of poliomyelitis notified during the year.

# Poliomyelitis Vaccination.

The number of children who received three doses of oral vaccine was 445.

# Smallpox.

The number of persons vaccinated against small pox was 299. The number of persons re-vaccinated was 129.

# Infant Mortality.

There were seven deaths under one year giving an infant mortality rate of 18.0.

The causes of death are analysed in Table II.

Of the seven deaths notified, one was due to prematurity, and one to lobar-pneumonia.

Prematurity is a problem in itself and until we know much more about its cause, there is little we can do about it.

# ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH. Medical Examination of Staff.

For superannuation and other purposes three members of the Council's staff were medically examined by me during the year. A number of employees were medically examined by the family doctor, and a report sent to Council Officers.

### HOME HELP SERVICE.

The demand for Home Help in the Worksop Rural District increases as the amenities of the service become more widely known.

Home Helps are available for households where domestic help is needed owing to the presence of anyone who is sick, lying-in, an expectant mother, mentally defective, aged or a child not over compulsory school age. The work undertaken by these women does not include nursing or midwifery duties, and they are not used as "sitters-in," but they do the ordinary domestic work usually undertaken by the mother of a family, which may include cleaning, cooking, washing, care of children, mending and shopping.

The charge for the service is 4/6d. per hour except where the patient is unable to afford that amount, when the County Council's Scale of Assistance is applied. Home Helps are paid by the County Council and necessary travelling expenses are reimbursed.

Cases needing help should be reported to the Home Help Service, 61 Carlton Road, Worksop—Telephone: Worksop 2884, where the service is administered by the District Organiser and an Assistant.

### SANITARY INSPECTION OF THE AREA.

Report made to the Medical Officer of Health in pursuance of Article 25 of the Public Health Officers Regulations, 1959.

### 1. INFECTIOUS DISEASE.

The home conditions and possible sources of infection of all cases of infectious disease are investigated. Where necessary the rooms occupied by the patient are fumigated and the householders are given instructions on the cleansing of the houses and effects; disinfectant fluid is supplied by the Council, free of charge, for this purpose.

Fifty-two visits were made in connection with forty-eight cases of scarlet fever notified during the year in addition to 687 visits made to cases of suspected food poisoning, dysentery, contacts etc.

# (a) Bacteriological Examination.

# 3. DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE.

The following extensions of foul and surface water sewers were carried out during the year :—

- (1) 200 yards of foul water sewer in 9-in., and 600 yards in 6-in. earthenware pipes were constructed to serve houses in course of erection by Messrs. George Wimpey & Co. for the Council on a site off Rotherham Baulk, Carltonin-Lindrick. 160 yards of surface water sewer in 12-in. concrete pipes, 200 yards in 9-in. and 600 yards of 6-in. in earthenware pipes were also laid to serve this site.
- (2) 350 yards of foul water sewer in 6-in. earthenware pipes were constructed to serve houses in course of erection by private enterprise on a site to the South of Long Lane, Carlton-in-Lindrick. 110 yards of 9-in. and 130 yards of 6-in. surface water sewer in earthenware pipes were also laid on this site.
- (3) 723 yards of foul water sewer in 6-in. earthenware pipes were constructed to serve houses in course of erection for the Council by Messrs. George Wimpey & Co. on a site to the south of Bawtry Road, Harworth. 64 yards of 24-in., 126 yards of 21-in., and 304 yards of 12-in. surface water sewer in concrete pipes and 84 yards of 9-in. and 844 yards of 6-in. in earthenware pipes were also constructed to serve this site.
- (4) The Council's foul water sewer in Baulk Lane, Harworth, was extended for a distance of 70 yards in 6-in. earthenware pipes to serve houses constructed for the Police Authority.
- (5) 290 yards of 9-in. and 360 yards of 6-in. foul water sewer in earthenware pipes were constructed to serve houses in course of erection on a site to the north of Bawtry Road, Harworth.
- (6) 410 yards of 6-in. foul water sewer in earthenware pipes were constructed to serve houses in course of erection by private enterprise in Padgin Drive, Styrrup. 413 yards of surface water sewer in 6-in. earthenware pipes were also laid to serve this site.

### 4. CLOSET CONVERSIONS.

The Council continued to make grants to owners of dwelling-houses of 50% of the total cost, but not exceeding £15 per dwelling-house towards the cost of converting sanitary conveniences of the conservancy type into water closets in accordance with the provisions of Section 47 of the Public Health Act, 1936.

Two conversions were carried out during the year, both in the Parish of Styrrup-with-Oldcotes.

### 5. PUBLIC CLEANSING.

Refuse collection services were operated by direct labour throughout the district.

The bonus scheme referred to in my last report continued to operate satisfactorily.

The service consists of the weekly emptying of dustbins and pail closets and the cleansing of privvy middens and ashpits every two weeks.

Controlled tipping was carried out as far as possible.

Routine treatments of refuse tips was carried out during the year to prevent nuisance from rats etc.

The Council operated two Shelvoke & Drewry vehicles each of 16/18 cubic yard capacity and one Shelvoke & Drewry vehicle of 13 cubic yard capacity, with one old 16/18 cubic yard vehicle in reserve.

14 men were employed throughout the year on refuse collection and disposal, with assistance, when required, from the street cleaners during holiday periods and sickness.

### 6. INFESTATION.

# (a) Bed Bugs.

Only one case of infestation of bed bugs came to the notice of the Department during the year.

The treatment consisted of the removal of all skirting boards, picture rails, architraves, etc. followed by thorough spraying with insecticide containing D.D.T. repeated until complete disinfestation was achieved.

# (b) Rodent Control.

The refuse tips, sewage disposal works and other lands and premises owned and occupied by the Council were inspected regularly to detect any infestation of rats and treatment carried out when necessary.

The main sewerage systems in the district were also treated in co-operation with the Infestation Control Branch of the Ministry of Agriculture. 311 minor infestations of rats and 4 infestations of mice were also dealt with in connection with dwellinghouses and 11 infestations of rats at business premises.

Infestations at dwellinghouses are dealt with free of charge but 15/4d. per hour is charged in respect of the treatment of infestations at business premises.

### 7. MEAT AND OTHER FOOD.

There are no licensed slaughterhouses in the district, the butchers obtaining their meat wholesale or by using licensed slaughterhouses in adjoining districts.

Licences to slaughter or stun animals outside the Council's district were renewed in respect of three slaughtermen.

### 10. AIR POLLUTION.

For some time a nuisance has existed in the parish of Harworth, particularly in the shopping area in Scrooby Road, arising from the deposit of grit from the chimneys of Harworth Colliery. The matter had been taken up with the Colliery management on various occasions with little success and during the year the nuisance became more pronounced.

In March, two grit deposit gauges were installed by the Council on buildings in Scrooby Road and the monthly analyses confirmed that there was a heavy deposit of grit from the chimneys.

After further representations to the Coal Board it was agreed that a grit arrestor plant should be installed but this became unnecessary when the Board decided to cease generating electricity at the Colliery and the nuisance has now been alleviated.
